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Speaker Biography

Colleen Wise's background is in science and engineering, and her quilts reflect that in their strong graphic quality. Creating designs and solving problems are her favorite parts of the design process. She has always enjoyed working with fabric, and she started quilting in 1991. She started out as a traditional quilter, but after a few quilts, started creating her own original designs.

Quilting is two-dimensional medium, but Colleen likes to play with the illusion of three. Her quilts have a sense of depth that goes beyond the surface. Elements seem to float above the surface or recede into the depths of the quilt. Her goal is to encourage the viewer to look into the quilt, rather than just at it.

Colleen is inspired by walking through old cemeteries and studying the architecture of the headstones and the play of light on the granite. She tends to pull leaves off trees.

She is also fascinated by the stars and planets, and she never misses an opportunity to look through a telescope. She loves geometry but not necessarily symmetry. These themes and more end up in her work. She creates illusion by casting shadows, and by doing so, she creates light.

Quilt Fiesta and the Vintage Quilt Turning

Ruby! What wonderful, lovely, red and white quilts! We had redwork quilts, a dated 1888 *Penny Square* quilt, belonging to Nancy Landon plus Sue's new acquisition, also a *Penny Square*. This coverlet has handmade lace on two sides, very old penny square designs, and is circa 1885 per James Carroll who sold Sue the quilt. We also had pieced blocks, such as Laurel Clarke's lovely *LeMoyne Star* with colors so vibrant it seemed it as if it was made in the 19th century rather than the late 18th century. Jane Porter shared a beautiful *Square in a Square* quilt.

Kate Verbeke's *Wagon Wheel* friendship quilt was fun, too, Easy to date as one of the wheels indicated Calvin Coolidge, president at the time the quilt was made. Brenda Travenner shared her *Iron Cross*, family quilt. Three generations of farm women made the quilt. Appliqué quilts, such as Nancy Landon's mid 18th century four block *Appliqué Beauty* were shown. Our smallest quilt, *School House* belonged to Linda Dorsey. Her mother made this wall hanging because Linda was a teacher. Space doesn't permit me to describe all the lovely red and white quilts. Hopefully, most reading this article saw the quilt turning. If not, so sorry you missed it! It indeed was special; well worthy of the 40th anniversary of *Quilt Fiesta*... *Ruby!*



Tucson Festival of Books

Here's a great opportunity to go to the Tucson Festival of Books (TFOB) and participate with Tucson's newest organization supporting the textile arts. As you may know, Tucson Quilters Guild is a charter member of *Visual and Textile Arts of Tucson (VTAT)*. VTAT has a booth at the Festival and we need people to take shifts to introduce us to the community.

The job entails greeting people that come up to the booth, and answering questions. I will be there the whole time to answer any questions you may have. You'll have the information that will help you to do this well before the festival. Ideally we want to have 3 people for each shift. You'll be reporting directly to the booth (255) and won't have to go through the Vol. check-in for the festival.

We're also asking that you bring along something to work on. It doesn't have to be quilting, but can be any hand craft. It has to be small enough to do in a limited space. Since VTAT's mission includes teaching the various textile arts, we'd like to show how some are done. Hand Applique comes to mind for TQG. We will have examples of the various crafts decorating the booth and books for sale in the various arts for mostly low dough!

Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson By Sue Franklin

Sue began with the meeting by introducing Paula, a guest of Kathy Hansen. She followed with a brief report about the January 30th quilt documentation for the *Arizona History Museum* Collection. A few members of the Tucson team, Sue, Kate, Joyce, Sara, and Kathy, were joined by Phoenix area people, Lenna Demarco, Anne Hodgkins, and photographer, Lynn Miller with her helper, Chery Erhardt. The group was able to document all but four of the *Museum* quilts. Sue reminded everyone of the coming **Public Documentation**, **March 17**th, at the *Arizona History Museum*. **Kate Clark, 520-742-1000 is taking reservations** for that event. There is no charge, although donations are appreciated as the project is self funded. There is a charge if a copy of the documentation and pictures are desired by the quilt(s) owner.

Sue also provided the continuing education, **Redwork/Turkey red**, for the group. Redwork embroidery, on a white ground has been around for centuries. However, redwork as we know it had its nudge to popularity in 1876 At the *Philadelphia Centennial Exhibition*. First, the *English Pavilion* displayed outline embroidery. Second, the *Japanese Pavilion* featured artistic subjects in a natural habitat. By 1885, Redwork began to chronicle history. It was seen in folk art, story book quilts, or *Penny Square* quilts. Redwork being the more generic name for penny square quilts.

