June Speaker: Pat Yamin



Pat Yamin, president and founder of **Come Quilt With Me**, is well known in the quilting industry. She has appeared on many television and radio quilt shows, the most recent being **The Quilt Show** with Ricky Tims and Alex Anderson. Pat's company manufactures

templates and other tools that assure accuracy and shorten the time necessary to make a quilt.

Often asked to exhibit her antique quilt collection at major quilt shows all over America, Pat's fondness for old textiles and patterns is the driving force behind her creativity. She truly believes that what is old is new again, and knows that if acrylic templates, cutting mats, and rotary cutters had been available to our quilting ancestors, they would have used them!

For more than 40 years Pat has been designing quilt patterns and templates, making quilts, teaching quilting, judging, leading seminars, and writing quilting books. *Two Patch Scrap Quilts* is her fourth quilting book. The others are *One-Patch Scrap Quilts, Back to Basics: Quilt Templates and Patterns Explained*, and *Look What I See Quilts.*

In addition to designing, teaching, traveling, and vending at quilt shows, Pat organizes and runs an annual quilting retreat each August, and Pat strongly feels that a huge part of her success is due to her loyal customers.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Members of the Tucson Quilters' Guild,

At the Wednesday morning meeting in May, during Show and Tell, three Guild members presented Threads of Resistance quilts that conveyed their personal feelings about the current national administration. While some in the audience agreed with the sentiments or at least the appropriateness of political expressions within our Guild, others were offended or wondered whether political statements are appropriate for our non-political Guild.

After considerable discussion with Board Members, Committee Chairs, and other members of the Guild, I am persuaded of two things.

First, whatever our political beliefs or affiliations, freedom of speech is a value we can all agree on. Political speech, in the form of quilts and descriptions of quilts, does not, I believe, designate our Guild as endorsing any particular political view. As President of the Guild, I would equally welcome quilts expressing other political viewpoints and I would hope that we would all respond with the same impressive civility that greeted last month's quilts.

Second, the Guild should be a safe place for us all to share, first and foremost, our love of quilting. Some have suggested that guidelines regarding inappropriate topics for quilts or inappropriate descriptions of quilts could be useful. Perhaps, but no conversation I've had on this topic leads to any agreement about what the guidelines should be. I suggest instead that



we rely on civility and mutual respect – *by speakers and listeners* – as the best way to achieve our goals. This may not leave us fully free from hearing things we don't want to hear, but it should support our being the civil community I believe we all desire.

I look forward to hearing more of your thoughts and ideas, on this or any other topic.




FINAL REPORT: SMALL QUILT AUCTION 2017 DONATIONS



In 2018, the Tucson Quilter's Guild will have their

40th Anniversary show. To honor our longevity, we are asking members to make "Ruby" quilts for a special display within the show. We want to give you plenty of time to make your quilts, so here are the rules.






<u>Color</u>: **if it reads as RED, it's RED**. White can be **white through cream**.

<u>Size</u>: no minimum, but big enough to hang. Up to 90" x 90" to fit on the hanging panels.

All techniques and styles: piecing, applique, whole cloth, cathedral window, Redwork, embellishing, and all combinations. If you know others, go for it! Make it Traditional, Modern, Art, Crazy, Landscape, Pictorial, etc., etc., etc.





Individual, two-person, and group quilts are all welcome.

Enter as non-judged, or in the appropriate judged category. Categories are generally based on technique(s) used, and/or number of people who made it.

Older, previously exhibited red and white quilts may also be entered for display only, not judging.

The hanging committee will gather all the red and white entries to hang all of them together in our special exhibit.

Last Rule: Have fun with this! I can't wait to see what we all make!

All "Lamentable" contributions are anonymous.



At the auction pictures of the originals will be displayed next to the finished "Lovely."

PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE 2018

Theme: "Let the Sunshine In"

Rules:

- Interpret the theme any way you want e.g., a break in the clouds, broken window blinds, tie-dyed t-shirts. Just, in some way that viewers will be able to identify, when told the theme, your quilt must evoke the theme of "Let the Sunshine In."
- 2. The quilt should measure no more than 100 inches around the perimeter. Any rectangular shape of that dimension is acceptable. If your quilt is not rectangular, make sure that it will fit in a rectangle that is no more than 100 inches around the perimeter.
- 3. All techniques (e.g., piecing, appliqué, whole cloth) and all genres (e.g., modern, civil war, barn sampler) are welcome.
- 4. The quilt must have a hanging sleeve and a label containing the quilt maker's name and title of the quilt. Additional information on the label is fine. Quilts must also be contained in a cloth bag to protect them from dirt or damage.
- 5. President's Challenge quilts are due by the November meetings. Each quilt must be accompanied by an entry form, included below and available on the TQG website. We will display the quilts and conduct a first vote at the November meetings. Top vote getters from both the evening and daytime meetings will be displayed again and voted on for final winners at the January meeting.
- 6. Winning quilts will be displayed at the quilt show and returned at the end of the show.







