Weeks Ringle is a quilter, author, fabric designer, teacher and blogger.

Weeks is a co-founder with Bill Kerr of ModernQuilt Studio in Oak Park, Illinois. Since 1999 they have brought a modern twist to the great American Quilting tradition using decades of quilt making experience and graduate design degrees.

In 2011, they launched Modern Quilts Illustrated, the first magazine dedicated exclusively to modern quilting. Their books include Transparency Quilts, Quilts Made Modern, The Modern Quilt Workshop and Quiltmaker's Color Workshop.

They have been featured in many national articles. There is more. They have designed original fabrics and developed bedding and tex-

tiles.

Weeks lectures and teaches design and quilt making internationally. On her blog, Craft Nectar, she writes about craft and creativity.

Weeks Workshop, Thursday, April 10th will be "Working with Large Prints." We love large-scale prints, but find them challenging to combine them effectively with other prints. Students will learn design concepts behind using large-scale prints and how to show them off to their best advantage.

Friday, April 11th, the workshop is titled "Improvisation Piecing". Students will learn different techniques for piecing. Students will be guided by Weeks through a strategy that will have them making design decisions as they go.

Guest Profile of the Month by Reilly Zoda

We have so many really talented people here in our Guild and I'd like to know more about them! So I've started a new monthly article that will feature a profile of one of our Guild members.

Our first profile is of Lynda Luiten, Quilter and owner of The Quilter's Market.

When you walk into The Quilter's Market on Speedway Boulevard in Tucson, one of the first things you'll notice is how bright it is; bright fabrics with colors dancing in the light and bright and cheerful greetings from the employees bustling around the shop! The whole atmosphere is reflective of the personality of the shop's owner, Lynda Luiten.

I've always been impressed with Lynda's marketing skills and wanted to know more about who she is and how she got where she is.

Lynda was born in Houston and traveled around a bit before settling in Phoenix at the age of 7. She and her

younger brother were raised in Phoenix and she went to the UofA here in Tucson for her college education,

where she earned a BS in Nutrition and Food Science, an MS in Animal Science, and an MBA in Marketing .

Married to John, Lynda went to work after graduation as a pharmaceutical representative, working in corporate America for 17 years while raising her children, son Ken and daughter Rebecca. Both are gone from the nest now; Ken married and Rebecca in grad school in California.

Lynda, like many of us, comes from a sewing background rather than one with generations of quilters. She entered the quilting world in kind of a sideways way. With her background in sewing clothing, she joined a 'Wearables' class at Precious Hands when she was 40. She'd had to put sewing aside for many years while raising the kids, but got back with a vengeance! The 'wearables' led to other types of quilting, and she was off!

Sandy Triebel was the president of Tucson Quilters Guild at the time, and she convinced Lynda that she had to join. She did, and ended up taking many classes and becoming involved with different committees. At first she didn't know what it meant that she needed "lights" and "darks" for a project, but anyone who's seen her work knows that she's come a long way!

When Precious Hands closed, Lynda casually mentioned to her husband John, "Maybe I should open a Quilt Shop." She was a bit surprised when his answer was, "Maybe you should!" One can only imagine the amount of work involved, but The Quilter's Market opened in January, 2004. At that time Lynda had a partner but after a year she became the sole proprietor. Sidekick Bonnie Wilson has been there from the beginning, using her talent to create wonderful displays and help anywhere she's needed.

When I asked Lynda what her philosophy for her shop was, there was no hesitation in her answer. "I wanted a place that people could come to explore their creativity, and have the joy of making things with their own hands. It is a business, but I wanted it to be a place that was an 'open door' for people to come and socialize with others that were involved in the same craft."

What does Lynda enjoy most about the quilting process? Piecing and machine work! She loves the cutting process and choosing fabrics for a project. Her quilts are scrappy, bright and colorful, often featuring batiks.

Any goals left? Lynda's happy with her shop. Sure, she'd like more room, but she's happy with her location. She wants to continue to be a 'gathering place', a kind of 'club house' for her customers. Above all, it's to be a safe environment for any level of quilter to ask any question and receive respectful help from the staff. She would like more time to improve her web site and hopes to attain this goal in the future.

I asked Lynda what she gets out of her affiliation with the Guild. Again, as with her business, no hesitation in her reply! "The speakers! Best deal in town!" In addition, the fellowship, being together with like-minded people.

I really enjoyed learning more about one of our outstanding members. But I'd like to interview some of you who are less visible too! We all have a story to tell... let's do it!

Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson

The next public documentation is at the **Arizona History Museum on April 5**th. The Museum is located at 949 E. 2nd St, Tucson. For an appointment, contact <u>azquiltdoc@yahoo.com</u> or call Kate Clark at 520.742.1000. There is no fee, however, donations are appreciated. The quilt owner first signs a release of information and completes as much as possible of the three pages of owner information; then the team gets to work.

They carefully examine the quilt and enter the information obtained on to a seven page form. Photographs are taken of the quilt. The owner receives a cloth label with a number, unique to that documented quilt. The data ultimately is entered into the Quilt Index, an online database for quilts.

New members are welcome. Training sessions are held on the second Tuesday of each month, from 9:30 until 12:30 at the Ellie Towne Flowing Wells Community Center on Ruthruff Road.

At the March session, the group learned about fabric variations over time from fellow team member, Linda Laird. What a stash of vintage fabric was shared! The group then documented three quilts.



Would you like to make some blocks for this year's Quiltathon? We need LOTS! And we'd love to have them ahead of time. Here's how you can help, whether you'll actually be here for the Quiltathon in August, or not!

--Make a block (or several) using the following pattern, or any star block (121/2" unfinished size).

(Maybe you already have some "orphan" blocks you'd like to donate?)

--Bring your blocks to the April, May or June meetings and we'll incorporate them into the Quiltathon kits for our "Stars and Squares" twin size quilts! Our goal is 55, half for women and half for children. Hopefully we'll be able to donate 55 quilts to Emerge! Center Against Domestic Violence.

--Bright colors and juvenile prints make fun, scrappy stars for kids, and pretty prints would be nice for the women's quilts.

Fabrics for each block:

Light Background (white, cream, beige, etc.) – cut eight 4½" squares Bright Prints (assorted is fine, for a scrappy look) – cut one 4½" center square and 8 assorted 2½" squares (for star points)

Make the Star Block

Place a 2½" print square on top of a 4½" background square, *right sides together*, lining them up at one corner. Stitch diagonally across the small square, as illustrated. → (You could draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the small square first, if that's helpful.) Trim off the corner, leaving a ¼" seam allowance. Press the seam toward the corner.

Place a second 2¹/₂" square on a corner next to the first one, stitch diagonally, trim and press as you did on the first corner. This makes one Star Point Unit (it has two star points on it). For each star block, make a total of 4 Star Point Units, using either all one color, or a scrappy assortment.

Arrange four Star Point Units around the four sides of each 4½" center print square, with the star points next to the center Square, as shown in illustration, right. → Use 4 plain 4½" light squares for the 4 outer corners of each block.


Using ¼" seams, stitch together like a 9-patch: first sew into 3 rows, then join the rows to complete the block. (Press seams the way they want to go—away from star points.)

Please turn in your blocks to Paula Zidel, Quiltathon Chair, or Evelyn George, Pattern of the Month, at the April, May or June meetings so they can be used in the Quiltathon kits!
