# President's Challenge 2019



- 1. Quilt can use any color, theme or technique, and *must include at least 1 button*.
- 2. The quilt should measure no more than 100 inches around the perimeter. Any rectangular shape of that dimension is acceptable. If your quilt is not rectangular, make sure that it will fit in a rectangle that is no more than 100 inches around the perimeter.
- 3. The quilt must have a hanging sleeve and a label containing the quilt maker's name and title of the quilt. Quilts must also be contained in a cloth bag (pillowcase) to protect them from dirt or damage.
- 4. Your application is due by the October meetings and your quilts must be turned in at the November meeting.

RECYCLING EMPTY CONES AND SPOOLS - RECYCLE, REUSE, REPURPOSE

Can I recycle empty cones and spools?

We are occasionally asked: "Are empty spools and cones recyclable?" It's great to recycle and repurpose! If your local recycling center accepts polypropylene or PP plastics, they can be recycled. Some centers don't recycle polypropylene, so we recommend calling ahead to confirm with them before you start your trek to the center. The plastic film (shrink wrap) that is on the exterior of our cones and spools is made out of polyethylene terephthalate or PET for short. This is the same material that water and soda bottles are made out of and can also be recycled.

My aunt's favorite saying of "use it up, wear it out, make it due, or do without" has inspired me to search for ways to personally reuse or upcycle my empty spools and cones. Here are some great suggestions we have received over the years:

I wrap my binding around an empty thread cone...1 then put it on the upright spool holder...this keeps it under control and keeps my binding clean. - S.S

I've transformed a used cone into a beautiful angel treetopper. Spools can be strung to become cute garland to hang on your tree or create a spool wreath! - B.B

If anyone is interested in birding, the thread tails can be scattered in your yard in the spring when the birds are nesting and they love to pick these tails up for their nests! 1 have done this every year with my leftover thread tails and when you dispose of their nest in the fall or winter you will see them woven all through their nests! - R.A

If you have kids or grandkids, a fun activity is transforming empty cones into kaleidoscopes! - K.O

There's a lot that can be done with empty cones and spools if you spend a little bit of time being creative.

FROM THE SHELVES ...



Sometimes it's the cover of a book that catches my attention. Folded Log Cabin Quilts by Sarah Kaufman (PT-L Kau 2010) has a blue color and I have lots

of blue material. Many of you have probably made a log cabin quilt, but have you made a folded one? You start with a 1 1/2 inch strip fold it in half and press the fold, sew down one seam at ¼ inch and then another seam at ¼ and your logs are then a tiny ¼ thick. On a foundation of a 7 inch square of muslin, you should have an eleven logs cabin, a heavy piece. This book give more details and design ideas. It also includes several interesting ideas as to rods and found objects that could be used to hang your creations.

In your personal history of needlework, did you ever do cross stitch? Fast, Fusible Quilts, cross-stitch quilts made easy by Terry Martin (PT MAR 2001) has brought quilting and crossstitching together. The author admits she did a lot of crossstitching early on, looking at antique pieces for inspiration to develop her own patterns. Then she found quilting, the designing transferred from one technique to the other. She uses fusible interfacing to lay out her designs on the gridded surface. Once the design is to her liking, she presses the fabric adhering it to the interfacing. Then she sews the seams. Sounds fast and easy! These and other books will be available to check out during our September meeting as the

# Frizona Zuilt Documentation Project

July 2019 Tucson Region By Sue Franklin



Sue began the July meeting by introducing Judith Billings, who will be a new member of the team. She also mentioned the coming American Quilt Study Seminar to be held October 9-12 in Lincoln, Nebraska, at the International Ouilt Museum.

The next topic announced by Sue involved coming changes at Ellie Towne, beginning in May, 2020. Since the Tucson team's beginning in 2013 and its use of Ellie Towne, there has been no cost. Beginning next May, the team will be charged \$15/hour. Sue noted the team has funds in the bank available for use for this charge as well as money from the donations collected monthly. The team also offered varied ideas.

Sue provided the orientation to the documentation process to Judith Billings. Then, she offered continuing education for July on Hexagons. While some readers may believe that hexagons are a current discovery, that is wrong! The January, 1835 Godey's Lady's Book, noted that there is "perhaps no patchwork that is prettier or more ingenious than the hexagon or six sided; this is also called honey-comb patchwork." Sue noted she found this particular quote in the Smithsonian Treasury American Quilts, under a heading of One Patch patterns.
A picture of a lovely fringed
hexagon quilt, double bordered
in chintz, set the stage for the
discussion.

The article in Godey's Lady's Book also includes directions for making hexagons "properly." It has an example of a quilt made by a South Carolina woman who made a quilt with 17,871 pieces with the hexagons measuring 5/8" at their widest!

These "non-square" units, such as hexagons and diamonds, are American elements, but they have their roots in traditions of Europe. In the United Kingdom, hexagons would have been pieced over a paper template and then whip stitched together. Sometimes, if only a hexagon top is available, it's possible to see the paper used, occasionally newspaper. The newspaper is really fun if a date is discovered on the paper. The hexagon shape was particularly popular in both the United Kingdom and the United States at the end of the 18th century and beginning of the 19th. For probably 10 years, making "hexies" has become popular again.

Likely, one of the most popular quilts using hexagons in the early 20th century is Grandmother's Flower Garden. I have one that my husband's grandmother started in the 1930s; she did the top. His mother had it finished in 1963 and then gave it to us as a wedding gift. In my quilt, the hexagons are quite large; in others very small. If any of you

have been involved in Public Quilt Documentations over the years, you've probably seen many variations.

In Robert Shaw's American Quilts, the Democratic Art 1780-2007, he references a lovely medallion mosaic quilt, 1825-40. The quilt now may be viewed in Winterthur Museum. Shaw notes that the designs may have been influenced by mosaic floors, tables and other things that could have created small pebbles, glass made in North Africa 2000 BC. The Moors brought the concept to Europe and it easily was transferred to fabric.

Hexagons, popular from the early 19th century and still popular today, represent a terrific example of a one patch pattern. If you haven't tried them, you may be surprised at how much fun they can be!

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# PATTERN OF THE MONTH AUGUST 2019

"Signature Sahuaro"

A Design by Val M. Hintze

This pattern will not be used as a Giveaway Block; this is just for fun. An exercise to inspire imagination using Saguaro Cactus as your focal point, very easy to draw, cut and rough stitch applique. There are no size limits. Your saguaro can have a few or a lot of arms, fat, tall and skinny, etc. You are the artist & designer. Your saguaro can be black as a shadow, green, or colorful. You can build a background or put a saguaro on a square or rectangle of fabric to practice machine or hand applique.

The picture below is the background I stitched together using scraps, planning as I went along, sewing colorful rectangles and strips together until I was satisfied. I then added a black border to build a Barrio neighborhood. Applique elements were added later using straight-line machine stitching and machine decorative stitches to attach doors, windows, etc., and my Signature Saguaro.
