





As a lover of textiles, always, I was off exploring in the '90s when quilting found me. After that first encounter it took merely two months until my darkroom was transformed with a sewing machine. I was a quilter: and just a few years later I began to lecture, teach, and exhibit my quiltworks.

Quilting lets me express my vision of life's landscapes with stitched\magic. I love using my Fast-Piece AppliquéTM method to transform curved shapes of colorful fabrics, and building my quilt tops layer by layer. I sprinkle these quilt tops of custom fabrics, rich silks, hand-painted and commercial cottons with texture, and add shiny magic with yarns, beads, and wool along with found and handmade embellishments.

For me it is the transformation of the ordinary into the extraordinary that keeps me wanting more. By using the techniques I have shared in my two earlier books, Dream Landscape, and Exploring Embellish-

ments, and my new book Design, Create, Quilt, the stitching remains fast-fun and easy, giving me the gift of time to work on the long list of quilts in my head.

My quilt journey now stretches over 20 years, and I continue to love learning all the fabric magic I can find. On this journey, I have created and exhibited my work nationally and internationally, and back in 1996 I started, Quilts on the Wall: Fiber Artists, a group that continues to be a place where anyone interested in quilt art can come and learn and share.

My work has appeared in books, CD-booklets/videos and patterns where I share methods and ideas, and I am continually delighted by opportunities to share my love of transforming fabric. I have been a contributor to Quilting Arts, Quilters Newsletter, Quilters Home, American Quilter, Quilts Japan, and Generation Q magazines, and I had a blast sharing my techniques and my quilts while appearing on Simply Quilts, The Quilt Show, and the Quilt out Loud quilt programs. At any point you may see my quilts, as they continue to appear in solo exhibits, quilt festivals, galleries.

The passion of creating anew, creating something important to the maker is a joyful experience that I always try to pass on in my presentations and workshops. My lectures and workshops are designed to help quilters and non-quilters alike find innovated ways to express themselves while creatively exploring new techniques and building new skills.

Mostly, I love opportunities to share my love and excitement of all things 'stitched'.

Quilt-a-Thon

What exactly is Quilt-a-Thon? On August 13, 1997, the Tucson Quilters Guild began an experimental project that has since blossomed into a favorite annual event for our members. We spend the evening or day of our regular August general meetings in air-conditioned bliss, making as many quilts as possible.

Prior to the Quilt-a-Thon, patterns are selected, kits are assembled and packaged for sewing tops. The tops are constructed by member volunteers. Then, during the Quilt-a-Thon, we layer and tie the quilts. Last year, we produced 130 child-size quilts and collected 16 twin-size quilts, donated to Sister Jose Women's Center and the Banner Universty Medical Diamond Children's Center.

Although August seems far away, we are looking for help in three areas.

- 1) Committee volunteers. Help us select the recipient charity, host cutting parties, help out during the Quilt-a-Thon. If you work 9 to 5 or if you are a snowbird, you are welcome! We'll find ways you can help.
- 2) Charity selection. For practical reasons, most of the quilts we produce vary from 36" x 36" to 42" by 60". These sizes make nice children's quilts or lap robes for the elderly. If you know of an organization that could make good use of quilts in these sizes, please let us know. With hundreds of members, there have to be a lot of good ideas out there that we might not consider without your input.
- 3) Fabric donations (and supplies). Last year's successful Quilt-a-Thon made quite a dent in the Guild fabric stash. We are looking for yardage to make quilt backs, half yard cuts and larger for kits, even bags of squares neatly cut and packaged to make quilt tops. Please don't donate those bins of small scraps that you don't know what to do with but can't bear to throw away! Bright colors are always a winner. Whether we look for darker colored or novelty fabrics depends on the selected charity.

Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson By Sue Franklin

In November, the team held the second Public Documentation of the year at the *Arizona History Museum*. Similar to *Museum* documentations, a public documentation is like Christmas as one never knows what fabulous quilts will be seen. This time, 23 quilts were brought by 15 people. Two were from the heart of Amish country, including a lovely Amish *Lemoyne Star Medallion*. The owner, who collects Amish quilts, vowed to return in April for the next public documentation with two more from her collection. She was impressed by the knowledge of the team.

Other quilts were well loved family heirlooms such as *Friendship Star* and *Double Z*. We had a second *Double Z*, it looked quite different. Another owner, her third time at a public documentation, was having family quilts documented in order that her children had a good record of their inheritance. She brought *Scrappy Trips Around the World* and *Dresden Plate*.

One quilt was made to honor an individual, while still another, *My Southwest Rhapsody*, was a prize winner for its owner. There were two *Maple Leaf* quilts, but they didn't look at all alike. Also, there were two *Dresden Plates*; for one, the owner simply called her quilt, *Grandma's Quilt*.

Most quilters have made *Log Cabin* quilts. Have you ever seen a *Pink Log Cabin* quilt? The team documented one. Also, a silk *Log Cabin* beauty was done as well. That quilt included a kimono over 100 years old!

Reading this, a reaction might be, public documentation is the cat's pajamas...well, guess what, *Phil's Pajama's* were documented. This quilt was made entirely of Phil's pajamas when he was a child. Others included *Family Tree* and a *Quadruple Irish Chain with Embroidered Flowers*.

The team is open-minded, but the group that documented a gorgeous *Hawaiian* quilt were amazed a man did it! I was called over to inspect the tiny stitches and also to explain, that indeed, the person who made it was a man, even though it was registered under his wife's name. It helped that I knew the couple.

