NOVEMBER PROGRAM—Lea McComas



Lea McComas started sewing at 6, and began quilting at 16, learning skills from her great aunt. Her first original design, paying tribute to the Statue of Liberty in1986, was the Missouri state winner of the Great American Quilt Festival. It was viewed all over the world as part of a 3-year traveling exhibit of the Museum of American Folk Art. It can be

viewed in the book All Flags Flying: American Patriotic Quilts as Expressions of Liberty.

In her twenties, Lea was introduced to the world of spinning and weaving, and in her thirties, she traveled overseas as a teacher for the Department of Defense. She explored both textiles and weaving for five years in Turkey. During 4 years in Okinawa, Lea acquired a love of Japanese textile design techniques, and an extensive collection of kimono fabrics.

When Lea returned to the U.S. in 2001 to Colorado, she discovered quilting as a fine art form. She also began a study of classic European art, and developed her interest in portrait and figurative art. Her current work is a synthesis of these passions as she uses thread and fabric to create realistic pictorial works.

Her art has been featured in numerous national and international exhibitions, and her work has won awards worldwide.

She is a featured artist in the book *Cutting Edge Art Quilts*, an episode of TheQuiltShow.com and she teaches online at CraftOnlineUniversity.com Her work and articles on her techniques have appeared in many other publications, and her first book, *Thread-Painted Portraits: Turn Your Photos into Fiber Art*, was released in 2014.

Join us for her lecture, "**Driving in the Dark: My Journey in Fiber Art.**" We also still have room in both of her workshops, **Lively Landscapes** and **Thread-Painted Portraits**.

The tables will be full of quilting, sewing, machines and craft items as well as items made by our members. This is a great chance to get a start at Holiday shopping.






Quilt Fiesta and the Vintage Quilt Turning

Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson By Sue Franklin

In October, Sue provided the continuing education program on *Quilts of the Civil War*. She began with the background, December 20, 1860, when South Carolina seceded from the Union, and two months later, the Confederate States of America was formed. The northwest section of Virginia split from Virginia to become West Virginia as they were solidly for the Union. Neither side was prepared for war; both believed it would end quickly. Women on both sides took up the call to provide relief for the soldiers. Quilts went to the battlefield and were used to raise money for everything from gunboats to bandages. Almost four years later, General Robert E. Lee surrendered to General Ulysses S Grant at Appomattox Court House.

Relief efforts were organized in both the north and the south. However, the women of the north had an advantage. They already had sewing circles and benevolent societies that were converted into soldier's aid societies. They took their experience with a county fair and turned it into a Sanitary Fair. Beginning in 1863 and continuing through 1864 and 1865, Sanitary Fairs were organized across the country. The first, in Chicago, netted \$78,000 and the largest, The New York Metropolitan Fair, netted 1.2 million! Most quilts for soldiers were utility; however, some families gave their treasured family quilts to keep their soldiers warm. Another plus for the north was the manufacturing industry.

Women of the south did not have the same advantages. They did, though, organize, and did all that was possible to help their soldiers. They provided bedding and clothing, but their resources were limited. Textile manufacture in the south was essentially nonexistent. An embargo ultimately prevented the establishment of textile factories. Needed machinery could not be obtained. A Richmond woman described a comforter made of two sheets lined with a newspaper. No Confederate quilts are known to have survived.

Quilts documented in October included: Two Hopi quilts owned by Terry. One is a painted *Hopi Turtle*, a design by Karen and Edgar Tootsie that is predominately maroon and yellow, while the other is labeled *Hopi Pottery*, also painted. Bea had her final *Hopi Pottery* quilt done while Sandy shared her lovely *Spanish Cross Redwork*. Kate brought her vintage *Appliquéd Flowers and Vines* medallion with pink and blue. This quilt likely was a kit quilt. Sara brought a delightful *Baby's Day*, 1942, crib quilt. This quilt, done in pink and blue, portrays babies doing varied activities such as counting toes, drinking from a bottle, playing, and taking a bath. Sue shared the final quilt, a circa 1880, *Log Cabin, Courthouse Steps* variation. The team enjoyed seeing the foundation piecing used for this very old piece.

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Pattern of the Month - November 2017 "Patchwork Cottage" by Evelyn George

This cute little house will use up lots of leftover squares and scraps, and is so much fun that you can quickly make enough blocks for a little quilt in time for the holidays. Blocks finish at 6"—so, just a dozen assorted scrappy cottages is enough for a little quilt around 24 x 30", depending on sashing and borders. Or stitch a single row of blocks into a horizontal or vertical wall hanging, table runner, etc. How about a guilt for a little child's doll or bear?


For each block you need:


16 assorted $1\frac{1}{2}$ " squares (house) $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ " (roof) 1" x 1^½" for chimney Background: 2 pcs. $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x $1\frac{1}{2}$ " (corners of roof); $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x $2\frac{1}{2}$ " (left of chimney and $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x 2" (right of chimney) and 2 pcs. $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x $6\frac{1}{2}$ " (block sides);


Start by arranging the 16 scrappy squares to make a pleasing "house." \rightarrow Using *scant* 1/4" seam allowance, stitch squares into 4 rows; press row seams in opposite directions, then join rows together to make the house (when pressed, it should measure $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ ").



Make the roof by laying a $1\frac{1}{2}$ " background square on each end of the roof rectangle, *right sides* together and edges aligned. Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the background squares at opposite angles as shown (1), to shape the roof corners. Stitch together on the diagonal lines and trim (2), leaving about $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance. Open out triangles and press toward corners (3).







Make chimney section by stitching a background strip to either side of the chimney piece -it's slightly off center, so it doesn't really matter -once pieced, you can turn it around to vary the chimney placement as you wish.

Arrange the house, roof, chimney and sides to match the illustration at top of page. Stitch chimney piece to roof piece, and stitch that to the top of the house; then add the sides, and your Patchwork Cottage is done! Make a whole village!
