Sue has degrees in Textile Sciences and Agricultural Economics from University of California, Davis. She has produced an extensive and varied body of work, including hundreds of quilts, quilt art and quilted clothing, many of which are nationally exhibited.








QUILT - A - THON REPORT

There were 84 completed quilts by the end of Wednesday, although some were completed and delivered before the Quilt-a-thon. A few quilts were taken home to be completed and returned later.








DE-STASH SALE NOVEMBER 7th and 8th, 2017!!

Entry Committee



This will be our 40th anniversary quilt show; we plan to make it special by encouraging everyone to make a red and white quilt to celebrate our theme, Ruby Jubilee. If you haven't started yours yet, now is the time to do it. There will be a special exhibit of all the red and white quilts entered.

The deadline for submitting your entries is either October 10th at the evening meeting or October 11th at the daytime meeting. If entering by mail the deadline is October 27th. Fillable Show Entry Form—Step by Step Directions

Here's the "step by step" instructions to use the fillable entry form! Being able to easily read all your information will be a great help to us!

- 1. Download the "Quilt Show Packet" pdf file from the TQG website. If you don't have access to a computer, let us know. We can have blank forms available for you to fill out the "old fashioned way" at upcoming meetings.
- 2. Save the form to your computer as "2018 entry".
- 3. Open it, read the category descriptions (because they've changed)...and just start typing in the shaded areas. There are a few things you'll need to circle later, but your name and address even the quilt's description! can be typed in!
- 4. After filling in everything you can, save this as "2018 entry 1". That will preserve the original blank version so you can use it again for additional quilts.
- 5. If you have another quilt, you can either open the blank "2018 entry" again and type in the information on your second quilt and save it as "2018 entry 2", etc. OR you can download the "Quilt Show Entry Form alone" pdf file and fill it out and save it.
- 6. When you want to print out and complete your forms you only need to print out pages 3 and 4 of the Packet (the form itself). If you've also downloaded the "Entry Form alone" file as well, print out the complete file after filling it in.
- 7. Go over the filled-in forms for each of your quilts and circle what needs to be circled, and sign them.
- 8. Attach your photos and your check. Bring to a Guild meeting or mail it in!


Caption: The 2018 quilt is reversible with two color binding!

Are you teaching your child to quilt? Are they taking a class at a shop? We encourage you to start thinking of having your child or grandchildren enter his/her quilt in the Quilt Fiesta 2018. We would like to see more children's quilts entered. What a thrill for them to see their own creations displayed at the quilt show – they will be so proud when they receive their ribbon! Kids should be age 17 or younger. All work on the quilts should be done by the child. Adults may help with the quilting and binding, and provide assistance and guidance that is appropriate to the age of the child. I will have entry forms at the guild meetings, at all the local quilt shops this fall and there is a copy on our Guild website for you to print out.

<u>Deadline to turn in Kids Row entry form is November 8, 2017.</u> Quilts will be turned in by February 9, 2018.

Red and White Quilt Challenge for 2018 Quilt Fiesta

In 2018, the Tucson Quilter's Guild will have their **40**th **Anniversary show**. To honor our longevity, we are asking members to make "Ruby" quilts for a special display within the show. We want to give you plenty of time to make your quilts, so here are the rules.

Color: if it reads as RED, it's RED. White can be white through cream.

Size: no minimum, but big enough to hang. Up to 90" x 90" to fit on the hanging panels.

All techniques and styles: piecing, applique, whole cloth, cathedral window, Redwork, embellishing, and all combinations.

If you know others, go for it! Make it Traditional, Modern, Art, Crazy, Landscape, Pictorial, etc., etc.,

Individual, two-person, and group guilts are all welcome.

Enter as non-judged, or in the appropriate judged category.

Older, previously exhibited red and white quilts may also be entered for display only, not judging.

The hanging committee will gather all the red and white entries to hang all of them together in our special exhibit.

Last Rule: Have fun with this! I can't wait to see what we all make!














Small Quilt Charity Auction

Orphan blocks, workshop samples, Aunt Sadie's almost finished redwork are all candidates to becoming a small quilt for the auction. Put on a border, maybe add some embellishment, quilt it and add a 2 inch sleeve. You're done! Please include an entry form (see below) with your small quilt donation.

PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE 2018

Theme: "Let the Sunshine In"

Rules:

- 1. Interpret the theme any way you want e.g., a break in the clouds, broken window blinds, tie-dyed t-shirts. Just, in some way that viewers will be able to identify, when told the theme, your quilt must evoke the theme of "Let the Sunshine In."
- 2. The quilt should measure no more than 100 inches around the perimeter. Any rectangular shape of that dimension is acceptable. If your quilt is not rectangular, make sure that it will fit in a rectangle that is no more than 100 inches around the perimeter.
- 3. All techniques (e.g., piecing, appliqué, whole cloth) and all genres (e.g., modern, civil war, barn sampler) are welcome.
- 4. The quilt must have a hanging sleeve and a label containing the quilt maker's name and title of the quilt. Additional information on the label is fine. Quilts must also be contained in a cloth bag to protect them from dirt or damage.
- 5. President's Challenge quilts are due by the November meetings. Each quilt must be accompanied by an entry form, included below and available on the TQG website. We will display the quilts and conduct a first vote at the November meetings. Top vote getters from both the evening and daytime meetings will be displayed again and voted on for final winners at the January meeting.
- 6. Winning quilts will be displayed at the quilt show and returned at the end of the show.