A multistage and complicated process to develop the colorfast red we now know as Turkey red originated in Turkey. Efforts were unsuccessful until 1829 and Turkey red fabric probably first came to the United States in the mid 1800s. The beauty of Turkey red is that it is bright, *colorfast*, and more important, able to be used on cotton rather than wool. Several years later, Turkey red dyes, fabric and thread were easily obtained in this country. The cost was higher, but to the needlewoman, it was worth every penny! Quilt historian, Barbara Brackman notes that the 1875-76 Montgomery Ward catalog advertised the fabric at three times the cost of "normal" red cloth. Cartoons of the time depicted errant spouses sent to purchase more thread and carelessly buying the wrong red... guess what? He made a second trip for the correct color!

Interest in redwork snowballed. Red on white was popular for anything that could be covered, such as pillows, bed shams, back splashes, tables, tea towels, laundry bags, hair accessories, even beds! All in keeping with Victorian opulence, don't you think? From the 1860s through the depression, a small piece of muslin could be purchased for a penny, possibly at a general or dry goods store. It could then be marked with a selected pattern from the shop-keepers pattern book. Penny Squares were used to teach girls basic embroidery, usually the outline or backstitch. Also, these penny squares generally were made with Turkey red thread.

In 1874, an iron on transfer method was developed. Women embraced the easier method and soon related businesses emerged. Catalogs, pattern and thread companies, periodicals, and suppliers of needlework products got into the act. Redwork became a financial bonanza! Turkey red dye contributed to the popularity of Redwork because it was colorfast. The same thing happened to bluework with the discovery of colorfast indigo. Whether red and white or blue and white; they each provide examples of the charm of a two color quilt.

Quilts documented include: *Penny Squares*, 1888 with initials, owned by Nancy Landon, a red and white *Pineapple* quilt, circa 1900-1920 of Jennifer Sexton, Sue's red and white *French Redwork*, and finally two quilts of Kate's, *Golden Memories*, honoring the 50th anniversary of her parents and *Golden Memories*, honoring the 50th anniversary of her husband, Wayne's parents.

Pattern of the Month - March 2018 By Evelyn George

Floating Pinwheels

(8" block; 44" x 60" quilt)

March brings up visions of children playing with pinwheels on a breezy day—and memories of this favorite pinwheel block. It's so easy to make, and the points will never get cut off, with a clever piecing trick. This would be a quick baby quilt!

Make half the pinwheels dark, on a light background, and the other half light, on a dark background. Use two colors, or make it as scrappy as you like; just make sure there is plenty of contrast between the lights and darks, so the pinwheels will show up nicely.

All pieces are cut from $2\frac{1}{2}$ " strips of fabric, so you can use yardage, precuts, or scraps of your choice.

The quilt shown has 5 rows of 7 blocks each = total of 35 blocks; 18 dark and 17 light, in the quilt shown at right.

<u>APPROXIMATE YARDAGE</u>: Light - 1 5/8 yards; Dark - $2\frac{1}{2}$ yards (includes borders and binding.)



Light - cut 17 strips $2\frac{1}{2}$ " × WOF; cut into $2\frac{1}{2}$ " × $4\frac{1}{2}$ " pieces (need 136 light rectangles).

" cut 5 strips $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x WOF; cut into $2\frac{1}{2}$ " squares (need 72 light squares).

Dark - cut 18 strips $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x WOF; cut into $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ " pieces (need 144 dark rectangles).

- " cut 5 strips $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x WOF; cut into $2\frac{1}{2}$ " squares (need 68 dark squares).
- " cut 6 additional strips for borders; piece as needed to make borders.
- " cut another 6 strips for binding, from same fabric as borders, or a different fabric.

<u>PINWHEEL BLOCKS</u>: For each block you need 8 rectangles and 4 squares. (Use <u>light</u> squares with <u>dark</u> rectangles, and vice versa.) Follow the illustrations closely as you sew:







Draw a diagonal line from corner to corner on <u>wrong</u> side of square; align square at <u>right hand end</u> of rectangle with <u>right sides together</u> and the <u>drawn line angled as shown</u>. Stitch on the line. Trim off

corner as shown, leaving $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance. Press triangle toward corner.

Make 4 identical triangle units for each block.

Sew a matching plain rectangle to each triangle unit, positioned as shown→

Make 4 <u>identical</u> units and arrange them into a 4-patch, rotating the 4 units to position them as shown, to make a pinwheel. Sew together to make the block, taking care to keep the pinwheel formation as you sew.

Make light and dark blocks, as many as you need for your quilt.
