Please put the quilt title, your full name, town, year and who or why this quilt was made on the back of your quilts even if it's only with a permanent marker. You might even consider taking a picture of yourself and the recipient of the quilt, transfer it to fabric with the above information and sew it on the back too.

Quilt For A Cause

Quilt For a Cause has been blessed with the donation of 10 quilts from Gabby Giffords. After the tragic events of Jan. 8, 2011, over 40,000 tokens of love and comfort were left at spontaneous memorial sites. After cataloguing, some were selected for the permanent memorial in Tucson, while others were designated to be donated to local charities. Gabby learned about Quilt For a Cause through the Arizona Quilt Documentation Project, as her quilts were being documented, and decided to donate some of her quilts to us. The two smallest ones will be in the Small Quilt Auction at the Tucson Quilt Fiesta next February (benefiting QFaC), and the other eight will be included in the Quilt For a Cause auction at Tucson Medical Center. Many thanks and best wishes to Gabby, and her assistant, Joni Jones, who delivered the quilts to us at the May 13 Guild meeting!

QFaC has several fun events planned between now and the auction, such as Quilts in the Garden, trunk shows, and a bus trip to Road to California in January. If you would like more information about our upcoming events, or you would like to help, please stop by our table at Guild meetings and sign up to be on our email notification list.

And if you might be thinking about donating a quilt to our next auction, but would like to enter it in the quilt show first, that would be wonderful! Especially if you mention that you'll be giving it to Quilt For a Cause, because that will help publicize the auction, which has now been set for the date of October 15, 2016 at TMC. Quilt donation forms are available at meetings, and on our website, <u>quiltforacause.org</u> (where we also have photos of the quilts donated so far, as soon as we can get them up). --Thanks, quilters! We are making a difference in the fight against women's cancers!



Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson

The team documented 17 of the 19 quilts that were left at various sites after the January, 2011 shooting of Congress-woman Gabrielle Giffords. The shooting that killed six and wounded 13 generated an outpouring of grief, not only in Tucson, but also across the country. Before the documentation began, Joni Jones, from the *January 8th Memorial Foundation*, gave the group a tour of rooms surrounding the documentation area. Boxes of candles were stored in one, tiles decorated by children in another; there were varied types of memorabilia in every conceivable space. The community expression of love for Gabby was strong and evident. Joni also provided the team with breakfast, including homemade coffee cake!

Gabby and her husband Mark Kelly chose their favorite two quilts to keep. The other 17 ranged from a quilt with hand written messages on the blocks made by 6th graders at Congregation Beth Israel in Houston to one made prior to the shooting. That quilt reflected colors of a desert sunset. The maker wanted Gabby to have it for her Houston transfer for medical care so she could remember the desert. Other quilts included prayer quilts, another made by Shari Thompson (team member) and her husband Richard, and one that had the US Flag at the top and the Arizona flag on the bottom, with stars noting the names of the victims, both deceased as well as survivors.

The entire experience moved the Tucson team. Just being in the space that houses the vast memorabilia related to the shooting is incredible. Memorials were left and then collected months after the shooting and eventually carefully dismantled. Over 5000 items were archived and cataloged by volunteers. Michelle Crow, Joni Jones, and Mimi McGarey are key players in Tucson's *January 8th Memorial Foundation*. It was an honor and a pleasure to work with these dedicated women. After the documentation, each team member was presented a copy of *Together We Thrive*, a photographic essay by Janet Marcotte, commemorating the tragedy.




Pattern of the Month - June 2015

"Castle Keep" - 42" × 56"

Here's a great way to use a large scale novelty print, the kind that looks better if it's not cut up, such as a directional panel, or a print with large motifs going in many directions. Flying geese are used to make arrows in the borders, adding interest to an otherwise plain layout, and suggesting guardians all around, keeping the castle (or whatever's in the panel) safe. The quilt shown at right has a center panel that finishes 28" x 42". Borders finish at 7" wide, and include pieced and plain sections; plain sections can be lengthened or shortened as needed, to fit a different sized center panel.



Center Panel (large scale novelty fabric) - cut $28\frac{1}{2}$ " x $42\frac{1}{2}$ " (with images going the way you want)

Borders - cut:

Background (light) -

4 rectangles $7\frac{1}{2}$ " x $14\frac{1}{2}$ " (these pieces can be cut longer or shorter if needed, to fit your panel)

4 squares $7\frac{1}{2}$ x $7\frac{1}{2}$


32 squares 4" x 4" (for flying geese)

Two 2½ x WOF strips (for sides of arrow shaft)


Arrow color #1 (dark) - 8 rectangles 4" x $7\frac{1}{2}$ " (flying geese); and one $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x WOF strip (arrow shaft) Arrow color #2 (medium) - 8 rectangles 4" x $7\frac{1}{2}$ " (flying geese)

Arrows (flying geese technique)

Line up a 4" background square on top of end of 4" \times $7\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle of Arrow color #1, with <u>right sides together</u>. Stitch diagonally across square, as shown. Trim off corner, leaving a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance; unfold and press toward corner. Lay second background square on opposite end; stitch, trim and press as before. This is Arrow #1; make 8.



press





Using rectangles of Arrow color #2, add background squares as above, to make Arrow #2; make 8.

Arrow #2



<u>Arrow Shaft</u> blocks are made by strip piecing. Sew a $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x WOF strip of background color onto both long sides of $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x WOF strip of Arrow #1 color. Press seams toward center. Cut into $7\frac{1}{2}$ " squares to make Arrow Shaft blocks (need 4).



Arrow Shaft block 1

Borders

Make $\underline{4}$ identical borders, each with 4 Arrows, 1 Shaft, and larger background pieces, as shown at right. Sew borders to right and left sides of quilt first, with arrows oriented as shown in quilt illustration at top of page. Then add top and bottom borders. Finish quilt as desired.
