She travels the country teaching and lecturing to anyone who will listen in order to share the excitement and creativity thread painting brings to her quilting world. She excels in taking the mystic out of thread painting, making it easy for anyone to master.

In addition to her husband, Tom, she has three grown sons and eight adorable grandchildren – and oh, yes three talented daughters-in-law. She spends most of her time juggling her family, quilting and teaching her passion. This passion has enriched her life and keeps her centered and focused.

Vintage Quilt Turning

The memory of the 2015 show still lingers. More information surfaced about one of the "best" quilts in the turning, the 1854 appliquéd *Cherry Wreath* quilt. Sue told visiting Marylou McDonald, Baltimore Album, textile expert, and quilt historian about the quilt. She showed her pictures. Ultimately, Merry Kay Strohm, the quilt's owner, was invited to join a Baltimore Album workshop held at *Cactus Quilts* and to bring the quilt. Merry Kay agreed.

Marylou quickly noted it was an appliquéd *Apple Wreath*, not a *Cherry Wreath* quilt. She also agreed it belonged in a museum and suggested Winterthur! Currently, Merry Kay isn't ready to part with her magnificent family quilt, but definitely will consider Winterthur for its future. To have a quilt in Winterthur, it must be made prior to 1855. Isn't it fabulous what quilts might be seen in the *Vintage Quilt Turning*?

Logging into the password site with a Mac:-updated 2/18/2015

Here are some suggestions to get your Mac or iPad to log into our site:

Using a Mac

I went to the Apple Genius Bar at LaEncantada in NW Tucson and was given this information. You are welcome to bring your device down to them for help, no charge, but an appointment needs to be made.

http://www.apple.com/retail/laencantada/ and click on Genius Bar to make an appointment For a Mac, if using the default Safari Browser version '10.10 Yosemite', go to Preferences/ Privacy/Cookies & Web, and click on "Aways Allow" This is the newsest version of Safari. You can also try the option above Always Allow, it may work for you and be less restrictive. If using an older version of Safari, follow the instructions below:

This part came from a member who was able to log in, the info came from her son:
go: Safari / Preferences / then select 'block cookies never'
Afterwards, toggle back to select 'block cookies from third parties and
advertisers'

This add-on came from another member talking about the above:
Yes it works !!! But I did need to select "Privacy" after "Preferences" in order to get cookie choices.

This came from yet another member:

The way I fixed the problem on my Mac was to download Firefox (for free). When I use Firefox instead of Safari to go online, I can get to the Guild website and log in without a problem. This might be helpful to share as some people don't want to have cookies blocked entirely. The man at the Genius Bar couldn't find anything to click on to make this work or not, it just worked.

Using an iPad or iPhone

Go to Settings/Safari/Block Cookies/Always Allow is best but can also click on Allow From Websites I Visit

Arizona Quilt Documentation Project - Tucson

In February, the documentation team documented two quilts from the *Jewish History Muse-um*. Holocaust survivors of Southern Arizona made one of the quilts. That quilt, made after 2000 included four patch blocks separated by blocks with newspaper articles printed on fabric. Some stories were about the survivors and others were regarding those that were lost. A unique embellishment in the quilt's center was a raised piece with barbwire, an artificial leaf and doves.

The second quilt from the Museum was one recognizing Jewish pioneers in the area. This quilt was donated by *Christians United for Israel* and received by the Museum in 2014. The quilt included inscriptions in Latin, Hebrew, and quotations from the Old Testament as well as other pieces of information.

A third Museum quilt, but this one from the *Arizona History Museum*, belonged to the family of team member, Rachel Lyman. Rachel brought her mother, Jane, to the documentation session so she, too could view the treasured *Pineapple* quilt made circa1850 – 1875.

Laraine Daly-Jones, Curator of Textiles at the *Arizona History Museum* managed the transport of these remarkable quilts.

Finally, team member, Shari Thompson had a quilt she and her husband made together documented. The quilt's name is *Climate Change* and was inspired by their recent trip to Alaska. 


Pattern of the Month – March 2015

Dancing Wildflowers (6" block)



In the desert, winter rains bring Spring flowers, and of course, Spring quilts filled with bright, fresh colors! Just see how quickly these blocks go together with the quick piecing method below. One simple unit, used in groups of four, makes each wildflower block. Choose a bright green fabric; and make the flowers from assorted light or bright colors. Spring is here!



- 4 $3\frac{1}{2}$ " squares flower color
- 8 2" squares green

Use diagonal corner piecing method:



1.

2.



Trim off corner, leaving $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance.

3. Single Unit (make 4)



4. Dancing Wildflower Block



- Align green square at one corner of flower color square, right sides together. Stitch through both layers, diagonally across green square from corner to corner.
- Unfold green triangle toward corner; press, with seam allowance going toward corner.
- In the same manner, add another green square on a corner next to the first one. Stitch, 2. trim and press. This makes a Single Unit (3.).
- Make 4 identical Units for each flower; arrange into a 4-patch, rotating units to make 4. the flower shape as shown. Sew the 4 Units together to make a block.

Make many different colored flower blocks and arrange as desired to make a quilt, table runner, throw, etc., adding borders as wide as you want. (Quilt illustrated above is 38" square, with 36 6" blocks and 1" borders.)
