In addition, Susie has volunteered with Quilt for a Cause since its inception in 2006 donating as well as

participating in the auction itself. Primarily known as a teacher, she has taught from Alaska to Wisconsin always adapting her classes to challenge and bring out the best in each student. She builds students' self-confidence with the correct application of skills and proper use of tools. In addition, Susie has self-published fifteen patterns, two of which have been recognized in national publications. One of her quilts appeared in the 2007 calendar of the American Quilt Society.




PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

If you are unable to step up but you know of someone that would be an asset to Tucson Quilters' Guild, please ask them to contact me.

The term of offices shall be one two (2) year elected term of office.

Positions we need to fill in 2019:

- **President** -To preside over all meetings, to be an ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee, to appoint or dismiss committee chairmen with the approval of the Board of Directors to coordinate the work of appointed committees and act as liaison with other needlework groups or with community authorities.
- **Vice-President** To perform the duties of the President in the temporary absence of that officer. The Vice President shall form and oversee a by-laws committee to initiate an annual review of By-Laws and Guidelines for all Board and Committee chair positions, appoint an audit committee, and preside over either the daytime or evening meetings in the absence of the President. In the event of a vacancy in the office of President, the Vice-President automatically becomes President, and a new Vice-President shall be elected.
- Quilt Show Co-Directors To appoint and coordinate sub-committees for annual quilt show.
- Evening Members-at-Large -To represent the membership as a whole and bring issues of interest or concern to the rest of the officers. There shall be 2 Members-at-Large, elected in alternating years. One Member-at-Large will be elected from the evening meeting attendees, and one will be elected from the morning meeting attendees.
- **Endowment Director** To oversee the Grants Committee, consisting of 3 to 5 members appointed by the Endowment Director. The committee is responsible for reviewing the requests for grants to insure the requests meet the grants guidelines, and making a written recommendation to the Board for distribution of grant and donations

What type of quilting speaks to you? Strip Piecing And Machine Quilting

Do you attend day or evening meetings? Both Depending on Golf

- 1. How and why did you join the Guild? I went to the 2016 show, picked up a membership application, I had been in three guilds in NYS and I wanted to share/learn.
- 2. When, how or why did you start quilting? 1972 I saw a quilt on Aunt Dora's bed in Tennessee. And said "I can do that". I was humbled.
- 3. What was your first quilt like? Grandmothers-Honeycomb Flower Garden made of double knits. The quilts in Tennessee inspired me. My inspiration? My wonderful mother, Julia Hendzel, taught me to handle scissors and a needle when I was 5 years old embroidery, crewel, knitting and sewing my own clothes. My awesome Mother-in-Law, Lois Anderson, introduced be to both tailoring and quilting, (as well as canning/jelly making and pies!). I, the student, soon became the teacher and I taught both my Moms to pick out fabric, rotary cutting and machine quilting.
- 4. Who is your favorite quilting guru, mentor, or inspiration, and why? Mary Ellen Hopkins. Certainly a "Crazy Lady" her style of life appealed to me.
- 5. When you are not quilting what are your favorite pastimes? Bodybuilding, golf and hockey used to include bowling but I retired from that. Rock hounding!! I am very active in the Tucson Gem and Mineral Society. Training to handle the products booth at the Convention Center. I do bead stringing and collect rocks, fossils and crystals.
- 6. What have you most enjoyed about being a member? The workshops and lectures. Helping hang the quilts and being a white glove lady.
- 7. What is your favorite color? Teal/purple Favorite food? Chocolate anything (Klondikes and any polish food)
- 8. What do you want the guild to know about you? I taught High School science for 40 years and have a masters plus 30 in Geology, minor Meteorology.
- 9. Tell us something about yourself that we do not know about you? In NYS, I had my own quilting business "Kate's Kountry Kalikoes", selling at craft fairs. I taught quilting through adult education, taught at several quilt shop in the mid-Hudson Valley and Westchester area of New York. I

completed the series "It's okay if you sit on my quilt" with Mary Ellen Hopkins, in Cincinnati, Las Vegas and Portland, Maine. And was a member of "Quilt Sitters Circle". I lectured at various guilds in NYS and Connecticut. My specialty was machine quilting. No one had longarms back then, me included. Everything was done on my Bernina 1130. I was a student of Harriet Hargrave. Because of my location in NYS, I was able to attend "Quilting by the Lake" in Cazenovia, New York three years. There I met and worked with Roberta Horton and Libby Lieman as well as many other great



PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE 2019

Theme: Chinatown

Rules:

- 1. Interpret the theme any way you want e.g., a Chinese "house" quilt, the fabulous 1940s clothing the Faye Dunaway wore in the movie, calligraphy, and so on. Just, in some way that viewers will be able to identify, when told the theme, your quilt must evoke the theme of Chinatown.
- 2. The quilt should measure no more than 100 inches around the perimeter. Any rectangular shape of that dimension is acceptable. If your quilt is not rectangular, make sure that it will fit in a rectangle that is no more than 100 inches around the perimeter.
- 3. All techniques (e.g., piecing, appliqué, whole cloth) and all genres (e.g., modern, civil war, barn sampler) are welcome.
- 4. The quilt must have a hanging sleeve and a label containing the quilt maker's name and title of the quilt. Additional information on the label is fine. Quilts must also be contained in a cloth bag (pillowcase) to protect them from dirt or damage.

Applications, included below and on the TQG website, are due by the November meetings. Quilts must be turned in at the November meetings. We will take a first vote to identify the top three quilts, and then another vote in January to identify winners. Quilts will be displayed at the quilt show and returned at the end of the show.

Preparing your quilt for the Quilt Fiesta

By now you probably have your top made, and you might even have it sandwiched together and ready to quilt! (as of this writing, mine are sandwiched but not pinned and my longarm needs to be cleared of the piles of fabric and notions that have accumulated - LOL) Many of you have shipped them off to your longarm quilter as well.

So after it is quilted, what then should you do to ready the quilt for the show?

After binding the quilt, the next step would be to attach your label, it is up to the discretion of the quilter where you place it, but I prefer my labels to the lower right side of the quilt back. Be sure to include as much information as you can, at least your name and contact information, the date, the name of the quilt and any quilt techniques you used. You may hand write this on fabric or you may type it all out on the computer and then print it on photo transfer sheets. Remember if your quilt is to be judged, you need to cover the label (your name) with muslin so the judges do not know who did the work.

Next step is really important....use a lint roller (the dollar stores have them) to remove all the stray threads and while doing so, you can check to see if you have any hanging threads that need to be cut. If you have a cat or dog, please be sure to remove all the hair, we will not accept a quilt full of cat hair.

If your quilt lays fairly flat and square, you do not need to steam it and block it square, but if not, you will need to do this. You want the quilt as flat as possible so it will hang properly from the exhibit bars.

Our show has a standard measurement for the hanging sleeve which can be found on the website. Now is the time to add it, please follow the directions and requirements.

Take one last look at your quilt and admire it! Be proud of the work you have lovingly put into it, then "put it to rest" in the pillowcase as instructed on the website.

Now to start (or finish) another quilt!!!!

All volunteers, members or non-members, on the day of the show that they work have free admission.



Just as my predecessor did for 2018, I am asking for your donations in a few ways. You may make a small quilt from start to finish. I have discovered that leftover blocks from a bigger project are a great way to begin. I also like trying new techniques in a small piece just to have fun doing something new. And of course there are the pieces that I've started that will not go any further—this is a great way to finish and pass them along.

You may also donate small, unfinished pieces—"lamentables"— to the guild for someone else to finish. Your leftovers may immediately inspire someone else to make a small wonderful quilt. Even if your leftovers are very simple, they could be a fun beginning for someone else. I adopted a cut square of Elvis fabric last year, added a border, a guitar, and some quilting, and people were fighting over it!

