Hollis Chatelain was born and raised in Pennsylvania, but lived fourteen years of her adult life overseas in Switzerland and in four West African countries. At the end of 1996, she moved back to the United States. Her current studio and home are in Hillsborough, North Carolina.

Hollis' educational background is in design and photography. She has worked in the arts in one form or another since 1976. Hollis started her career as a textile artist in Africa. Her interest was sparked by the richness and beauty of African fabrics which are ever so integrated into the everyday life of Africans. Her distinctive use of colors and imagery, as well as her dye-painted scenes of multicultural life have brought her international recognition. Hollis' work can be found in public and private collections in Europe, Asia, South America, Africa, and North America.

In addition to creating her textile art, Hollis lectures and leads workshops on drawing, color, dye painting, quilting, and West African textiles.

## Artist Statement:

Much of my work is influenced by personal experiences. I make imagery that evokes an emotional response and creates a mood or atmosphere. My dreams also provide me with an infinite supply of inspiration and reinforce my views and feelings. When I am at peace, I dream images and color flows. When my life is chaotic, I dream people and events. My dreams are lucid and always in color.

The twelve years I lived in Africa have deeply influenced me. Six months after moving back to the United States, my longing for Africa was so great that I started to paint African images in order to put me back into the life I loved so much. I feel Americans should know more about the joy, harmony, and pride of the African people, rather than only hearing about the suffering and turmoil so commonly depicted in the media. I would like viewers to see my African imagery as a tribute to a people I truly admire and respect.

Since 2000, much of my work has reflected my feelings upon worldwide issues. Whether these concerns be social or environmental, they have overwhelmed my dreams and manifested themselves in my art.

It is from the Tucson Quilters Guild that we have received more than $90 \%$ of our quilts for the 3 auctions. We thank all of you for your support over the years. Our Mission Statement is to use the art and business of quiltmaking to pursue medical advances against breast and gynecological cancers. Funds will be raised for research, to continue the education of medical professionals and to support clinical organizations that raise awareness, offer detection, and provide treatment to all women.

JoAn Stolley, a local author, has written a very amusing book called "Cackleberries". You will love her very creative chicks, each one has a very distinctive personality. They are hilarious. After a year long project of writing and photographing this book, JoAn had the book published and is donating all of the proceeds to Quilt for A Cause. In this newsletter we begin our new series for 2011, "Color the Year With Quilts," with the pattern for "Let's Go Fly A Kite." Check out our really easy faced applique technique for the kite, and add ribbon embellishments for the tail! ## PRESIDENT THANK YOU BLOCK

It's time to begin working on our 'Thank You' blocks for our Guild President, Kathy Harris. Here's the pattern. The block should measure $61 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ when you finish it. Kathy loves orange so we will use orange fabric for the $61 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ block and white for the corner triangles. The blocks can be turned in at the January and February meetings.

1) Cut an orange $61 / 2$ " square block.
2) Cut 2 white $31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ square blocks. Mark the diagonal of these blocks.
3) Right sides together, layer the white blocks on opposite corners of the orange block and stitch on the diagonal. Figure A
4) Press the triangle up. Figure $B$

## Block of the Month - March 2011 © 2011 Evelyn George "Let's Go Fly A Kite" (unfinished block size $121 / 2{ }^{12}$ )

As we begin a new series, "Color the Year with Quilts," we show you how to make a very simple kite block with machine stitching and ribbon embellishments. Then we show you how to use several of these blocks for a colorful wall hanging, to brighten up any spot around the house. As the year progresses, we'll bring you other projects for the home, using our Block of the Month designs. (Of course, we'll continue to have our regular drawings at each Guild meeting, so grab some bright scraps and make one (or more!) of these playful kite blocks to enter in March. You might be the lucky winner--and have fun making a very special kite quilt!


## Cutting:

Sky Blue - one $12^{1 / 2 "}$ " square
Kite - bright scrap, about 8" x 12"
Tail - 3 to 5 pieces of $\sim 1 / 4$ " wide polyester ribbons (~3-4" each, all one color or different colors)

## Make the kite pattern as follows:

Cut a $51 / 2$ " $\times 7$ " rectangle from plain paper.
Fold in half lengthwise as shown. On the unfolded edges
 of the long side, make a mark $2 \frac{1}{4} 4^{\prime \prime}$ down from the top. Place the folded paper on your cutting mat, and position your ruler on it at an angle which connects the mark and the upper corner of the folded edge, and cut off a triangle. Then place the ruler again at the mark and angle it to the lower corner of the folded edge; cut off the triangle. Unfold the paper to see your kite pattern. It includes $1 / 4$ " seam allowances on all sides.