Other Organizations Associated with TQG

Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson

In May, Tucson team member, Judy Breneman, presented a *Brief History of Bed Rugs and Wool Appliqué*. She noted that in the 1700s and early 1800s rugs or "ruggs" were made not for floors, but to decorate household tables and other furniture, eventually beds. In 1810, the *Oxford English Dictionary* defined a floor rug as "a little rug for your hearth stone."

Rugs were made by varied methods. Some consisted of wool yarn sewn unto a firm ground in a looping manner while others were made with closely embroidered stitches that gave dimension without the looped style. Often, embroidery was added for further embellishment. By the middle of the 19th century, hooked rugs were popular in America. *Penny rugs* also became fashionable at that time. Details of this program are available on the AZQS web site <u>www.azquiltstudygroup.org/</u>.

Quilts documented included the following: Sandy Woods *Saguaro Harvest*, a reproduction Goldie Tracy Richmond quilt. This beauty was Sandy's first needle turned quilt. Peggy Hazard brought two quilts made by the second Guild President, Phyllis Kroggel. Peggy now owns these lovely wall hangings. One was a *Pink Sampler* and the other a *Blue Sampler*. The final quilt belonged to Sue, *Petite Dear Jane*, a wall hanging. She made this in the manner of the famous *1863 Jane Stickle* quilt, but a much smaller version.



Pattern of the Month - June 2017 "Little Folk Art Flag"

By Evelyn George

Decorate for Flag Day, Father's Day, or the Fourth of July with this little flag, measuring 20" x 13". Make a star block and cut scrappy red and white stripes from your assorted patriotic and reproduction fabrics -- it's quick to make, and so easy! First construct the star block, then you're ready to Quilt-as-You-Go!



Star Blue starry print: (1) $3\frac{1}{2}$ " square; (4) $2\frac{1}{2}$ " squares and (4) $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $3\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangles White with tiny print: (12) 2" squares Stripes Assorted reds: (4) $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x 14" strips and (3) $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x 21" strips Assorted white w/ tiny prints: (3) $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x 14" strips and (3) $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x 21" strips **Backing:** 23" × 16" **Batting:** 23" x 16" **Binding:** 2 strips $2\frac{1}{4}$ " x WOF, pieced together to make about 72"

STAR BLOCK

Center of star is a Square-in-a-Square, using the blue $3\frac{1}{2}$ " square and 4 white 2" squares. Place a white square on top of one corner of the blue square, *right sides together*, with raw edges matching. Stitch diagonally across white square from corner to corner through both thicknesses. Trim off corner, leaving a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance. Press open, pressing seam allowance toward corner. Repeat with all 4 corners, trimming and pressing each one before adding the next, to make a Square-in-a-Square Unit.

Square-in-a-Square Unit (make 1)

Make 4 Star Point Units using the same diagonal piecing method, stitching two white squares to one *long* side of each blue *rectangle*. (Add first white square; trim and press before adding the second one.)



Star Point Unit (make 4)

Arrange the parts together as shown below, and sew together in rows like a 9-patch, to make the Star Block:



(Star Block size = $7\frac{1}{2}$ " unfinished. For a different look, substitute another $7\frac{1}{2}$ " block of your choice.)



QUILT-AS-YOU-GO

Center batting on top of *wrong* side of backing fabric. Pin layers together in several places to keep from shifting while you add the fabric strips and quilt-as-you-go. Attach walking foot to machine if you have one.

Place first short red strip, *right side up*, in upper right hand corner of flag, leaving about 1" of batting showing at top and at right edge. Place a short white strip, *right side down*, on top of red strip. Pin to hold in place and stitch *lower* edge together through all layers, using a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam. Fold white strip down and press flat.

Add additional short strips in the same manner, alternating red and white, until there are 4 red and 3 white strips stitched on, to make upper section of stripes on flag *(Fig. 1).* (Be sure to remove all pins as you come to them.)




Fig. 2 - Add pre-made star block

Now place the star block on top of *left* end of quilted stripe section, *right sides together*, with raw edges aligned. Pin, making sure raw ends of stripes will be included in seam, and stitch together, *left edge only*, with a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance through all layers. Fold out star and press flat *(Fig. 2)*. Pin in place at outer corners of quilt to keep it straight while adding remaining stripes.

Continue to quilt-as-you-go, now using the long strips, starting with white, lining them up with *left* edge of star block. (Don't worry if strips come out a little uneven at the right hand end; just make sure they line up or extend a little beyond edge of star block at *left* end.) Try to keep stripes as straight as you can, but don't worry if they come out a little bit wavy, that will be just fine! This is folk art!

When all parts are stitched down, press gently on both sides. Baste outer edges in place, then trim off excess batting and backing to straighten and square up the flag *(Fig. 3)*. It should be approximately 20" x 13", give or take a bit. You can add a little quilting to the star block if you like, either before or after binding is attached. After it is all done, add a sleeve if you need one for hanging.
