

## Fiscal Year 2015/2016 Grant Awards



The Grants committee met in May to review four grant applications. The TQG budget had \$10,000 allocated for grant awards for the 2015/2016 budget year. The committee selected two recipients for the grants for the current fiscal year.

\$2,000 has been awarded to the Smoki Museum in Prescott to be used to help defray expenses incurred by the Hopi quilters during the show. The exhibit, titled Clay to Cloth, shows the transition of ancient designs into the contemporary art form of quilting. During the exhibit, on one weekend each month there will be demonstrations given by Hopi quilters. This special exhibit runs from August 6<sup>th</sup> to December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2016

\$8,000 has been awarded to the Arizona History Museum to be used towards the preservation of historical quilts through improved storage facilities, repair, and cleaning.

I scheduled not just one, but three cutting parties and you came, not only to cut, but with more fabric as well. I passed out dozens of kits for quilt tops and they're coming back with a vengeance.

Just a few details about the actual Quilt-a-Thon. It takes place in August on our normal meeting dates. In particular, we'll be meeting on Tuesday, August 9, ~6:30-9:00 p.m. and on Wednesday, August 10, ~9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. If you can't stay the entire time, just come when you can and leave when you must.

Our wonderful hospitality committee provides light refreshments on Tuesday evening and lunch on Wednesday. To help them plan, we'd like an approximate headcount of those who will be attending. If you haven't already signed up, please do so at our July meetings. If you won't be there in July, drop me a note or give me a call.

As for what to bring, most importantly, yourself. Above and beyond this, we'll need some of you to bring sewing machines to sew the layers together before tying. If you are bringing your sewing machine, also bring the usual supplies--snips, thread, spare needles, etc. For tying, you might want a pair of scissors for clipping thread, a thimble if you use one, and, if you're an experienced, particular ty-er, your favorite tying needle. If you'd prefer to help with layering and turning things right-side out, you might want cutting supplies (rotary cutters, mats, rulers, fabric scissors). Having said all this, we have scissors, needles, thread, and rotary cutting needs, so if all you can bring is yourself, we're set!

## What is this?



At a recent Guild Business meetup our Guild logo arose and as might be a question that more ing, the question of what made your historian, I thought it than one person might have so

I want to give the readers of this newsletter a little better understanding of our logo. Not many members at that Business meeting knew the history, so I doubt that overall many members know where and how this logo became associated with the Tucson Quilters Guild.

The earliest version of this logo appeared in the November 1983 newsletter when we were called the Quilters Guild of Tucson. The Cactus Flower block which is the centerpiece of our logo was on its side and our President was Cheryl Sisco. By April, the Cactus Flower was on point, as it appears in our logo. But how did this pattern become associated with us? One of our members, in the 1980's was Ilene Laurie Sivers, who went by her two husbands names- Laurie Sivers. Yes, Laurie was her first husband's last name, which Ilene used when she married him. Then when she remarried, she took her husband Tom's last name also, and was then pleased to drop the name Ilene (which she professed to hate) and became known as Laurie Sivers.

Laurie was a pattern designer and had her own business, Cactus Flower Designs. Her business Logo was the Cactus Flower block on its side, just like our earliest logo version. She submitted her logo to the membership as a possible logo, and it was accepted in 1983. In 1984, the Quilters Guild of Tucson incorporated and when Laurie became President of the Guild in 1986, she wrapped that name around the logo and it remained until April of 1987. Because of complications with the non-profit filing of our application, in April of that year we refiled our application for non-profit status with the US Government as the Tucson Quilters Guild, Inc. The logo then became the Cactus Flower Block with those words wrapped around the circle that enclosed the block. This has therefore been our logo since we came into existence in 1987.


## **Holiday Blocks**

## Vintage Quilt Turning



We would like to have an even number of people on each day. This also allows us to open up more spaces for this popular workshop.



## Reminder: President's Challenge

So here are the "rules" for this year's President's Challenge, **In My Rose Garden:** 

- 1. Size of quilt is 24" by 24". Let's keep to this size to help the Hanging Committee at the quilt show.
- 2. There must be at least one rose, in the quilt that can be seen clearly. Fabric that contains roses does not count as a rose.
- 3. Any type of quilt is acceptable—appliqué, pieced, art, whole cloth, etc.
- 4. Quilt must have a hanging sleeve and a label containing quilt maker's name and title of the quilt. Additional information on the label is fine.
- 5. Challenge Hangtag applications/information is due by the November meetings. More details will be coming.
- 6. Quilts will be turned in to the President and displayed at the January meetings. Finalists will be also displayed at the February meetings. All quilts will be received in a cloth bag with the quilter's name on the edge.
- 7. President will be responsible (maintain custody) for all President's Challenge quilts and will ensure that they are hung at the Quilt Show. Challenge quilts will be returned to maker at the end of the show in their bag.
- 8. President reserves the right to refuse any quilt that does not follow these rules.









#### Arizona Quilt Documentation Project - Tucson

At the June meeting, Terry led the continuing education on *Toile*. *Toile* originated in Ireland, but now is associated with France. Toile typically is on a cream ground with classical pastoral scenes. Terry shared a wonderful reference *The Thames and Hudson Manual of Textile Printing* (1974) by Joyce Storey from the Glouster Library that included examples of block and roller printing. She also brought vintage toile examples. Several other team members contributed to the show and tell of toile with reproductive samples.

Quilts documented included Sheryl's *Camas Prairie Wind* quilt, a *Quilt Fiesta winner*, and her companion miniature, *Camas Prairie Breeze*. Judy had a polyester quilt she called *Methodist Sewing Circle*. She said it had been made for invalids. Terry's offering was huge! It was a *Candlewicking and Old Lace* beauty that she found in the Mennonite country of Indiana. Sue brought two. One, the team said, was totally out of character for her. It was a *1950s Nine Patch*...with the neon colors of that time. Her other quilt "fit." It was a hand quilted wall hanging, *Rabbits Prefer Chocolate*, a winner at *Quilt Fiesta* a number of years ago.

## Pattern of the Month - July 2016 By Evelyn George

### String Diamonds

(quilt block  $7\frac{1}{2}$ " finished size)

Can you make diamonds without cutting diamonds? Yes you can, if you make them from strings and squares! The scrappy diamonds appear magically when you put 4 blocks together, and to top it off, you get a star design, too! I chose lots of bright fabrics, including black and white prints, for these scrappy blocks.





Here's the easy string-piecing method:

#### For each block cut:

An 8" square of lightweight muslin (foundation)


2 strips black and white print  $1\frac{1}{4}$ " ×  $10\frac{1}{2}$ " (accent)

2 assorted strips  $1\frac{3}{4}$ "  $\times$  9"

2 assorted strips  $1" \times 6"$ 

2 assorted strips  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x 5" (corners)

1 solid-colored center wedge - make pattern as follows:



Fold a  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x 12" strip of paper in half the skinny way. Lay a ruler from the open corner at one end, angling down to  $\frac{1}{2}$ " away from the folded corner at other end (above, left). Cut, unfold; it should make a wedge 12" long,  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " wide at one end and 1" wide at the other. Use as a pattern to cut fabric wedges.

Center a wedge, right side up, diagonally across the 8" foundation square from corner to corner (lift ends and check from the underside to make sure it is centered over both corners; put a couple of pins down the center to keep it there while you add the next strips.)

Line up a black and white (accent) strip along right hand edge of the wedge, with right sides together and raw edges matching. Using  $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam, stitch the two pieces onto the muslin square. Open out strip and press. Repeat on other side of wedge, with another black and white strip.

Continue adding assorted strips to completely cover foundation square, pressing after each. (Add strips in decreasing order of length, as listed for cutting, above.)

From wrong side, trim and square up block to 8". Make 48 blocks. Arrange in diamond layout as shown, to make a quilt 45"  $\times$  60. When joining blocks for quilt, press seams open to reduce bulk.

Tips: Preshrink muslin, and starch the foundation squares. If using scraps, strings can be assorted, random sizes. To add a cohesive design element, make center wedges all one color, and/or use a strongly contrasting fabric for accent strips. --- For more on string piecing, see POM September 2013.
