# Tucson Quilters Guild – A brief history in time

- Initially we were called "Quilters Guild of Tucson"
- 1978 turned out to be the start of something wonderful for Tucson quilters. This was the precursor to our guild starting with several women getting together for the love of quilting.
- Initially this group of women called themselves the "Quilters • 2018 was truly our 40th Guild of Tucson". Their first quilt show was January 10, 1979 at Cloth World Fabric Store on Broadway.
- The guild quilt shows started at Cloth World for a number of years until more space was needed. The next venue was the Tucson Woman's Club near Wilmot and Speedway. Finally moving into the **Tucson Convention** Center.

- 1981 the guild completed their "unincorporated" paperwork was completed March 11, 1981.
- 1987 Article of incorporation of our now "Tucson Quilters Guild" January 7, 1987.
- 1991 The guild celebrated "Founders Day" for their 10 year anniversary.
- 1990 Original bylaws were written November 14, 1990.
- 2016 Amendments to our current bylaws were added in April
- "Ruby" anniversary quilt show.
- In 2020 we are now in our 42nd year. So many women and men have joined the Tucson Quilters Guild over the years with a focus of learning and sharing knowledge. Our guild storage area has so much history I am only hitting the high points. Scrapbooks of articles from Tucson as well all across the country

celebrating quilting arts, business and general meeting minutes, as well as photo albums of new member get togethers, quilt shows 1979 thru early 1990's. We also have DVD's of previous shows which are wonderful to see and remember previous entries.

l also found a photo album of each years' raffle/opportunity quilt dating from 1979-2020. **Beautiful!** 

You would enjoy seeing the amazing variety in changes over the years. Some old patterns in pastel colors and a few of those forward thinkers we now call art quilters.




# PATTERN OF THE MONTH JUNE 2020

POM CHAIR NEEDED

This month's POM brought to you by Marie Morris

You will need Half-square triangles for this block that are 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" unfinished.



This is not a new block but it is a fun block.

### **Contrary Wife**

Use at least 3 fabrics in addition to your background fabric.

- 1. Make four half-square triangles with one color fabric and your background.
- 2. Cut three squares from a second color,  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $3\frac{1}{2}$ ".
- 3. Cut two squares from a third fabric,  $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $3\frac{1}{2}$ ".
- 4. Assemble rows following diagram.
- 5. Press
  - a. Top row: Away from middle
  - b. Middle row: Towards middle
  - c. Bottom row: Away from middle
- 6. Assemble block
