Kaleidoscope the very word promises surprise and magic, change and chance. Exploding with visual excitement, a kaleidoscopic design organizes an abundance of light and color, form and motion into a complex and coherent image. My goal is to harmoniously integrate the idea of a kaleidoscope with the techniques and materials of quiltmaking. I try to free myself from a conventional sense of fabric orderliness, seeking a random quality in order to imitate the succession of chance interlinkings and endless possibilities synonymous with kaleidoscopes.

I make quilts on the same block in the Bronx where I grew up. Being a New Yorker wrapped up in the fabric of city life creates an inherent paradox contrasting the traditional image of quiltmaking as part of a simple, make-do, rural way of life with my own complex urban-shaped space.

Historians have suggested that the block-style method of quiltmaking evolved in response to the cramped quarters of early American life. My family's living arrangement in an urban environment created similar considerations which, unwittingly, I resolved in much the same way. For over twenty years, my work space in our two bedroom apartment was the forty-inch round kitchen table. A long distance view, alternate space, or not making quilts were not options. I believe this reality merged

with my personality and passion for fabric in shaping the direction of my kaleidoscopic piecework, causing me to rely on intricate detail and inherent symmetry, and to invent a shape that makes the most of limited space. My block style method is based on a pie-slice section.

Until I met quilts, I thought I was creative but not talented. To find something you love to do is a gift. To achieve recognition for it is a miracle. Whenever I got overwhelmed by a longing for functional space, complete with a door I could close. I tried to remember this. Lives change shape. In 2003, the second bedroom of our apartment was transformed into a studio.

My quilts have achieved international recognition for the innovative and complex designs inspired by the bilateral symmetry of kaleidoscopic images. Honored by inclusion in the Twentieth Century's 100 Best American Quilts, my designs have inspired products including the vast carpet in the Hilton Americas hotel in Houston, TX and were showcased in the American Folk Art Museum's first one person exhibition highlighting the work of a contemporary guilt artist (2009). In addition to numerous awards, I was a recipient of fellowships from the New York Foundation for the Arts and The Bronx Council on the Arts. I'm the author of Kaleidoscopes & Quilts, Snowflakes & Quilts, Puzzle Quilts: Simple Blocks, Complex Fabric, Paula Nadelstern's Kaleidoscope Quilts: An Artist's Journey Continues and Kaleidoscope Quilts: The Workbook.

I design textile prints exclusively for Benartex, Inc. and live in New York City with my husband, Eric





Pacific West Quilt Show Announces Challenge

Pacific West Quilt Show has announced the 2012 fabric challenge sponsored by Clothworks. Challenge rules include that a recognizable amount of challenge fabric must appear on the front of the quilt, the entry must be constructed of three layers (top, batting, and backing) and held together by quilting, and that the finished size by 18" x 18" with a three-inch sleeve on the back for hanging.

Anyone may participate in the challenge. The \$5 entry fee (due by March 20) secures a fat quarter of the challenge fabric for the entrant. Finished quilts must be received by July 2 and will be shown at the Pacific West Quilt Show, August 24-26, at the Greater Tacoma (Washington) Convention and Trade Center. All entries are eligible for award consideration, with a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place ribbon being selected by challenge judges.

Clothworks, the sponsor of the challenge, is a leading manufacturer of cotton fabrics sold through quilt shops across the United States and around the world. The challenge fabric, designed by the late Laurel Burch, is a multi-color print featuring butterflies called "Flying Colors II." The Pacific West Quilt Show is sponsored by the Association of Pacific West

Quilters. The show dates back to 1994 and was formerly known as Pacific Northwest Quiltfest. With the expansion of the Association of Pacific West Quilters, and it's name change, the quilt show has become an annual event under the Pacific West Quilt Show name.





Tucson Quilters Guild, Inc. By-Laws

SOCIETY

By-Laws Change Proposal

January 10, 2012

1. Article IV, Section 7.

Any Director of the Guild who misses three (3) Business meetings in a fiscal year shall be removed from office. An election will be held to fill that position for the remainder of the term other than as provided by in Article VI. An Acting Director shall be appointed by the board in the interim.

Proposed change: Any Director of the Guild who misses three (3) business meetings in a fiscal year for reasons other than an excused absence as approved by the President or Vice President may be removed from office.

2. Article X: Funds and Fiscal Year:

Section 3: All Checks and Monies offered for purposes of donations to charity shall be made out to TQG and any checks to the charity are written from the Guild Treasury.

Section 4: Persons entrusted with the handling of corporation funds may be required, at the discretion of the Board, to furnish at corporation expense, a suitable fidelity bond.

"Pattern of the Month"

Classic "Mosaic" Block (in 2 sizes)

A great block for using up scraps -- no wonder it's been popular for over 100 years! Depending on where you put lights and darks, different designs can be created. Add sashing between them to make each block stand out; or place them directly together or with alternating plain blocks to create other designs.

Thanks to Kay Hendricks for contributing this idea to "Pattern of the Month!"

--What can you do with "Mosaic"?



This block was originally made with templates, but we've discovered that a $5\frac{1}{2}$ " or $10\frac{1}{2}$ " block is easy to rotary cut, so we'll offer both—choose the size that works best for the quilt you are making.

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The block can be made larger by adding sashing. Cut sashing strips the length of your unfinished block side (6" or 11" in this case), and as wide as you'd like them to be (remember to add an extra $\frac{1}{2}$ " to the width, for seam allowances.) Also cut 4 squares for cornerstones, the same width as sashing strips.

For example, if your block is 6" unfinished, cut 4 sashing strips $1\frac{1}{2}$ " wide x 6" long, and 4 cornerstones $1\frac{1}{2}$ " square. Adding them will increase unfinished size of block to 8" and finished size to $7\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Suggestion: A fast way to sash an entire quilt is to first add sashing to two adjacent block sides (add a cornerstone to one end of the second strip). Then sew blocks into rows, keeping the sashed edges oriented the same way, for example at bottom and right hand sides of blocks. \rightarrow





When these half-sashed blocks are joined into rows, you will find you only need to add sashing and cornerstones to top and left sides of quilt to complete the sashing all the way around.


The Mosaic quilt at right has 36 blocks→

Using $5\frac{1}{2}$ " blocks, 1" sashing and cornerstones, and 2" borders, it measures 44" square.)

Or, with $10\frac{1}{2}$ " blocks, 2" sashing and cornerstones, and $4\frac{1}{2}$ " borders, it measures 86" square.

(To make a quilt using unsashed Mosaic blocks alternated with plain blocks, simply cut plain squares the same size as your Mosaic blocks.)

--Add this pattern to your box of pretty scraps, and any time you need a fun, recreational day, make a bunch of Mosaic blocks!