Finally, you can select one or more "lamentables" and be the one to make a "lovely". At the June guild meetings, I already had some available, and almost all of them were picked up. I am looking forward to seeing what they become.

Remember, the income from the Small Quilt Auction will be donated to a worthy cause or organization in the Tucson Community. Think about who you would like to see receive these funds, and pass the organization's name along to us. Our membership will vote to select the recipient. The recipient does not have to be guilting related.





Why it's done this way

746.46, that is the Dewey Decimal classification for most books about quilting. So if we were to organize or shelf all the books in Tucson Quilt Guilds library using this Dewey number, all the books would be lumped together. We could use the author's name to follow 746.46, making it an alphabetical arrangement. However there are many books in our collection that don't have an "author"; they just have an editor.

Often when patrons come in to use the library, they want to find a book about the quilting done by a famous quilters. People new to quilting haven't yet found who they might want to read or study the style of. Then there are quilters who come in looking for books about baby quilts or embellishments or rotary cutting techniques.

The books in the library are organized by topic. So if you don't know an author but want to look at books about paperpiecing, you would look in the section PP. The library does have all the books in an Excel spreadsheet, so we can find what you might be looking for. There are questions the spreadsheet can't answer such as "using embroidered handkerchiefs in a quilt" but we can try.

Basically, the library is set to encourage "browsing". That's how we discover something or someone new! Sometimes browsing isn't too practical because we have a limited time to have the library open and the shelves aren't user friendly but we do have lots of books.

Arizona Quilt Documentation Project – Tucson By Sue Franklin





Pattern of the Month - November 2018

Little Red Pickup Truck

This is a busy little truck, ready to carry big loads of wonderful stuff for the whole family. At Christmas time, he brings home a great big tree, but the rest of the year he's busy, too - can't you just imagine a whole quilt of Little Red



Pickup Truck adventures? He could be going to the beach, county fair or farmer's market, or anywhere he's needed to carry a special load -- mountain bikes, picnic gear, pumpkins, a load of hay, a snowman, or maybe just kids or a happy dog riding along. Use your imagination, and look for novelty fabrics with various motifs to cut out and put in the back of the truck, or in the window. A tree-carrying pickup would be a fun addition to a quilt of holiday blocks. Little trucks in assorted colors could make a playful child's quilt, or they could decorate throw pillows, runners or wall hangings for special seasons.

Design shown fills about a 6" x 9" space. Enlarge or reduce pattern as needed.

Use the templates provided to cut out truck parts (in any colors you want, of course) and use your favorite applique technique to fuse and/or sew the parts to a background square or rectangle.

FOR FUSIBLE APPLIQUE, follow manufacturer's directions on the package.

For most fusible products, it is recommended that you prewash all fabrics without using any fabric softeners in the washer or dryer; fabric softeners can interfere with bonding.

Trace shapes as shown, without seam allowances; keep in mind that images will be reversed when using paper-backed fusible applique. As printed, truck will end up facing right; if you want it facing left, make an extra copy of template page, cut out all the shapes (except wheels, which are the same turned either way), and turn them over to draw them on the paper side of the fusible. Whichever way they appear traced onto paper side of fusible, they will be facing the opposite way on the block.

Fuse to wrong side of fabric, then cut out, remove paper backing and fuse shapes to background fabric.

FOR NEEDLE TURN APPLIQUE, add $\frac{1}{4}$ " extra for seam allowance around the shapes when you cut them out of your selected fabrics.

WINDOW: If you want a passenger or driver in the window, this can be done either by cutting out the window opening so you can slide another piece of fabric underneath, or else the window piece can be appliqued on top (remember to include seam allowance if applicable).

Carefully position pieces on background fabric, making sure tree is tucked slightly under edge of truck, and that fenders are positioned to cover just a little bit of the tires.

Fuse (or pin) pieces in place. Stitch by hand or machine as desired.
