

They had a separate room at the Mesa Convention Center displaying hexagon quilts, old and new, and several quilters demonstrating the fine old art of English paper piecing.

Not to be outdone in Tucson, our next speaker is Mickey Depre. She has updated this traditional pattern in her newly released book, **"Pieced Hexies**", and will be teaching a workshop using her tech-



But in addition, Mickey is also offering a workshop in art quilt design called "Permission to Play". According to the survey that you did at the beginning of our term, you showed a tremendous interest in this type of class. This session has a short, manageable supply list so the only out of pocket expense for this one should be the cost of the workshop itself (unless you just like to use workshops as an excuse to buy more fabric).

Thank you all in advance for what we hope **İS** a record year of sales to support this wonderful Guild.


Bees, Bees! A very special component of our Guild.

Pattern of the Month – April 2013 by Evelyn George

"Oriental Box Puzzle"

There are several methods for making this popular block, which has many different names. The technique offered here is similar to the one used for "Disappearing Ninepatch," where simple pieced blocks are cut up and rearranged to form a new design. You could use precut 2 1/2" strips plus 5" squares, but it is also fat-quarter friendly. (The advantage of using FQ's is that the strips can be cut with lengthwise grain rather than crosswise, so they will be less stretchy and therefore more stable.) For this version, choose an equal number of <u>light</u> and <u>dark</u> fat quarters. Each pair of fat quarters makes 2 blocks.



Choose one light and one dark fat quarter which look good together. Stack together on cutting board, lining up selvedges vertically to your left. Cutting through both layers, trim off selvedges, and trim other 3 sides squarely if needed. Keeping layers together, continue cutting as follows.

First, cut one 5" wide vertical strip off left hand edge. From one end of this strip cut a 5" square. From remainder of 5" strip, cut two 2 1/2" x 9" rectangles.

From rest of stack, cut four 2 1/2" strips and cut them into lengths shown on diagram. (There will be some scraps left over. They can be used for another block or project.)

Pieces needed for two blocks:


1 light and 1 dark 5" square 2 each light and dark 2 1/2" × 5" rectangles 4 each light and dark 2 1/2" × 9" rectangles 2 each light and dark 2 1/2" × 13" rectangles

Arrange the pieces as shown below, and stitch together to make two Oriental Box blocks with opposite colorations, one mostly light and one mostly dark. Add strips from center outward, pressing seams toward the darker fabric. (1 light and 1 dark FQ, layered and cut together)↓





Oriental Box (light)

Measure (or fold) and cut each Oriental Box block horizontally and vertically through the center, to make 4 equal pieces.





Now, trade two pieces from each block with each other, and rotate them as shown; stitch together to make two identical Oriental Puzzle blocks. (If making lots of blocks in different color combinations, you could combine assorted quarters randomly --just use any 2 light and 2 dark ones per block).

Other arrangements are also possible, by rotating the quarters into different designs. Play with them until you have one you like, then sew the 4 quarters of the blocks together. The finished block size is about 12" square. Make as many blocks as you like, for the size quilt you'd like to make. For the most interesting look, use several light and dark combinations, or make it as scrappy as you like!
