This month we welcome Sherrill Kahn as our featured speaker. Sherrill is a mixed media artist who will be teaching a 2-day workshop of her many painting, layering, and rubber stamping techniques.

A retired school teacher, Sherrill taught drawing, painting, and design for 30 years in the Los Angeles public school system, 27 of those years at Palisades High School. She has also taught for University Extension program. Sherrill has been creating award winning fiber art works for almost 40 years. She paints and decorates every surface imaginable, and she constantly explores new materials and new techniques. In 1996, along with her husband Joel, Sherrill started a rubber stamp company called "Impress Me Now" with designs focused on ethnic cultures and Southwestern art.

Sherrill lives by four simple words "Have Fun" and "What If?" So those of you who are lucky enough to join Sherrill in her 2-day workshop should be in for a very good time!







GOT IDEAS? This fiscal year the Guild budget includes money (\$1,000) for awarding grants to applicants who have a project that needs a little financial help. While we have awarded money to museums, the Baltimore Album research project, Quilt for a Cause, and other worthy organizations, we have also awarded grants to members who have a project that needed funding help. One member applied for a grant and was awarded money to enable her to take a class at the quilt show in Houston. Another member used grant money to purchase sewing machines and quilting supplies for students to use at the high school where she was teaching.

What ideas do you have? Is there something you have always wanted to try? Maybe starter funding is all that is holding you back. On our website we have a description of the Endowment Grant Program and an application form to be completed and submitted along with a description of your proposal. While we could award the entire amount to one proposal, it is certainly possible that there will be more than one recipient with requests for smaller amounts. – Sally Dickinson


SAAVI Quilting Classes Completed

One of the Guild's education projects in 2011 – 2012 was teaching quilting to visually –impaired and blind adults who learn independent living skills at the Southern Arizona Association for the Visually Impaired (SAAVI) and assisting with "nap-time" quilts to be used at SAAVI's summer camp for visually-impaired children.

Each Friday, Guild volunteers helped one to seven adult quilters as they learned basic stitching and appliqué skills. Four quilts with appliqués using textured fabric for tactile identification are ready for campers. Braille identifiers are sewn on many of the appliquéd blocks as additional learning tools. While these new quilters have limitations that most people never experience, they have put together lovely, colorful, instructional and useful quilts. The enjoyment and camaraderie that developed early on in the project was delightful to both the SAAVI quilters and the volunteers who showed up faithfully on their scheduled Fridays.

The Guild's weekly commitment to SAAVI ended in May. As Education Chairperson, I would like to take this time to thank the many Guild members who volunteered at SAAVI this past year. Thanks to: Mary Blount, Pat Sanchez, Arlene Svenson, Ann Therrien, Shari Thompson, Anne Zones, Shirley Miller, Kitty Fleming, Ana Martinez and Ruth Martin. Additional thanks go to Quilting for Others and Mary Bazzano who supplied most of the fabrics used in the making of the quilt tops.





PATTERN OF THE MONTH

In April and May we collected over 60 pretty pincushions to send to our Hopi sister quilters--thanks to everyone who made one! We're not collecting any more things to send them at this time. But if you missed the pincushion patterns, or any of the other patterns this year, you can still find them on the TQG website. Just scroll down underneath the newsletter section and you will see "Pattern of the Month". You can click on a pattern, and read it online or print out the pdf so you can make it. So far this year, we have brought you the following new patterns: Classic Mosaic Block; My Stamp Collection--a mini-quilt; Basket, Butterfly and Flying Geese Pincushions; Sunflower Bear Fetish block; and this month we're adding the Tortillas y Frijoles block. Part or all of each month's pattern selection is in the newsletter and copies are available at the Pattern of the Month table each month. The same patterns (and sometimes more) are in our special website section, so check it out!



Pattern of the Month - June 2012 "Tortillas y Frijoles"

(10" finished block)


This traditional block is sometimes called Northwind, or Corn and Beans. Here in the Southwest, we can call it Tortillas y Frijoles, just for fun! You could use just two colors, but it's also great for a scrap quilt -- just be sure to choose a light and a dark for each block. The diagonal motion of this block design lends itself to many interesting layouts, such as you would use for log cabin blocks. Why not use up some scraps, or dig into that



fat quarter collection, and make this a great summer quilt project?

The blocks are 10" finished, so it would take 48 blocks, plus 5" borders, to make a quilt about 70" \times 90". (Of course, you could make any size quilt you want.)

For a scrappy look, one option is to use fat quarters; a pair of FQ's (one light and one dark) will yield enough pieces for 4 blocks. So for a 48 block quilt, you'd need 12 light and 12 dark FQ's in assorted colors (plus extra fabric for borders, backing and binding). For quick cutting, layer one dark and one light FQ, right sides together, and cut together as shown:



Cut two 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares and cut them in half diagonally to make triangles

Cut 10 4 1/8" squares and cut them in half diagonally to make triangles

(This will give you enough large and small triangles to make 4 identical blocks; if using fat quarters, there will be enough fabric to cut a few extra small triangles, if you wish, which can be used in another block.)

Start with the <u>small</u> triangles. They are already layered right sides together, so stitch 12 light/dark pairs together into triangle squares (just 3 for each block; don't stitch all of them):



Right sides together




Stitch 1 seam





(press to dark)

Light/dark triangle squares
Make 3 for each block.


Next, separate the remaining large and small triangles and arrange them with the pieced light/dark triangle squares, as shown below (A). For each block, use 3 light/dark triangle squares, 2 light and 2 dark small triangles, and 1 light and 1 dark large triangle. (You can trade lights or darks if you like, to make each block from a different combination.)







First, stitch the small triangles to the light/dark triangle squares to make rows (B), then sew those rows together (C). Finally, add the two large triangles to complete the block (D). Take care to keep all the light and dark triangles in their correct positions! (Dark triangles all point one way, light triangles point the other way.) Press in directions shown by arrows.



When you have made as many blocks as you need for the size quilt you are making, play with the layout, arranging the blocks to see what designs you can make. Take digital photos of the layouts you like, to help you decide which one to use.

(D) Tortillas y Frijoles block

You can add borders of any width you like, or leave the outer edges plain without any borders. Here are just a couple of 48 block layouts (6 across \times 8 down) you could try:
