#### MARCH SPEAKER: JENNY LYON



Jenny has been joyfully teaching the art of quilting since 2006. Her classes are encouraging, supportive, and light-hearted. She loves seeing her students realize that they CAN quilt their own work.

Jenny has been working with fabric since she was a little girl trying to make her own clothes. She hails from a long line of

traditional bed quilt makers, but she didn't take a formal class in quilting until 1983. She "re-entered" quilting in 1999 and that one class unleashed a need to create that has not stopped.

She uses her domestic sewing machine to create art quilts and wearable art. Jenny's work has been juried into the Houston International Quilt Festival, Pacific International Quilt Festival, AQS in Paducah, the Curitiba Quilt Show in Brazil, and has shown in several art galleries as well as SAQA exhibits. Some of her work is held by private collectors.

Jenny lives in Northern California with her oh-so-patient hubby and their Basset boy. Their two grown sons have left the nest to become men, leaving more room for books, fabric and notions.


#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE




#### **Quilt Show Hardware:**






#### **RAFFLE TICKETS:**


The show was beautiful and we had a good turnout in spite of the weather.



#### MEMBER AT LARGE ANSWERS YOUR QUESTIONS

Kay and Evelyn have received a number of interesting questions lately! We're bringing you some answers here in your Newsletters:

Q: As a new member, I'm finding it difficult to get acquainted with other members....

A: We are a large Guild! Kay would like to remind everyone to please wear their name tags to the meetings. And, here are some great suggestions from Membership Chair, Kathy Barton:

- 1) Play the New Member Game. Yes, that's right.....It's back. In the New Member Packet you will find a set of 8 cards with instructions on who you should introduce yourself to. Fill out the card with your name and the name of your new quilting friend and return it to the membership table. At the break we will hold a drawing and if your card is drawn, both you and the other member will receive a prize.
- 2) Volunteer. There is no better way to meet other Guild members than to get involved with our myriad Guild activities. There are many jobs that don't require a lot of time throughout the year and any help is welcome.
- 3) Consider joining a Bee. There is a complete list of affiliated Bees on our website. Although some may not be open at this time, there may be an opening in the future. Contact them and express your interest.
- 4) Make it a point to attend workshops and informal meetings like the Holiday Party and Quilt-A-Thon. There is a lot more dialog in this setting.
- 5) Still want more? Ask for a sponsor. Contact the Membership Chair (Kathy Barton) and she will find an experienced Guild member who will introduce you to people who share your interests.

Q: Free admission to Quilt Show is given to hostesses. Why not offer free Show admission to those who do other Quilt Show jobs, particularly those that you're begging for people to help with?

A: This question was presented to the Quilt Show Committee at the January 27, 2017 meeting, where it was discussed and a vote taken. Here's their reply:

The Quilt Show Committee voted to maintain the current policy of giving free entry to Guild members who volunteer to work when the show is open, but not at times that the Show is not open. It is a responsibility of Guild membership to be willing to help with Guild activities to the extent that you are able. Members who volunteer during the hours that the Quilt Show is open are giving their time when they might otherwise be enjoying the Show. For this they are given free entry on the day of their shift. Non-Guild members can also sign up to help during the Show and receive free entry on the day of their shift. The other volunteer opportunities take place during non-Show hours. The need for volunteer help gets intense during Show week. The Quilt Fiesta is our largest and most public activity that showcases our Guild. As members of the Guild we have a responsibility to be willing to help. Non-Members who help during Show week, when the Show is not open, get a Comp Ticket because they have no obligation to help but they come and help.

#### **Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson**

After our January break, February was business as usual with continuing education by Sue on *Crazy* quilts. Usually we think of *Crazies* belonging to the late 1800s, but the Maryland Historical Society acquired a *Kaleidoscope* quilt dated 1834. However, in the last quarter of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, a new form of needlework swept the country via books, magazines, and advertising. In short order, the new concoction, called a *Crazy*, was everywhere! It became the epitome of elegance.

There were no rules; quilters went wild with "crazy" patches and lovely needlework to hold their choices together. This method was so different from the past's precise needlework. Some *Crazies* were contained, as within squares surrounded by sashing and cornerstones. Most were not. The majority were pieced on a foundation, while others were not.

Varied fabrics were used; silks, wool, velvets, cotton, artificial, or a mix. The oldest *Crazies* were pieced and embellished by hand, although women with a sewing machine were "proud" to use them. On some *Crazies*, painted and embroidered flowers, odd little figures, pictures of children, musical scores, letters, and dates fill every available open space. For some makers, in the words of Wordsworth, "enough is always a little bit more."

BUT, did all this really begin in the 1800s? The answer is no. Centuries earlier, the *Crazy* was made as a garment. Venice's Carnival, said to have originated in 1162, contains a Harlequin, a magical character dressed in a colorful patched costume. This is one of the earliest examples of the "crazy" style. The Jester of the Middle ages also has a similar appearance in his clothing. Additionally, Japanese nobility donned *Crazy* patched clothing on occasion. Penny McMorris, author of *Crazy Quilts*, an early 20<sup>th</sup> century offering, maintains that a *Crazy* quilt is the earliest known quilt pattern.

Looking to the future, on March 13<sup>th</sup>, the team will resume documenting the quilts in the *Arizona History Museum* collection. We are likely to find *Crazies* then. You'll learn about those quilts next month. Also, the **next public documentation will be April 1<sup>st</sup>**, at the *Arizona History Museum*. Please notify either Sue or Kate Clark, 520.742.1000 to have your names on the list. Once that happens, Sue will email you the necessary paperwork and also explain what will happen.

At our February meeting we documented the following quilts. Gloria Magee's stunning blue and white *Drunkard's Path*, Kathy Hansen's lovely family *Hummingbird*, Terry Grzyb-Wysocki's impeccable *Single Irish Chain*. This quilt was billed as a crib, but more the size of a lovely doll quilt, and finally, believe it or not, Sue's *Crazy* crib quilt, with lovely examples of embroidery embellishments, including "Baby" on it.

Anyone is welcome to visit our meetings! We **love** guests. 




#### Pattern of the Month - March 2017

#### "Make it in Red and White"


We've just celebrated a year of making beautiful quilts, and enjoying them at another spectacular quilt show, and of course now it's time to start planning for the next one -- and this time it's extra special -- our  $40^{th}$  quilt show! Since the  $40^{th}$  is traditionally the Ruby Anniversary, the show committee has issued a Red and White Quilt Challenge. So, what will you make? I thought I would look back over the years of designing Block of the Month / Pattern of the Month for the Guild and revisit some of our past block designs, and perhaps inspire you to look for a block you like and then make it look spectacular in red and white. (There are over 150 simple patterns in the old newsletters and on the TQG website.) For the illustrations below, I've given the block name and referenced the newsletter issue it's in; just click on that newsletter link to find the block pattern; then make as many blocks as you like -- in red and white, of course -- and arrange as you wish. 
Dancing Shoos - BOM April 2007 (in March 2007 newsletter, p. 7)
