# Susan Else

"Off the Wall: Quilting in Three Dimensions"



California artist Susan Else uses collaged and quilted fabric to create unusual sculpture. Ranging from wry comments on everyday life to wild imaginary scenes, her work adds a new dimension to the usual flat format of art quilts. Her engaging, vibrantly colored work includes free-standing figures as well as three-dimensional dioramas. Built around armatures of foam. wire, and fiberfill, the work incorporates both hand-treated and commercial cloth as well as paint and embellishment.

In this lecture, Susan discusses the relationship of her

work to the art-quilt movement and contemporary folk art, as well as to other threedimensional textiles. She explores how sewn cloth differs from traditional sculptural materials such as clay and metal, and she describes her own metamorphosis from quilt maker to sculptor.

Although she never expected to become an artist herself, Susan grew up in a family of artists who shaped her personal vision. After "fooling around" with fabric and fiber for twenty years, she started making quilted sculpture in 1999.

In addition to one-woman shows, she has participated in many travelling exhibitions, including Quilt National. Her work is in public and private collections throughout the U.S.

## President's Message

Dear TQG,

This is not an easy note to write, but it's something that has to be mentioned and discussed.

It has come to my attention, on several occasions that our Guild has either become guilty of, or is being perceived as, fostering behaviors that come close to "Adult Bullying". On reflection, we probably know behaviors that fit into these categories for the above. Certainly there's been enough in the news in the last few years, especially about 'cyber-bullying', but how can we be guilty of this kind of behavior? A new member comes to a meeting, by herself, sits down near a group and they ignore him or her. Do they feel superior in some way, or is it just a lack of kindness? How do you think that new person feels? Do they want to come back? Do you know how much we've lost if they don't? Maybe not much, but maybe the next great teacher!

You don't like the way things are being done in a certain area. Do you go to the people involved, in a confidential and respectful manner, voice your concerns, and accept it if things don't go your way? Or do you go after them in front of everyone and never give up trying to get your way?

Many, if not most of the cultures we know of, have some version of <u>The Golden Rule</u>. Do you remember the first meeting you went to? I do, and it's a good thing I really wanted to be a Guild member!

The solution, as I see it, to changing the culture of our group, is two pronged:



Quilt documentation is important. Colleague, Lynn Miller, wrote the following:

The Top 10 Reasons to Document Your Quilts

## By Debra Lynn Miller

I only realized recently, while documenting quilts I have made just how important it is to record the information I know best about my quilts. I am the only one who knows the who, what, when, where and why of my quilts. Recording the information about the quilts I have made is the difference between a biography written about you and an auto biography written by you. Contact the Arizona Quilt Documentation Project to get started today.

- 10. Do you ever wish you knew more about the maker of a quilt? What were they thinking?
- 9. Do you own a family guilt you know nothing about? Or wish you knew more about?
- 8. Did you know in Arizona you have a golden opportunity to record a written history of your quilt life?
- 7. Your quilts are an important record of your life. They are a visual history of you and you can now share the written history.
- 6. Is documenting your quilts on your bucket list? Something we don't like to think about, our demise. It is a fact and will happen to each and every one of us.
- 5. Are you recording information about the quilts you have made? If not, can you remember all the details about the quilts?
- 4. Do you ever think about how large/small the world has become since our grandmother's days. The world is a huge place---but with the World Wide Web it is getting much smaller.
- 3. Have you ever imagined what it would be like if the quilters from even 1914 would have had the opportunity to record the information about their quilts? BTW, not every state is doing documentation and many states still have 1940's and 1950's as cut off dates. Arizona chose not to have a cutoff date for documenting quilts.
- 2. Did you know if you document your quilts for the Quilt Index that in 2114 your great, great, great grandchild, niece, or other relative will be able to know you through your quilts? What a legacy! As well as all the research information that will be available.
- 1. Did you know you don't have to wait in line and let someone else fill out the paper work? Start with 5 quilts, complete all the paper work on your quilts, take a digital photo yourself or contact Arizona Quilt Documentation Project to schedule having photos taken of your quilts. Turn in all the paperwork to the AQDP. A Trained Database Entry Volunteer will enter your information onto the Arizona Quilt Documentation Project of the Quilt Index. http://www.quiltindex.org/

# Pattern of the Month – June 2014 By Evelyn George Jelly Roll 101, 102, 103 and more—

<u>Jelly Roll</u> = A cute, irresistible, rolled-up set of assorted  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x WOF strips (typically 40 to 42 of them, one or two of a kind, depending on the manufacturer's collection).

