Lyric Montgomery Kinard

My goal as an artist is to remind humanity of the strength it possesses. In a world where too often, the images we feed ourselves are full of violence and fear, I strive to uplift my audience. The tactile nature of cloth, its texture, richness and malleability are what have drawn me to this medium. Fabric has a history almost as old as humankind; we wrap ourselves in cloth every day and cover ourselves with it at night. It brings us comfort and protection, defines our individual identities.



Quilts hold a particular fascination for me. During a time when women were not allowed to express their creativity, quilts became an acceptable means of expression; works of art imbedded in an object of utility. My quilts are freed from utility, a statement about the role of women, about the world around us and our vital place in it.

Much of my work begins with plain white cloth which I dye and paint to create the palette from which my designs spring. My abstracts begin with an emphasis on color and are created on the design wall while my pictorials begin with a specific message in mind and are often meticulously drafted on paper before cloth is cut. All of my artwork is quilted to a layer of batting to add texture and to emphasize line. While traditional quilts are then bound and done, I often add more embroidery or beads and paint if the design calls for it. This further emphasizes the dimensional and tactile quality of quilts as a medium for expression.

Biography

Lyric Montgomery Kinard is an award winning artist with a passion for sparking the creativity that she knows each of her students possess. With playful support and gentle encouragement she will take you through your first steps on a new path, seeing the world through the eyes of an artist. As an artist, author, and educator she transforms cloth into art in her studio and timid spirits into confident creatives in the classroom.

Lyric was recognized for her talents as the 2011 International Association of Professional Quilters Teacher of the Year and is the author of the book Art + Quilt: design principles and creativity exercises. She has written extensively for Quilting Arts Magazine, appeared on Quilting Arts TV, and has two DVD Workshops, Surface Design Sampler Platter, and Bead It Like You Mean It. She has studied with many well-known textile artists around the country and continues to expand her skills in the area of surface design. She has a BA in English Literature from the University of Utah and has also formally studied music and architecture. She currently lives in Cary, North Carolina with her husband and some of their five children.

President's Message

Maybe it's because I've worked with the military for over thirty years or maybe it's the use of cell phone texting, but I keep thinking of certain acronyms and abbreviations. Now this relates to quilting in that I should "get the lead out" and either start planning the quilting of those two quilts or bring them to a long-arm quilter and let them figure how to finish my UFOs! Another UFO meaning was "Until Further Orders". Working with the military "orders" means you have to go do something. So taking all of my UFOs together means "Until Further Orders" I will get the lead out ("Unleaded Fuel Only") and get my "Un-Finished Objects" completed even if I take them to "Unavoidable Family Outings". I'll let you know how it goes.

From the Co-Directors: 2016 Show Dates – February 19, 20, 21

Quilt Entries: The deadline to enter a quilt in the 2016 show is October 13th or 14th at the Guild Meetings, if you plan to hand in your paperwork. If you plan to mail in your entry forms they must be post marked by Friday October 30th.

What happens to your entry once we receive it?

First the Entry Committee enters the information from your entry form into a data base. This is done for each quilt you enter. Then the entry goes to the Judging Committee and they assign a number to each quilt based on the entry category. Then back to entries so the number can be added to the data base. Once this is done, the paperwork goes to the Hanging Committee. Once all the entries have been received, Hanging Committee begins the work of deciding how best to arrange the quilts with the space we have at TCC. As Mary Bazzano mentioned at the April meeting, we accept all quilts entered. The only way a quilt would not make it into the show is if we didn't have enough space to hang them all. Then we would be facing some very hard decisions and might have to ask that a third entry be saved for the next year's show. Should this ever happen, you would get a telephone call to let you know.

It is because of this multi-committee process that we decided to keep the entry deadline in October. We have time to get everything done, work around the Holidays, and get everything you need for turning in your quilt back to you, in a timely manner.

Updated Quilt Show Information on the WEB site.

We will post the information as soon as it is ready. We are still working on some changes to the entry form.

No Quilt Show Committee meeting in April. The next meeting will be Friday May 22nd at 10 AM at the Police Station on the corner of Alvernon and 22nd Street.

We are still looking for two volunteers to chair **Publicity and Take-Down**. If you are interested we will be happy to talk with you about it.

Vintage Quilt Turning

It's that time of year...to search for treasured quilts. No more time for napping. Quilt turnings have been around for decades. A friend of mine remembers his mother taking him to a quilt store in Walworth, Wisconsin. Since he was about 10 and he'd rather sail on Wisconsin's beautiful Lake Geneva, he wasn't much interested. However, the shop owner, Mary A. McElwain, both a quilter and quilt businesswoman, offered turnings periodically to promote fabrics and her patterns. Her staff "turned" quilts for customers to view...and then potentially purchase fabric and the pattern.

Applications to submit a quilt for the vintage quilt turning will be available on the web later this month. The submission deadline this year is either of the October Guild meetings or mailed to Sue Franklin, chair, postmarked by Friday, October 16th.

Arizona Quilt Documentation Project - Tucson

The team began documenting the quilts of the *Arizona History Museum* in March. Wow, what an exciting experience. Twenty quilts were documented. The oldest from the first half of the 19th century, a *Cross Album* friendship, had 85 signatures and also stampings. An embroidered family *Genealogy* quilt from the last quarter of the 19th century caught everyone's attention and imagination. Fascinating to envision the stories of that family!

The Goldie Tracy Richmond *Prospector*, made in 1960, was newer as was a *Postage Stamp* made in the first half of the 20th century. There were *Crazies* and appliqué quilts such as *Coxcomb* and *Rose Wreath*. Also, silk was used not just in the crazies, but in a complete quilt; likely made from silk scarves.

The *Museum* "eye candy" will continue with two more documentation days scheduled in May. Laraine Daly-Jones is to be commended for her organization and co-operation with the Tucson team on this project. More about the *Museum* quilts next month as well as the Gifford quilts that the team documented in April.

Pattern of the Month - May 2015

By Evelyn George

"Double Rainbow " - 41" × 60"

(10" wide finished rainbows, made from $2\frac{1}{2}$ " strips)

Note: Rainbow color sequence usually includes blue, but for this quilt the blue is in the background. Arrange the colors the way you want them.



5 different rainbow colors -Red, Orange, Yellow, Green, and Purple - Cut 3 $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x WOF strips of each color (WOF strips will be pieced);

<u>OR</u>, if cutting <u>lengthwise</u> strips, cut only 2 of each color, $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x 60" long)

Light Blue background fabric - $(1\frac{3}{4} \text{ yards})$. Cut three $7\frac{1}{2}$ " x 60" strips

Backing - $1\frac{3}{4}$ yards (at least 42" x 62")

Binding - 6 strips $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x WOF (these can be assorted rainbow colors, if desired)

<u>Sewing:</u> Use $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowances.

The rainbows are made with strip sets.

If using <u>WOF</u> strips: cut *one* of each color in half; add a half-strip to each whole strip, to make two 60" strips of each of the 5 colors.

If using strips cut *lengthwise*: they should already be the right length, about 60".

Make 2 strip sets in the same rainbow color order, using 5 strips in each set.

Press seams in one direction.

Alternating 3 blue background strips and 2 rainbow strip sets, sew rows together. See quilt illustration at top of page. 1
Trim ends to even up. Layer, quilt and bind.

Note:

Use your imagination - try a Triple Rainbow, with stripes going crosswise →
- or, if you have different fabrics available, make up a different strippy quilt!