## Kite (faced applique):

Fold the kite fabric in half with right sides together. Pin the paper kite pattern on top and cut out two kites (one is the front and the other is the facing). Keeping right sides together, stitch completely around the kite $1 / 4$ " from the raw edges, stitching the two pieces together. Decide which will be the front side of the kite, and on the other side, pull the fabric away from the front and cut a slit about $11 / 2$ " in the middle of the back piece only. Trim the corners slightly to reduce bulk, and turn the kite right sides out, poking out the corners with a turning tool (such as a wooden chopstick). Carefully use a pin to coax out the corners to nice points. Press.

Pin the kite, right side up, onto the background square (sky), at an angle that pleases you (the cut side is concealed underneath). Using matching thread and a straight stitch, stitch all the way around the kite, close to the edges, stitching it to the background. Then change to black thread and adjust your machine to a narrow, close zigzag stitch, and stitch the "poles" of the kite, first from side to side, then from top to bottom. When you reach the bottom of the kite, continue stitching to make a tail string, adding pieces of ribbon to the tail about every $11 / 2$ " or so, as you go. Curve the tail into whatever curve it wants to make, down to the lower edge of the block (or perhaps the side; just don't stitch it exactly into the corner--). As you stitch the tail, stitch across each piece of ribbon, pinching it in the middle to gather it slightly where you are going to sew over it. (Avoid adding any ribbons too close to the edges of the block.) Finally, trim the ends of the ribbon pieces at an angle, so they are about 1 " long, to prevent raveling and make the tail look neat. (If pressing is needed, do it gently, with the block face down on a towel.)

Note: If you prefer, you could hand applique the kite onto the background and/or use black embroidery thread to hand stitch the kite ribs and tail, securing the ribbon bits as you go.
--Make 3 kite blocks from the March 2011 Block of the Month pattern. Stitch them together to make a vertical row.
--Cut $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ wide border strips from coordinating fabric (you can cut them either lengthwise or crosswise).
--Measure the length of the assembled row of blocks and cut 2 side border strips to match that measurement (approx. $361 /{ }^{\prime \prime}$ ). Stitch them to the long sides of the row. Press seams toward borders.
--Measure the width of the quilt top including the 2 side borders you just added. Cut 2 border strips that measurement (approx. $141 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ ) and stitch them to the top and bottom of the quilt. Press. (Save the border scraps to make hanging loops, see below)
Note: If you decide to cut your borders wider, just measure the quilt top at each step, and cut the border lengths to match the actual measurements of your quilt, as described above.
--The backing is made in two pieces, with a center seam that has an opening left for turning. Cut two pieces $15^{\prime \prime} \times 20^{\prime \prime}$ (or, if you made bigger borders, measure the top and cut the backing pieces larger, allowing extra for the seam in the center). Sew the two pieces together to make a long strip, leaving an opening in the center seam big enough to put your hand through, for turning (about 6"). Press. Trim the pieced back to exactly the same size as the quilt front.
--Cut a piece of batting* about $15^{\prime \prime} \times 39^{\prime \prime}$, or a little bigger than top.
--If you would like to include hanging loops along the top edge, make them now. You can use leftover border strips, or cut a strip of fabric $11 / 2^{\prime \prime} x$ about 20". Fold raw edges to just meet in the center of the strip, and press. Fold again, along the center so the raw edges are concealed inside, and press, to make a long narrow strip. Stitch along both long sides. Cut into 3 or 4 pieces for making the loops.
(Another option would be to make loops from satin rattail cord or other decorative cord. Just be sure your machine will stitch over it, in the seam)
--Layer the parts as follows:
Batting on the bottom
Quilt top (right side up) centered on the batting
Backing (wrong side up), with its raw edges aligned with the quilt top

--Pin layers together. Insert the loops between the top and the backing at the top edge of the quilt, spacing them evenly and pinning in place, so the cut ends of the loops stick out a little beyond the raw edges. Stitch $1 / 4$ from the edge all the way around, through all 3 layers. Trim excess batting and backing, and trim off a little extra at the corners. Turn right side out through the opening in the backing. Slip stitch the opening closed. Press edges; avoid touching ribbons with hot iron-just straighten them with your fingers, if they need it. On the front, topstitch around the border, close to the edge, and stitch in the ditch between border and quilt. Quilt around the kites and add any other quilting desired, such as a few clouds, or swirls of wind.
--If you didn't include loops at the top, you can add a sleeve on the back. Cut a piece of wood dowel about 2 or 3 inches longer than the width of the quilt, and slide it through the loops (or the sleeve). Tie a piece of decorative cord (about 3035 " long) to the ends of the dowel, and hang on a picture hook, over-the-door hook, or decorative knob.
*One suitable batting for wall hangings is a medium weight, bonded $50 \%$ cotton/50\% polyester, which resists stretching and creasing. If the batting lays flat and smooth and does not have any folds or buckling, it will probably hang well. If you use the bondable type, follow the package directions, which may be different than the layering method above.