The TQG Library will be open in September. Please remember to return your library books.

Other Organizations Associated with TQG

Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson

In August, the quilts were all about team member, Bea Kabler's Hopi Quilts. We learned last month, that in the 1890s, missionaries introduced quilting to the Hopis. Also, about that time, Hopi children were sent to boarding schools where girls learned homemaking skills like sewing and quilting, and boys acquired shop skills. Eventually, energies realized that teaching quilting was an effective way to get the Hopis to attend

the missionaries realized that teaching quilting was an effective way to get the Hopis to attend church. The women made quilts; the men stitched and tied thin mattresses. Today there are fourth or fifth generations of Hopi quilters, women as well as some men.

Now, let's review the 11 quilts the team documented for Bea. All Hopi block designs were hand painted by their makers; incredible talent! We began with *Vonette Katshinas* that included 21 blocks of Hopi designs and 21 plain blocks. Next, was *Hopi Pottery*. This beauty had prairie points on two sides and straight sides on the top and bottom. The block designs were taken from the maker's great great grandmother's pottery designs. Third, was *My Mother's House*, an original design by Karen Tootsie. The next quilt "read" purple; there were many 1930s prints in this one. However, the blocks didn't sell well, so Bea took pity, bought them, and turned them into this quilt she calls *Bonnie's Purple Blocks*. The fifth quilt, another Hopi pottery beauty is *Blue Nampeyo Pottery* and has nine painted blocks with the original design by Bonnie Nampeyo. It has prairie points on the sides and a straight top and bottom. Number six is titled *Butterfly Maiden Kachina* and has nine blocks. The Katsinas on the quilt are butterfly maidens. It is a tied red, white, and blue quilt.

The seventh quilt is *Black Spider*, a striking nine block quilt with turquoise sashing and red and black spiders. Bernadette Poleahala designed it. The next is another *Hopi Pottery* quilt with the blocks designed by Bonnie Nampeyo Chapella and the quilting done by Bea. The ninth quilt is *Nampeyo's Designs* and consists of Hopi symbols framed in multiple borders of varied browns with thin strips of turquoise print placed between varied brown rows. Prairie points are centered on each side. It is hand painted, pieced, and quilted by its maker, Bonnie Nampeyo Chapella. Number ten is *Vanetta's Mud Hens*. The hand painted nine block quilt uses four mud hen patterns, separated by blue sashing. The eleventh and final quilt, *Hopi Pottery*, has straight edges on the top and bottom and four prairie points, on each side. Lovely corn print surrounds two red framed panels. The Hopi designs, from the maker's grandmother's pottery designs, are on white panels.




Pattern of the Month - September 2017 "Autumn Rush" --part 1, the "Rush" block

It's time for flocks of birds to head South for the winter, and for quilters to rush to the fabric shops (or dig into that stash) for all the gorgeous colors of Autumn - -golds, reds, browns, along with all the bright accents and deep shadows that appear wherever there are trees turning color. This block has so many layout possibilities --it's a great opportunity to create your own marvelous rush of color, making it softer or brighter to please your senses, and make a wonderful throw or bed quilt for



someone special - perhaps yourself? -- Watch for part 2, "Autumn Leaf" block, coming in October!



For TWO blocks: Cut one 10" light background square; cut in half diagonally to make two large triangles. (Note: Quilt shown uses 48 large triangles; $1\frac{3}{4}$ yards will yield 24 squares; cut in half diagonally for 48 triangles.) Cut three 4" squares <u>each</u> of assorted lights and darks, for the Triangle Square Units (see method, below) Cut three <u>additional</u> 4" squares of assorted darks; cut these in half diagonally, for small triangles.

Triangle Square method:

Draw a diagonal line from corner to corner on wrong side of each 4" light square. Lay light square on top of dark square, *right sides together*, matching edges. Stitch together, stitching $\frac{1}{4}$ " away from line, on *both sides of line*. Cut apart ON the drawn line and press open, pressing toward dark. This makes two identical ones. *Trim and*











square up to $3\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Make lots of scrappy combinations, using a variety of lights and darks, for a scrappy quilt.

Triangle Square Units

Assemble block: Use 4" seam allowance

Each block uses 3 assorted light/dark Triangle Squares, 3 assorted small dark triangles, and one large light triangle. First, arrange smaller parts as illustrated below, and sew into rows, *keeping dark triangles all pointing in same direction*. Press seams in opposite directions to make matching easier; sew rows together, keeping the end triangle in its proper position. Lay the large pieced triangle on top of the large light triangle, *right sides together*. Pin together on longest side, stitch, and press seam toward light. Square up to $9\frac{1}{2}$ ", taking care not to cut off the $\frac{1}{4}$ " that extends beyond the points of the small triangles; that will be your seam allowance when sewing blocks together! Make 48 for the quilt shown.







Autumn Rush Block



58" x 76" with 48 blocks, 2" borders
