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




Karen Eckmeier – Oops! My Edges Are Showing

The Tucson Quilters Guild welcomes Karen Eckmeier as the May featured speaker. Her work is fun and freewheeling although she admits that she didn't even own a sewing machine until she was 30. She purchased it because she felt it was her duty as a young mother to do so but it stayed in the closet until the day she saw her first quilt. Since she had taken art and drawing classes since she was 6 years old, she figured if she could draw it, she could figure out how to sew it, which obviously was not as easy as it sounded. Color was another problem though you would hardly know it when looking at her wonderful quilts. Commercial fabrics were the answer there. The colors came already came "pre-mixed" and they were certainly less messy than mixing paints.

In 1996 Karen began making art quilts and in 2002 it officially became her business. Her favorite technique is layered collage and topstitching, which she will discuss in her lecture and demonstrate thoroughly in her Happy Villages workshop. In her Making Waves workshop, Karen will again use her layered topstitching technique to create textured fabric with wild curves and peaks. These fabrics can then be used in a number of applications such as traditional or art guilts, borders, and eye catching wearables.






"100 Years, 100 Quilts" Guild Programs

Have you enjoyed the "100 Years, 100 Quilts" exhibit at the Arizona Historical Society Museum yet? Why not come hear about quilts and quilting from a Guild member in the "Meet the Quilter" presentations offered on the second Saturday of each month, May through November; then view the exhibit before or after the presentation?

Presentations are at 11:00 a.m. Ann Adams will be our Meet the Quilter on May 12 and Judy Gilmartin will present on June 9.

Children's programs are offered on the first Saturday, also at 11:00 a.m. May 5th will have youngsters creating a Southwestern Mini Wall Hanging, taught by Ruth Martin and Carol Guibert. Yvonne Clay will teach the June 2nd class, Summer Reading Bookmark. If you have youngsters in your life who might like an introduction to quilting crafts, bring them to the Museum on first Saturday mornings.

The Museum is located at 949 E. 2nd Street. Tucson, AZ. All programs are free with Museum admission. Parking is free in the garage a half block south of the Museum. No parking pass is necessary on Saturdays; obtain a pass from the Museum reception desk other days.

What do you get for your \$30 in Membership?

Many Guild members have wondered exactly where there membership dues have gone and even though we recently reviewed the Budget and approved it at the March General Meetings, the Board thought maybe the following information would be of benefit. The current membership is 437, so the following formula has been figured based on that number. Of course, later on we may have more members but that is not certain, so we have divided all costs based on current membership.

Our current rent for our meetings is \$787 and if that is divided by 437, this means that every member is paying \$1.80 for the chair he/she is using at the meeting. The cost of the library is approximately \$.24 for each member and the pattern of the month is only \$.03. Those costs are relatively cheap, aren't they?

Our Insurance to cover membership and the Board of Directors is another \$3.95 for each member. This covers all of us in case something untoward should happen and litigation is necessary. Not inexpensive, but a necessary fact of business in this day and age.

Each program we have can vary based on the Speakers' fees. But based on the charges for Susan Cleveland, whom we all enjoyed in March, the cost per member for that lecture was \$5.01. I don't think that you could buy a ticket anywhere for so little, but our buying power is based on our large membership. However, if you total all these numbers together, we spent \$11.02 of your \$30 in one month! This obviously means that we would be out of money unless we doubled our membership in another 2 months, or stopped having speakers. Unthinkable? That is why the Quilt Show is so imperative to our continuance, or dues would have to be dramatically increased.

For those members who may harken back to the "good old days" when our dues were only \$3.00 per year, I want you to remember what the group was like. We had less than 20 members, we met at the Arizona Historical Society for free, and there was no speaker. It was a simple gathering to share our love of quilting.

So if you come to only 3 meetings per year, and many members do attend more than that, you have exceeded the cost of your membership based on these few figures. Imagine that!


Pattern of the Month

Thanks to those who brought lovely pincushions to the April meetings--we've collected about 30 so far, and will continue to accept more at the May meetings, to send to our sister quilters on the Hopi mesas. You can use Sally and Evelyn's patterns that were offered last month, or any pincushion pattern you choose!

And thanks to Shari Thompson for donating her "Sunflower Bear Fetish" pattern to share with you this month. Print it out, or come by the Pattern of the Month table at Guild meetings to pick up a copy and take a close look at Shari's beautiful sample block. This stylized bear would be nice as a wall hanging, or could be added to other blocks in a southwest quilt.

Pattern of the Month - May 2012 "Sunflower Bear Fetish"

(12" finis hed)



Shari Thompson designed this bear fetish, inspired by Zuni art, and adorned it with a sunflower and some pretty beads. A fetish is a small rock carving that captures the spirit and essence of an animal. Bear is considered the most powerful of all the animals, representing strength and self-knowledge, and having great healing powers.



Fabric and Supplies

- 12 ½" square of background fabric (light)
- 9" square of bear fabric (brown)
- 8" strip of 3/8" wide fusible binding (green) for strap
- 5" square of sunflower fabric (yellow)
- 3" square of flower center fabric (brown) for embroidered yo-yo
- 1½" circle of wool batting or a bit of stuffing, for yo-yo center
 Wonder Under or other lightweight paper-backed fusible adhesive
 Lightweight brown yarn; colored beads



Technique

(Instructions are given for Shari's combination of techniques, but this pattern could be adapted to your favorite techniques. Add seam allowances if you will be turning under edges.)

Trace bear shape onto paper side of fusible; following package instructions, fuse to wrong side of bear fabric. Cut out, remove paper and position bear on background fabric. Cut a length of fusible binding or other narrow strip with fusible on the back, and position it vertically on the bear, starting at the top of his back and going down between his "feet" (this is a medicine bundle strap.) Trim to fit. When positioned as desired, fuse pieces to background.

Draw a 4" circle on the paper side of fusible, and draw lines through the center point to divide it into 16 equal "petals" (22.5 degrees each, if you are using a tool that measures angles). Fuse it to wrong side of the square of sunflower fabric. Using a wavy cutting blade, cut out the circle. Then cut apart petals with a straight blade and ruler. Remove paper and position petals on bear, separating them slightly to form a sunflower, and centering it on strap. Fuse.

For center of flower, draw a $1\frac{1}{2}$ " circle on square of flower center fabric. With matching lightweight yarn, embroider French knots over the whole surface within circle. Cut out circle leaving 1/2" seam allowance around embroidered center. With thread and needle, gather circle into a yo-yo. Stuff it slightly, and hand stitch it to center of flower. Add an eye to Bear if you wish, and a few beads, a feather, etc. to top of strap, for Bear's medicine bundle (this may be done more easily after it is quilted).

(Shari quilted hers with radiating lines inside the petals, and used echo quilting around the flower, inside the bear. The background is stipple quilted.) The quilted block could be bound as a wall hanging, or an unfinished one could be used in a quilt with other Southwest designs.
