
SMALL QUILT AUCTION COMMITTEE

VINTAGE QUILT TURNING



MARCH SPEAKER: Vikki Pignatelli

Vikki entered the world of quilting in 1991 at the urging of her sister and fellow quilter, Augie Ellis. A non-sewer at the time, Vikki attended a beginner's class and quickly fell in love with the art of quilting. Now a full-time professional quilt-artist, designer, international teacher, lecturer and author, Vikki and her quilts have been featured in many books, national publications and exhibitions. She has won 32 awards in national and international competitions and exhibitions including a first place award in Art Large for Portrait of my Soul at the International Quilt Festival at Houston and Best Color and Design for Passages of the Spirit in the 2002 NQA annual show

A self-taught artist with experience in painting (watercolor and oils) and sculpture, Vikki enjoys a passion for color and flowing designs. She developed a simple layering technique that is a blend of piecing and appliqué. She is the author of two books featuring this technique, "Quilting Curves" (Quilt Digest Press, 2001) and "Quilting By Improvisation" (Dragon Threads, 2006). Also, Vikki has written "how-to" articles published in Quilting Arts, Quilter's Newsletter, and AOS magazines.

Vikki also founded the national biennial **Sacred Threads Quilt Exhibitions** in 1999. She and chairwoman, Wendy Bynner, developed the vision for the two-week display of original artwork that explores themes of spirituality, joy, inspiration, peace, healing and grief. The show is now held in Herndon, VA, outside Washington, D.C.

Deeply influenced by her husband's bout with cancer and his recovery in 1993, most of Vikki's artwork now focuses on the themes of healing, spirituality, hope, and inspiration. In her writings and teaching, Vikki's focus is to inspire, nurture and develop the artistry and self-confidence within each quilter.

Vikki's lecture on Tuesday at 7pm or Wed 9:30am will be "Nurture your Creative Spirit".

She will teach a workshop on Thursday March 10th 9am-3:30pm called "Crazy about Curves-The Basics".

On Friday, March 11th 9am-3:30pm she will teach "Adding Dimension and Manipulation to Quilt-The Basics"

Quilt Fiesta! Thanks, Quilt Fiesta! Quilt For a Cause had a wonderful time at the show!

Special congratulations to Janet Pugh, whose beautiful Asian-inspired quilt, "Waiting", was chosen for the first Dorothy Lee Memorial Award, sponsored jointly by Quilt For a Cause, Pacific Rim Bee, and Tucson Quilt Fiesta. And of course we're pleased that our own QFaC Board quilt, "Priceless", in honor of Dorothy Lee, won a judges' blue ribbon on its way to the QFaC Auction.

Thanks, TQG members, for buying our patterns and donating quilts for the auction. We introduced 2 new patterns at the show: "Arizona Sunset" by Karen Kelter and "Bunny Bag" by Mary Wetmore. If you missed getting yours, please visit our table at Guild meetings. We now have 14 beautiful patterns available!

We are still accepting quilts for the auction, through August 1. Quilts are then offered for sale on our website as well as around the community until mid-September, when they will be hung at TMC for a month with their silent auction bid sheets or Buy Me Now price tags. Spotlight: Retiring TQG Newsletter Editor Joey Nakagawa

Joey Nakagawa joined the Tucson Quilters Guild in March 2003 and met many members at the new members' tea in May. In subsequent years she mentored other new members.

In December 2007 she got to know the Quilt Show Entries Chairperson Sheila Robinson and signed on to help her; however, by April Sheila resigned and Joey took her place as Entries Chairperson. It was a position that Joey fulfilled for the next 5 years!

The first year was tough. Joey's father was dying of cancer so she spent several months in Hawaii helping her brother to take care of both parents while still working on the quilt show entries. By 2012 Ginny Dove was helping Joey with the quilt show entries and eventually took over the position.

By October 2013 Joey was ready to take on a new position in the Guild so Maggie Newman, who had recently taken on a new full time job, suggested that she take over as Newsletter Editor. Since Joey had previously worked on newsletters it was easy for her to slip into this new position. Joey continued as editor for 3 years.

In 2014 Joey became a new Granny and spent three months in Connecticut to welcome her new grandson Rupert while still working on the newsletter. In 2015 she spent five months in Connecticut babysitting Rupert, cleaning the house, cooking, and still working on the newsletter. Reminder: Charity Project Request!



Projects due at April Meeting

My daughter, Ann, who works at the Lawton/Ft. Sill Veterans Center in Lawton, OK, has asked for 'Fidget Quilts' for some of their Alzheimer/Dementia residents. The majority of residents in this home are men since it is a home for military veterans. Keeping this population in mind, the focus for these little quilts should be more masculine. The quilts need to be washable and sturdy. They do NOT need to be 'show quality'!

Guidelines and suggestions for these quilts:

Size – 18” to 24” square. This can be a nine patch of 6” finished squares, a 16 patch of either 6” finished squares, or 5” finished squares, or a 25 patch of 4” finished squares.

Fabric choices – These can be of many different fabric types and textures – corduroy, fleece, Minke, softer upholstery fabrics, denim, flannels and cottons. The cottons should have visually interesting prints, or could be incorporated in a simple pieced block. Patriotic prints can be used as well.

Embellishments – Ribbon loops, ribbons for tying into bows, rick rack, Velcro strips, Prairie Points, a bow tie, a 'tail' of an old necktie (even the right side of the skinny back part), drapery findings (ball fringe, tassels), eyelets with laces (tack the lace down at the top or bottom so it does not get lost). Given the veteran population, patches from any of the branches of service could be appliquéd onto a square. A pocket could be included – I purchased a pair of child's jeans at Goodwill for the hip pockets and for the denim. I have added a 'Teenie Beanie' baby from a McDonald's promotion securely tacked down. For more ideas, you can do a web search for Alzheimer's Fidget Quilts to see what others have done. I saw one with an attached (top and bottom) cord and large wooden spools that slide up and down on the cord. Use your imagination and have fun!

