






YOUR MEMBER AT LARGE IS LISTENING

Small Quilt Charity Auction

Deadline to donate a Small Quilt for the Auction is the January meetings.

THANK YOU to all who have donated quilts! There is still time to bring your Small Quilt to the January meetings.

This year's charities are **Literacy Connects** and its subsidiary - **Reading Seed**. **Literacy Connects** is a <u>Tucson-based nonprofit</u> founded in July 2011 through the merger of five literacy organizations (including Reading Seed). From birth throughout adulthood, Literacy Connects' programs offer opportunities for learners of all ages to realize their potential. Last year, the Literacy Connects staff and more than 1,500 dedicated volunteers helped more than 50,000 individuals in Southern Arizona.

Reading Seed (one of Literacy Connects programs for children) recruits and trains volunteer reading coaches to work one-on-one with students in kindergarten through third grade who are reading below grade level. <u>Free books</u> are distributed to the students to help establish a home library and the habit of reading at home.

The funds raised by 2018 Small Quilt Charity Auction will be split between the parent organization **Literacy Connects** and **Reading Seed**. PROGRAM NOTES





Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson By Sue Franklin

The team added two new members, Jan Dahlgran and Debi Black. After a brief business meeting including a discussion by Sue and Peggy about the Emma Andres quilt collection, purchased by Lynn and Ralph Miller for \$60,000. Emma's guilts are now housed in the Arizona History Museum where they will receive proper care. Currently, a fundraising effort is in effect so that that the Museum may buy the collection from the Millers. The team voted to donate \$250 from their funds, housed in a bank near Sue. Sue will manage that transaction. Some individual team members already have made personal donations. Others who choose to do so may donate by writing the check to Friends of Arizona History and mail the check to the Arizona History Museum, 949 E. Second Street, Tucson 85719, attention, Laraine Daly-Jones. There will be an exhibit of the Emma Andres quilt collection at the *Museum* January 13th through February 28th. Emma, who spent her entire life in Prescott, is a true Arizona treasure. She and Goldie Tracy Richmond are wonderful persons to emulate.

Bea Kabler offered the continuing education segment. Her topic: The Quilts of Gee's Bend. Bea grew up in Alabama and traveled in the area of the Gee's Bend quilters many times over the years. She noted that most of the makers were descendants of slaves from the Mark Pettway's plantation in Alabama. There is an area in Alabama known as the "black belt" where the preponderance of people is black. While called Gee's Bend in the past, the Post Office renamed it to Boykin in 1949; however, it remains Gee's Bend to the locals.

The area is U shaped, 5 miles across and 7 miles long and on three sides, has the Alabama River. In the early years, there was a ferry, but it is gone since the mid 1960s, making a very long trip on a bad road to get to town to register (to vote). Bea noted Gee's Bend inhabitants didn't lose privileges because they were black, but because "they forgot they were black."

Before 1932, a kind merchant extended credit to the folks of Gee's Bend. That changed dramatically when he died and his shrewish wife took over the store. She collected with a vengeance! In 1962, a dam to generate electricity was built and the outcome meant the most fertile acres were flooded. Gee's Bend women began to have an interest in quilting and also to have some involvement with a bee in nearby Alberta.

Gee's Bend guilters, from remote Gee's Bend, ultimately became Cinderellas. They were stars on the contemporary art scene with vivid patterns made with fabrics from their every day clothes. Shy, elegant, prolific, they delighted in the respect and appreciation that greeted their efforts. Their goal: to break the pattern: to see what others do and then change it, to make it their own. Gee's Bend guilters offered bold new approaches to a distinctive American art form. The guilts of Gee's Bend introduced bright contrasting color and a dramatic contrast to traditional American and European guilting.

Pattern of the Month – January 2018 By Evelyn George

Feathers from Fabric

Would you believe the two feathers shown in the photo, right, are made from the same fabric? It's 100% cotton, old fashioned denim (no spandex). The white feather is cut on the lengthwise grain and the indigo one on the crosswise grain; edges are raveled all the way to the spine to make lovely, fluffy feathers, suitable for embellishing quilts, wearables or just about anywhere you'd like to add a feather or two. It's quite simple, it just requires some patience!





Start by cutting a rectangle of prewashed new or gently used denim fabric a little larger than the feather you'd like. For the white feather, cut a $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x 6" rectangle on the <u>lengthwise</u> grain; for the dark feather, cut 3" x 7" rectangle of fabric on <u>crosswise</u> grain. Experiment with different sizes and fabrics.

Cut 3 pieces of dark gold pearl cotton embroidery thread about 8" long. Pinch ends together to start stitching, then twist slightly together as you do a close zigzag over them, down the center of the strip, following the grain of the fabric as closely as possible. Be sure to backstitch at both ends. Trim the fabric into

a feather shape; it doesn't have to be perfect!

Beginning at outer edge, fringe the feather by loosening and removing one thread at a time, as shown. It may be helpful to rub the cut edges together to soften them a little so you can find the next thread to pull; also it may be easier to see the threads if you work from wrong side of fabric. Continue removing threads until you have reached the center spine, but don't remove threads under it; you need those to keep your feather together. Trim off excess gold thread at ends, and fray it at the tip of the feather, to blend in.

Finished feathers can be positioned as desired and tacked in place on your project with a few stitches by hand or machine.