The colors are already coordinated for you, so you can use all of them together, to make a quilt approximately  $50'' \times 64''$ . Synonym: "Fun!"

Jelly Rolls are great for a group making charity quilts. One popular method is called the "jelly roll race". Each person starts with about 40 assorted strips, using this basic method . . . .

101 (The "Race")\* - Unroll, don't separate, just start sewing strips together end to end as they come off the stack (using either straight or diagonal seams, your choice). Have a basket on the floor nearby and just let the joined strips pile up, until they are all connected (~1600" long)! As you get started, use masking tape to stick starting end to edge of basket, then let the connected strips cascade into basket. This will make it easy to find the "beginning" to match it to the "end" after you get them all sewn into one long strip.



At <u>ONE</u> end of your long string, cut off about 20" (and discard it). IMPORTANT: <u>don't</u> cut any off at the other end. (The purpose is to stagger seams, so they won't end up right next to each other.) Then bring the two extreme ends together, and sew the two strips right sides together lengthwise, to make a very long double strip (now it's  $\sim 800$ " long). Repeat 4 more times: 4 strips wide = 400" long; 8 strips = 200"; 16 strips = 100"; 32 strips = 50" long by about 64" (with strips going across the short way; see illustration).

That's it, you're done! Unless you want to add borders to make a bigger quilt.

\*(It's because everyone is sewing so fast that it feels like a race!)

But maybe you're wondering, "What else can I do with  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " strips, something really easy but just a bit different? Lots of creative jelly roll quilts have been popping up lately, and here are a few ideas (all using the above basic technique) to get you started thinking about your next quilt.

## 102 (Simple Variations)

For an even scrappier look, cut half the WOF strips into 2 pieces and the other half into 3 pieces; toss or tumble in dryer briefly to mix them up. Combine them randomly as you sew the ends together to make the beginning long strip. (This method makes the quilt a little smaller, because there are more seams; if you want a bigger quilt, you could start with more strips.)

You can make it up as you go along, and just see what happens. If you add more strips or insert

blocks, it might make the resulting panel an odd size. If that happens, don't stop there, just keep improvising!

For example -- if the piece becomes too long and narrow to be practical, just cut some strips off one end and sew them to the side! → --If it's not long enough, divide it into two pieces (one long, one short; cut wherever you want) and insert a strip of fabric (or a row of pieced blocks) to make it longer. You could insert several strips; they could be different widths, or the same. Here are some examples:












--Or you could just add a plain border on one or more sides to make it bigger.  $\nearrow$  Improvise!

## 103 (Add-ins)

Sew contrasting squares, rectangles or 90 degree triangles between the strip ends when you join them initially. These will show up best if they have strong contrast, such as black, white, or bright colors.  $\rightarrow$ 






Leftover blocks can be inserted at the double- or quadruple-strip stage.

For example,  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " unfinished blocks can be inserted into the double strips, which measure  $4\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Cut across the double strip and sew the block into the strip. Add blocks randomly, depending on how many are available. (Pinwheels are nice!)  $\rightarrow$  If you have  $8\frac{1}{2}$ " unfinished blocks, they can be inserted into the rows that are 4 strips wide. Or, instead of pieced blocks, insert plain squares or rectangles. Add just a few, as occasional accents, or a lot, which can make the quilt grow quickly, both in size and complexity!



(Oh, my goodness—there's more—so we'll continue this theme next month!)
