PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE

There's plenty of time to work up a President's Challenge quilt! It's just 24" x 24" (or any combination that equals 96" around the perimeter.

It's Idiomatic Expressions--The second time around'

Think of one of those expressions your Mom or Grandma used to say... or look idiomatic expressions up on the internet; there's a plethora of sites. Find one that strikes your fancy and "Bob's Your Uncle", you've got your idea!

Translate that into a visual, without putting the phrase on the front of the quilt. Then, get it to me by the November meetings. (I will accept late entries up until November 30th if you make arrangements to get it to me either at my home or another drop-off site that we agree upon.)

The quilts will be displayed at the December holiday party, and voted on by the membership. I don't know how other people decide on their favorite but this is what I use for criteria for the "President's Choice" ribbon:

#1 for me is Visual Appeal. How it strikes me... very subjective I know. How well the expression was interpreted is a very close second to that, and, in case there's a tie, workmanship comes into play.

The instructions and entry form are on the website, on the left hand side in the open area; you don't need to sign in. It's the 9th one, right under Holiday Block. If you have any questions, please send me an e-mail (sekmet73@cox.net), see me at the meetings or, as a last resort, call me. 299-7201

I hope to see your entry. The challenge is so much more fun when there are lots in the pool!

The Tucson Quilters Guild Says Goodbye

This past month we lost two members who have been with the Guild for many years:

Odiemae Lucas Elliott

Joining the Guild in the mid 90's, Odie was our first black member. She had been a nurse at the VA in Tucson, and had to retire because of an on the job accident and Odie became an avid quilter. As was her nature, Odie always served her community and the quilt guild was no exception and Odie became Vice-President in 1997. At Odie's suggestion, the Guild bought insurance to protect Board members from lawsuits at this time, and has done so every year since. And before Evelyn George did Block of the Month- Odie did it in 2000! However, it became increasingly hard for Odie to come to meetings- her work accident left her lungs vulnerable and perfumes and smoke kept Odie from large public gatherings, including Guild meetings. In her will, Odie gave her fabric to the Guild and Guild members so that we could continue to make and give quilts to those in need.

Joining the Guild in 2001, Dorothy Lee lived in Tucson almost 20 years when she joined. Very active in the Pacific Rim Bee, Dorothy also donated much time to the annual Quilt Show, specifically to the Vendor Committee. In addition, her Guild friendships led to volunteering for many years with Quilt for a Cause. An avid quilter, Dorothy Lee gave of her time and talents in service to the Guild for almost 15 years. She requested donations be made to Tucson Chinese Cultural Center Senior Program.

If quilt owners request, the *Tucson Quilt Documentation* team will document their quilts. The owner must sign a release and complete three pages of owner information. Then the team takes over and documents the quilt. The documentation results are entered into the *Quilt Index* housed at Michigan State University. Quilt scholars and interested others may then access the information about a particular time period, pattern, block, or any other field of interest.

Calling for Holiday Blocks!

What idea (s) have you developed for a (cute, exciting, traditional, modern, ??) quilt block for this year's exchange? There aren't a lot of rules...bring a 12" (finished) square block (12.5" unfinished), holiday themed, any technique. Pin a label to the back of your unquilted block with "Made by: (your name)", "For: (a blank line for recipient)", and "December 2014".

Roll the labeled block onto an empty paper towel roll, wrap it in holiday paper and bring to the holiday meeting to exchange. All will be displayed for voting by members at the party. Winners will hang in the 2015 Quilt Fiesta!

Small Quilt Auction

When you submit your small quilt for auction, remember the following:

1. Design need not be original
2. Maximum perimeter 80 inches
3. Attach 2 inch hanging sleeve
4. Complete the entry form (available on website or from SQA chair)
5. If design is not original, credit the pattern designer in your artist's statement
6. Attach entry form to the quilt with a straight pin
7. Submit no later than the November Guild meetings

Enjoy the process of making the quilt with the knowledge that you will bring joy to the buyer and contribute to a worthy cause

Pattern of the Month - September 2014

TABLE ELEGANCE - Table Runner 14" x 41"



Six fabrics are used for this table runner - five colors, plus black or another dark for the sashing, border and backing. The dark fabric frames the different sections of color, creating a very modern look for this elegant table runner. Choose fabrics to coordinate with your décor (tone-on-tone batiks shown). No binding is needed, since layers are stitched together envelope style and turned, with a hidden closure on the back.

(You'll need a fat quarter each of fabrics #1-5, and $\frac{3}{4}$ yd. of #6.)

Cut carefully - notice that several different widths and lengths are cut from fabrics #1-5:



Fabric #1

Light gold

Cut one each: $3\frac{1}{2}'' \times 10''$; $3\frac{1}{2}'' \times 5\frac{1}{2}''$; $3'' \times 17''$; $2'' \times 10''$



Fabric #2

Med. gold

Cut one each: $3\frac{1}{2}'' \times 15''$; $3'' \times 17\frac{1}{2}''$; $2'' \times 12''$



Fabric #3

Med. green


Cut one each: $3\frac{1}{2}'' \times 11''$; $3'' \times 13\frac{1}{2}''$; $3'' \times 10\frac{1}{2}''$; $2'' \times 12\frac{1}{2}''$



Fabric #4

Dark green

Cut one each: $3'' \times 8\frac{1}{2}''$; $2'' \times 14\frac{1}{2}''$; $2'' \times 6\frac{1}{2}''$



Fabric #5

Red

Cut one each: $3'' \times 10\frac{1}{2}''$; $3'' \times 5\frac{1}{2}''$; $2'' \times 15''$; $2'' \times 12\frac{1}{2}''$



Fabric #6

Black

Cut 8 strips $1'' \times \text{WOF}$ (42"); reserve 7 (for long sashing and borders)


Use 1 strip to cut short sashing strips:

Cut three $1'' \times 3\frac{1}{2}''$; five $1'' \times 3''$; and five $1'' \times 2''$

Verifying measurements as you go, arrange pieces of fabrics #1-5 in the order shown, below. Place the short dark sashing strips (Fabric #6, all cut 1" wide) between the larger pieces, making sure to use correct size in each row. Using a scant $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam, stitch pieces and sashing strips together to make 5 horizontal rows; press seams toward sashing (seam allowances will fill the sashing). Then stitch long sashing strips between rows; press. Trim off uneven strip ends to square up ends of runner, and to make it measure 40" long. Add narrow dark borders to long sides first, then to ends. Press well.

3" x 5½" #5 Red	3" x 10½" #3 Med. Green	3" x 17" #1 Light Gold	3" x 8½" #4 Dark Green

Measure the completed top, and cut a piece of backing 1" longer than top, and the same width. Cut backing across the center, into two pieces; then stitch the two pieces back together using a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam, leaving a 6" opening for turning. Press seam open.



The back needs to be the same size as the top; trim back if needed so it matches top. Cut a piece of thin batting 1" longer and 1" wider than the top and back.

Layer as follows:

Batting

Runner Top, **right side up**, centered on top of batting

Back (with opening) on top of runner, **right side down** (so top and back are right sides together).

Pin carefully through all thicknesses, with fabric edges matching and a little batting showing all the way around. With batting on the bottom, stitch through all thicknesses completely around outer edge of runner, using a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance, and the walking foot, if available. Trim off excess batting even with edges of fabric, and trim a little extra off at the corners, to reduce bulk. Turn right side out through the opening, making sure corners come all the way out (use a turning tool or chopstick to poke them out). Press well. Slip-stitch the back opening closed by hand. Press. Pin baste in several places through all layers with safety pins, and quilt in the ditches of all the seams.