Backing – Please use either flannel or fleece to help the quilt stay on a lap. These fabrics aren't as slippery as woven cottons.

Finishing – Batting is not required or recommended, especially with the flannel or fleece backings. The quilt top and backing can be sandwiched either with right sides together and stitched around the edges, pillowcase style, then turned right side out and slip stitch the opening closed, or the top and backing can be sandwiched with the wrong sides together and bound – I used a package of extra wide double fold bias tape for binding. As a final step, or before applying the binding, quilt in the ditch along the seams between the blocks to hold the top and backing together.

Do not use – For safety's sake please do not use any zippers, buttons or small charms or beads as embellishments. Make these quilts much as you would for a small child.

The quilts will be collected at the April meetings to be mailed to Oklahoma. Thanks in advance for all your help. –

Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson

At the February meeting, the team learned more about the *Arizona Quilt Study* Regional meeting on March 19 at the *Gilbert Historical Museum*. There will be a silent auction and also lectures on quilt restoration and stabilization. Sue Franklin will coordinate a quilt turning and is looking for volunteers to help.

The continuing education, presented by Sue, was on chintz. She shared her circa 1830-40 *8 point LeMoyne Star* crib quilt that contains three different glazed chintz fabrics. The quilt, in pristine condition, likely came from a wealthy family. It is beautifully quilted with a diagonal grid about 3/8" – 1/2" for both sashing and borders. Chintz first was introduced to the Europeans from India in the 1600s. They were fascinated with its lustrous color and beauty. Used in Europe for upper class women and men's clothing, it eventually became popular for bed coverings, too. Because it was costly, it frequently was used for appliquéd rather than pieced quilts. Chintz was widely popular in the late 18th century and until about 1850.

The team documented four quilts. First on the docket was the *English Center Frame crib quilt* owned by Sue Franklin. Next, another crib quilt of Sue's, *Mother Goose Land*, was a whimsical appliquéd and embroidered piece. Third, was a bed quilt, *Pieced Tulips*, that owner, Kate Clark, remembers sleeping under as a child. The final quilt was a small wall hanging, made by Sue, entitled *The Reverend Best Cornucopia*, a Baltimore Album block.

Later in February, at set up day of *Quilt Fiesta*, some team members documented eight of the 16 *Vintage Quilt Turning* quilts. These include the following, all owned by Guild members. Katie Ammon had two, *Trip around the World* and *Sunflower*, also known as *Carpenter's Wheel*. Judy Breneman shared an *Improved Nine Patch*, made by her great grandmother. *Bricks*, a simple, but stunning quilt from the 1930s was loaned by Patty Goodsell. Believe it or not, Patty paid less than \$50 in the 1980s! Sisters, Claudia Colton and Marilyn McConnell were given two lovely quilts by a family member. Claudia's quilt, *Turkey Tracks* or *Wandering Foot*, was from the early 19th century, while Marilyn's was a lovely *Hanging Baskets* from either the last quarter of the 19th century or early 20th century.

Roberta Sipes shared a magnificent lace trimmed *Crazy* that she found on EBay. I think I need to start checking out that site. The final quilt documented, a lovely *Rose of Sharon* from the last quarter of the 19th century, belonged to Eileen Mechling. The green had faded to grey, but that didn't detract a bit from the quilt's beauty.

New members are welcome. Also, if you'd like to just come to watch and view the process; that is possible, too. Training sessions are held monthly from 9:30 until 12:30 at the *Ellie Towne Flowing Wells Community Center* on Ruthrauff Road. Information about quilt documentation teams throughout Arizona may be obtained from Lynn Miller at either 480.632.2819 or azquilt doc@yahoo.com. Lynn always needs people familiar with the computer to aid her with data entry for the Quilt Index. Lynn can do distance training which takes a couple hours.



SUMMER SURPRISE MYSTERY QUILT!

MARCH 2016 – Clue 2 and Clue 3

<p>Clue 2</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Make 40 half-square triangles, 3½" x 3½", using Background Fabric and Fabric 1. Figure A Note: You may use any method you wish. 2. Make 40 half-square triangles, 3½" x 3½", using Background and Fabric 2. Figure B 	<p>Figure A</p> 	<p>Figure B</p> 
<p>My method</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. I cut strips 1" larger than the finished size of the half-square triangle. So I would cut 4" strips of Fabric 1 and Background Fabric (two strips of each). 2. Cut strips into squares 4" x 4". Each pair of squares will give you two half-square triangles. Since we need 40, we will need 20 4" x 4" squares of each fabric. 3. Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the Background Fabric from corner to opposite corner. Figure C 4. Place right sides together and stitch ¼" on each side of the diagonal line. Cut on the diagonal line and you have two half-square triangle blocks. Figure D 5. Press and square to 3½" x 3½" 	<p>Figure C</p> 	<p>Figure D</p> 
<p>Clue 3</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Cut 3 strips Background Fabric 3½" wide. Cut into 30 squares 3½" x 3½". Figure A 2. Use Background square and Fabric 1 half-square triangle to make Figure B. You will make 30. Save the other Fabric 1 half-squares for another clue. 3. Use pieces from step 2 to make 15 four-patches like Figure C. 	<p>Figure A</p> 	<p>Figure B</p>  <p>Figure C</p> 
<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Cut 3 strips Background Fabric 3½" wide. Cut into 32 squares 3½" x 3½". Figure E 2. Use Background squares and 32 half-square triangles of Fabric 2 to make Figure F. Make 32; save the other Fabric 2 half-squares for another clue. 3. Celebrate National Quilting Day!