Ending our day, we had a *Texas Star*, a *Fan*, and a *Double Wedding Ring*. Now, the team waits patiently for more *Museum* or public documentations to see what treats await!

Pattern of the Month - January 2016

Denim Market Tote

 \sim 12" \times 7" \times 14" tall

If your New Year's resolution is to cut down on the number of plastic bags you use, here's a quick way to make a very durable and useful tote you can take to the supermarket. You'll want to keep a couple of these in the car—they also come in handy at the Farmer's Market, Street Fair, or any number of places where you find yourself needing a good strong bag. Whether you repurpose a pair of cast-off jeans, or use new fabric, you'll soon be on your way to saying "No thanks" to the "Paper or plastic?" question!

This standard size grocery bag uses 1 pair men's size 42 wide-leg jeans. *(Or, 1 yard of 48" WOF fabric is enough for 2 bags.)
Use any sturdy, washable fabric that your machine can handle.
You'll also need a fat quarter of lighter weight fabric for trim;



jeans thread or other strong thread, such as Coats and Clark Dual Duty XP (regular or heavy duty); and a #90/14 jeans or topstitch needle.

(Suggestions: Test your fabric/needle/thread combo first; increase stitch length slightly, to about 2.8; and if presser foot is adjustable, experiment with reducing pressure a little; remember to put it back to normal afterward.)

Cutting:

Starting with a large pair of jeans, cut off the lower legs, measuring 18" up from the hem. Remove inseams, but leave the side seams and hems. Trim each leg piece to 20" wide; the hems will become the top edge of the bag. It's best to avoid using the thick, flat-felled inseams, because they are hard to stitch over; but the side seams are usually OK, and are straighter, as well.

*(If using yardage, cut one rectangle of denim fabric 35" long x 20" wide, for each bag.) Cut 2 denim strips $3" \times 15"$ for handles.

From trim fabric, cut 2 strips $2\frac{1}{2}$ " \times 15" for handle trim.

From trim fabric, cut 2 strips 2" \times 18" for binding side seams; one 2" \times 15" strip for binding bottom seam; and two bias strips 2" \times 8" for binding bottom corner seams (optional).

Optional Pocket: Cut desired size + hem and seam allowances, from denim or trim fabric.

The jeans hems will be used as the top edge of the bag. At the lower corners of each bag side, mark a $3\frac{1}{2}$ " square, with two sides of the square being the cut edges of the rectangle; cut out squares. This will shape the box bottom of the bag.

*(If using yardage, fold piece in half so center is at bottom and cut a 3" \times $3\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle from both thicknesses at the fold, with the 3" measurement on the raw edge and the $3\frac{1}{2}$ " measurement on the fold. After attaching handles, skip bottom seam, and go directly to side seams.)

(If you are adding a pocket, now is the time to sew it to the center of one side of the bag.)

Make and Attach Handles: Press each denim handle strip so that raw edges meet at center of the strip, with right sides out. Press each strip of trim in the same way, raw edges meeting at center. Lay trim strip on top of handle strip so all raw edges are inside, and a little denim shows at edges. Stitch trim to handle, stitching close to folds. Trim handles to equal lengths, about 14" to 15" each. Cover raw edges of handle ends with a 3" square of trim fabric, folding under raw edges and stitching down to cover ends of handles.

Measure to find center of each side of bag at upper edge (if there is a seam, it might not be exactly in the center). On outside of bag, center and pin handles in position 2" below upper edge of bag, with 5" of space between them, one handle on front of bag and one on back. Make sure handles are not twisted, then stitch onto bag, stitching a 1" square with an X in the center, at the end of each handle.

Construct Bag (note: Use $\frac{1}{2}$ " seam allowances throughout)

Bottom Seam: Align the two bottom edges of bag, <u>wrong sides together</u>, and stitch a $\frac{1}{2}$ " seam. The seam will be on the outside of the bag; press it open, with steam, to make it nice and flat. Press raw edges to meet in center of each 2" wide binding strip, with right sides out. Center a strip of binding over flattened seam; tuck folded edges of binding behind denim seam edges, to completely cover them. Pin in place, and stitch close to fold through all thicknesses along both edges, stitching binding and seam to bag. This reinforces the bag, and the binding also makes a decorative trim on the outside of the bag!

Side seams: Stitch in the same manner, starting with <u>wrong sides together</u>, so when binding is applied, it will form a decorative trim on the outside as it did before. Add trim in the same way, folding binding edges under the denim seam edges; and extend the trim strip about 2" above the upper edge of bag. Stitch through all thicknesses to bind and trim as you did at bag bottom; fold 2" end of strip over top edge to inside of bag, turn end under and stitch in place about 1" below top of bag. The second side will be more difficult, as you will be sewing down into the bag, but just check carefully, making sure binding is covering seam evenly, and flattening out bag as you go, to make sure you only sew what you intend.

To make the box bottom: Turn bag wrong side out. At one lower corner, bring the bottom seam to the side seam, this time right sides together, matching seams at center; stitch together, using a $\frac{1}{2}$ " seam. It will be thick, so stitch slowly and carefully. Repeat at other corner of bag. These short seams can be covered with a raw edge 2" wide bias strip, wrapping it over the entire stitched seam to cover it, and stitching through all thicknesses close to the original seam line. If this is too much of a challenge for your machine, omit the binding, or add it by hand. This is a utility bag, after all!

*Notes: It's easy to vary the bag size depending on your preference and the jean sizes available. Thrift stores may be a good source for larger pairs of jeans or skirts, yielding a good amount of usable denim.
