
But even if you don't have a chance to let us know in advance, know that your presence and help is welcome.





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
Quilt Fiesta Co-Directors:

Hopefully everyone has been able to stay cool (and dry!) over the last weeks.



Quilt Fiesta and the Vintage Quilt Turning

Quilts from 1900 to 1920; perhaps you have some quilts from that period...it's amazing the variety made at that time. Redwork still was very popular, but patchwork was beginning to take over. Perhaps because it was faster to stitch patchwork by machine than it was to do a lovely redwork piece by hand.

In any event, vintage redwork or a red and white patchwork would be perfect to submit for the 2018 quilt turning. What better way to honor *Ruby*, the 40th anniversary of the Guild. Your quilt might be utility, made to keep families warm, or it might be a "best" quilt that was put on a bed only when company was expected. I'm lucky enough to have both a redwork and a red and white patchwork quilt. What do you have? Remember, this year it doesn't matter if the quilt has been in a previous quilt turning. What is important is that it is red and white.

Red and White Quilt Challenge for 2018 Quilt Fiesta

In 2018, the Tucson Quilter's Guild will have their **40**th **Anniversary show**. To honor our longevity, we are asking members to make "Ruby" quilts for a special display within the show. We want to give you plenty of time to make your quilts, so here are the rules.

Color: if it reads as RED, it's RED. White can be white through cream.

<u>Size</u>: no minimum, but big enough to hang. Up to 90" x 90" to fit on the hanging panels.

All techniques and styles: piecing, applique, whole cloth,

cathedral window, Redwork, embellishing, and all combinations.

If you know others, go for it! Make it Traditional, Modern, Art, Crazy, Landscape, Pictorial, etc., etc.,

Individual, two-person, and group quilts are all welcome.

Enter as non-judged, or in the appropriate judged category.

Older, previously exhibited red and white quilts may also be entered for display only, not judging.

The hanging committee will gather all the red and white entries to hang all of them together in our special exhibit.

Last Rule: Have fun with this! I can't wait to see what we all make!

PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE 2018

Theme: "Let the Sunshine In"

Rules:

- Interpret the theme any way you want e.g., a break in the clouds, broken window blinds, tie-dyed t-shirts. Just, in some way that viewers will be able to identify, when told the theme, your quilt must evoke the theme of "Let the Sunshine In."
- 2. The quilt should measure no more than 100 inches around the perimeter. Any rectangular shape of that dimension is acceptable. If your quilt is not rectangular, make sure that it will fit in a rectangle that is no more than 100 inches around the perimeter.
- 3. All techniques (e.g., piecing, appliqué, whole cloth) and all genres (e.g., modern, civil war, barn sampler) are welcome.
- 4. The quilt must have a hanging sleeve and a label containing the quilt maker's name and title of the quilt. Additional information on the label is fine. Quilts must also be contained in a cloth bag to protect them from dirt or damage.
- 5. President's Challenge quilts are due by the November meetings. Each quilt must be accompanied by an entry form, included below and available on the TQG website. We will display the quilts and conduct a first vote at the November meetings. Top vote getters from both the evening and daytime meetings will be displayed again and voted on for final winners at the January meeting.
- 6. Winning quilts will be displayed at the quilt show and returned at the end of the show.





Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson


In July the group welcomed guest Carolyn O'Bagy Davis. After a brief business meeting, Carolyn presented the continuing education program on Hopi quilts and her journey of discovery. Carolyn noted that her involvement was quite accidental. She was invited to the mesas to see some excavations, went on to visit the Hopi Indians, and began to notice the quilts. They covered ovens, roof tops, or were to sit upon, and babies were wrapped in quilts. She thought they were made by "bahanas," white women or missionaries, but they were not. In historic times, men made the blankets and clothing, not the women, because only men sewed. They spun and wove the cloth, made simple dresses, and red, green, and white woven belts to tie around the dresses.

In the 1890s quilting was introduced to the Hopis by missionaries who lived with them. Also, around that time, children were sent to boarding schools where girls learned homemaking skills including sewing and quilting, and boys acquired shop skills. Eventually, the missionaries realized that teaching quilting was the most effective way to get the Hopis to attend church. The women made quilts while the men stitched and tied thin mattresses. Today there are fourth or fifth generations of Hopi quilters, women as well as some men.

Details of this program are available on the AZQS web site www.azquiltstudygroup.org/.

Documented Hopi Quilts included the following: 1) Painted Tile, a blue ribbon quilt with corn in the husk borders and between some blocks, skilled painting by maker; 2) Hopi Pottery with Yellow and Purple (Prairie Points on two sides); 3) Painted Pottery; 4) Flat Doll, a cheerful flat doll surrounded by bright yellow sashing and red borders; turquoise ties; 5) Field Mouse Goes to War; Nine blocks surrounded by narrow black, with sashing and borders in cheery diamond print of blue yellow and orange, tells antics of Field Mouse as he goes to war. Black wool ties. 6) Morning Song Kachina; nine lovely Kachinas surrounded by sashing and borders of pots and baskets. Narrow tan binding.

Pattern of the Month - August 2017 "Fly Anywhere, Little Geese"

Quilters The accompanying paper-piecing foundation sheet is intended for your creative use, to make as many little flying geese units as you wish to incorporate into your quilts. Print as many copies as you need (and a few extra) and color the geese to coordinate with your other blocks, or make them totally scrappy if you wish. They make terrific borders or sashing strips, and there are many block possibilities, too.





Precut geese and background fabrics into $2\frac{1}{2}$ " squares and cut in half diagonally to make triangles. This size is ample for paper piecing either size triangle on the paper pattern. Use your favorite method of paper piecing. (See the November 2016 Pattern of the Month, page 2, for some tips.)


The Little Geese foundation sheet has 3 strips with 6 geese in each. Seam allowances are included around the outside of the strip. An individual "goose" measures 1"x2" and the whole strip measures 6" long by 2" wide (finished size). You can paper-piece several strips and join them together to make long strips, or you can cut off part of a paper strip to make just as many extra geese as you need. For example if you need 9" of flying geese, use one whole strip plus 3 "geese" from another strip. When cutting off part of a paper foundation strip, just remember to ADD $\frac{1}{4}$ " SEAM ALLOWANCE AT THE CUT OFF END. This will enable you to sew the shorter strip to another strip, or sew it into a block, without cutting off any points.

COPYING TIP: Use a red pen to write "master copy" on your original foundation sheet. Then make a black and white photocopy of it and hold them up to the light together to check that they are the same size. When you're sure they are, then make as many black and white copies as you need, and preserve the master copy in case you need more later!


Here are a few ideas for using your little geese:








<u>Little</u> <u>Geese</u> paper-piecing foundations (for 2" x 6" finished size flying geese units) - print full size, no scaling. (Use your favorite paper-piecing method)



Precut $2\frac{1}{2}$ " fabric squares for geese (A1) and background (A2, A3); cut all squares in half diagonally to make triangles. (They will be a little oversized.) (Need 3 squares for "geese" and 6 squares for background, for each paper strip of 6 geese.)



Solid lines are stitching lines; dotted lines are seam allowance. When cutting out the paper strips, leave a little extra paper <u>outside</u> the dotted lines; as you sew, make sure fabric covers seam allowances; trim completed unit on dotted lines.
