PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE 2019

RULES:

1. Quilt can use any color, theme or technique, and ***must include at least 1 button.***
 2. The quilt should measure no more than 100 inches around the perimeter. Any rectangular shape of that dimension is acceptable. If your quilt is not rectangular, make sure that it will fit in a rectangle that is no more than 100 inches around the perimeter.
 3. The quilt must have a hanging sleeve and a label containing the quilt maker's name and title of the quilt. Quilts must also be contained in a cloth bag (pillowcase) to protect them from dirt or damage.
 4. **Your application is due by the October meetings and your quilts must be turned in at the November meeting.**

RECOMMENDED BYLAWS REVISION

The Board of Directors of the Tucson Quilt Guild has reviewed the Bylaws as it relates to terms of office for Board Members and recommends revision to allow the Treasurer to be elected for a maximum of two consecutive 2-year terms. The reason for this recommended change is due to the long learning curve for the position of Treasurer. The annual audit of the financial records after the close of the fiscal year will safeguard any potential for financial inappropriateness.

Your Board has voted unanimously at the August business Meeting to amend the Bylaws with the following verbiage:

ARTICLE VI: OFFICERS

Section 2: The term of office shall be one 2-year elected term of office. No member may serve consecutive elected full terms for the same position on the Board, except for the Treasurer. The Treasurer may serve two consecutive 2-year elected terms of office.

In accordance with the Bylaws, this information appears in the September

and October newsletters and will be presented at the September membership meetings. Membership voting on this recommended change to the Bylaws will take place at the October membership meetings.

Setting Solutions by Sharyn Craig (DE CRA 2001)

Do you have blocks lying around? Do you need some solutions for getting your block your blocks into a finished quilt top? Perhaps the blocks you have vary in size or color; this book will give you suggestions to overcome those issues. It suggested you try out or "audition" different colors, patterns and layouts. Do you have a focus block; try placement either straight or diagonal. Try different background colors or framing the blocks. The last several pages present "project maps."

Successful Scrap Quilts by Judy Turner and Margaret Rolfe (P-SC TUR 2002)

These authors approach scrap quilts differently. Turner wants the widest possible variety of fabric in her quilts. Rolfe prefers to focus on the exploration of patterns she can create. Today, we aren't working with the limited fabric available as was in the past, we can play with tonal value, color and prints, and solids, or the variety we

find in our stash. The play of fabrics and patterns are beautifully displayed in old jeans!

packets, patterns, tools, batting, thread, etc. "NEW" means unopened packets of fat quarters, jelly rolls, charm packs, layer cakes, etc. This is a great opportunity to impulse buys at a gorgeous booth, and the fabric never "becomes" what we might have hoped for. Kits and patterns are also acceptable, as long as they are complete and still in their packaging.

Perhaps you have some scrap fabric you aren't sure what to do with – make a small gift or simple treasure to contribute to our baskets. "Made" items are not secondhand but rather items that you might make and send as gifts or sell at a craft fair. Small items only, such as coasters, hot pads, baskets and plate holders, pet toys, drink holders, placemats, etc. Consider labeling your items to help give them a professional look.

Don't forget quilters do enjoy others tasks beside sewing. Consider donations of books, coffee, or tea. Better yet, how about a bottle of wine or a box of chocolates! Also, consider non-fabric items such as hand creams, candles, and nice soaps. All of us end up with dry skin from our quilting.

We must also remember the men in our lives who don't quilt. Perhaps a few gift cards to sport or auto shops, tickets to ball games or a couple of ball caps or t-shirts. Consider visiting your favorite shops and businesses and ask for a donation to this project.

In September, the Tucson team met at Ellie Towne Community Center. The next meeting will be on Monday, October 7, and a Public Documentation on November 9 at the Arizona History Museum. More information on that later. However, if anyone has questions, please email me at suevette63@comcast.net.

Continuing ed was presented by me. The topic was "The Double Wedding."

Robert Bishop, in his book, "The Romance of the Double Wedding Ring" notes a story from a decade after the Civil War. During that period, men, as well as women were making quilts. One particular grandma loved making quilts and was saving a particular one for her favorite niece's wedding. Jane, whose fiancé, wounded at the battle of Antietam in 1862, spent many years in the hospital, but then came home and the wedding was planned.

There was a glitch in their plans; the couple had no money for rings and would have to wait until later. Jane came to Grandma with her story. Grandma told Jane not to worry as she has the perfect solution. What do you think? A "Double Wedding Ring" Quilt!

There has been some controversy over the origin of the pattern. Some argue that it's early 20th century while others disagree. The latter are correct.

There is a "Double Wedding Ring" quilt in The Baltimore Museum of Art, a gift of Dr. William Rush Dunton, Jr. There is another early quilt dated 1825-1858 in the Shelburne Museum in Shelburne, Vermont.

The symbol of interlocking rings has been noticed in glassware, jewelry, art, and pottery for centuries notes Lisa Erlandson, former president of the American Quilt Study Group. The rings, known as "gimmel" were popular during the 15th and 16th centuries in Europe. During the engagement, each person of the wedding couple wore a ring. After the wedding, the bride wore both. Lisa further notes that examples have been found in ancient Greece and Rome. The Germans probably brought the tradition to the new world during the early 17th and 18th centuries. In the United States, the design became popular in 19th century coverlets, China patterns from the 1860s and Victorian era tiles.

The Orlofskys state in "Quilts of America" that a pattern known in the late 19th century as "The Rainbow" became very popular. Barbara Brackman and Ginny Beyer put the first known date of the pattern's publication known as the "Double Wedding" to October, 1928. It was published then in Capper's Weekly. Another surge of

popularity came during the depression years. It could be made from many scraps and use bright colors to provide a bit of cheer. Frequently, though, pastels were used and delighted brides to be who may have either helped to make it or to receive it as a gift. It also may have become popular due to the use of interlocking rings.

Making a Double Wedding Ring quilt, though, isn't for the faint of heart. That can be a positive, however, if a woman needed to take her mind off family troubles. Depression era quilts may include much smaller pieces; no scrap was too small to use. Pre planning was key. Also, making a crib quilt in that pattern was very difficult due to the size of scale.

Robert Bishop identifies many variations of the Double Wedding Ring. These include, Indian Wedding Ring, Pickle Dish, Pine Burr, Lovers Knot, Friendship Knot and a host of others.

Quilts Documented include: Terry Grzyb-Wysocki, *Bear Paw*, a Quilt her husband, Jim got it online for \$7; Kate Clark, *Safari Elephant*; Susan Franklin, *Indigo and White Basket Crib*, circa last quarter of the 19th century; Susan Franklin, *Red and White, Square in a Square*.


