# May Webinar and Workshop Wendy Mathson



Yes folks, another Zoom first-timer. But in all other quilting endeavors, Wendy Mathson is a seasoned artist, speaker, and teacher. She has been making and designing quilts since 1981, beginning with a baby quilt made in anticipation of her first child. In 1992, while she was part of a quilting circle at her church, she began making prayer quilts. A few years later Wendy organized "Prayers & Squares", The Prayer Quilt Ministry. This interfaith nonprofit organization now has over 800 chapters worldwide. It was in support of the Ministry that she began designing and teaching simple strippieced patterns for them which then led to the invention of her cut-after-you-sew tools called Quilters TRIMplates.

It is these tools that form the basis of our workshop and lecture "Designing with Mariner's Compass and Snail's Trail". When I spoke to her last, she was busy in her studio, setting up cameras and redesigning her workshop for Zoom. She briefly considered turning it into a design only class, but I think and hope you will all be happier sewing because you will be!

The obvious activity was in donations. We received quilting books, magazines and kits and patterns. All of these are sorted through. The quilt books the Guild library doesn't have, we add to the collection. All the remaining are stored away until the next quilt show in January 2022. Raising money for the library, all these books,

kits and patterns are sold at the Quilt Fiesta. Last quilt show, the library made \$800.00 and with that we bought another section of shelving for the library. Many of you spoke up to say that the guild would be happy to take these items as donations. Thank you. 1 now have the job of going through the patterns and kits to see what we have.

#### Quilt-A-Thon

It seems like we have just finished Quilt-A-Thon 2020, but we are now getting ready for Quilt-A-Thon 2021. We will continue to participate in the monthly Drive-by at the church until we can meet in person. The Drive-by is scheduled to be held each month from 9:00 am - 10:30 am on the Saturday following the scheduled Wednesday General Meeting. The tentative Drive-by dates are May 15, June 12, and July 17.

There are many ways to participate in getting ready for Quilt-A-Thon 2021. The Guild is holding a Time-Limited Prize Drawing with the Drawing to be held at the August 2021 Quilt-A-Thon meeting. To participate in this drawing your Fabrics must come from the Guild collection. There will be kits ready to sew for Quilt-A-Thon at the scheduled Drive-by as well as many patterns that are Quilt-A-Thon standard size (width of Fabric by about 56 to 60 inches long) to hand out. You can pick fabrics from the Guild collection available at the Drive-by. You may also schedule an appointment to select the fabric from the Guild Storeroom. To schedule an appointment, go to our website, click on the "About US" tab and send an email to Quilt-A-Thon Linda Begega.

You certainly may use your patterns and fabrics but quilts for Quilt-A-Thon need to

be no more than the width of fabric wide and about 56 inches long. This facilitates cutting batting in advance and finding suitable backings without piecing.

It remains to be seen if we will be able to meet at the church in August for a regular Quilt-A-Thon event. If so, then all the quilt tops that have not already been turned in will be brought to the event where we will envelope and tie them. If we cannot meet in August then any Quilt-A-Thon tops that have not already been turned in will be collected at the August Drive-by on August 14th.

All quilts that are part of Quilt-A-Thon will have batting and backings provided and be returned to our storage unit. They will be available for distribution to those able to finish them.

#### Arizona Documentation Report

"If we are to guard against ignorance and remain free, it is the responsibility of every American to be informed" noted Thomas Jefferson more than two centuries ago. His words remain true today.

In April's newsletter, I noted that in early March, I attended a Zoom meeting of the *Arizona Quilt Study Group*. The first speaker, Marikay Waldvogel, discussed the 1933 *Chicago World's Fair*. The second was Sue Reich, whose topic was *World War II* quilts. This month covers Sue's talk.

This, too, was a contest. Word went out through posters, newspapers, but not TV. Over 300 magazines participated with the only requirement being a flag on the cover. A slogan from the Civil War was used; United We Stand. Citizens grew their own food, canned it, and collected paper for the war effort. "Remember Pearl Harbor" frequently was heard. Nylon stockings were worn; silk stockings became parachutes. Make and mend for victory became a mantra. Ration stamps were the norm.

Slacks for women, an epidemic, enabling them to work in the defense industry. When these women entered it, they built a battleship in a day! *The United War Fund/Red Feather Fund*, created to raise funds for the war effort. Many feel that the Great Depression served as a "warm-up" for the hardships of World War II.

Needlework of all kinds became a useful tool to relieve emotional tension. Double Wedding Ring quilts were very popular; however, Airplane and Feedsack quilts also were a hit plus those of Red, White, and Blue. Quilters, too, made pictorial quilts with war related scenes and symbols, such as stars, flags, eagles, and crosses. A journal might note the story in each block and include the maker's name. During the war years, used parachutes were repurposed into clothing such as wedding gowns.

Scotties became the most popular dog; both Churchill and Roosevelt owned the breed. In Roosevelt's *State of the Union* address, he referred to four freedoms: speech, worship, want, and fear.

The Nazi's, known for swastikas and evil weren't the first to use the symbol. Their version was clockwise and on point. However, from 2500-1500 BC, a Swastika meant good luck. A common phrase, "Three bad eggs; keep them frying" meaning Hitler, Mussolini, and Hirohito the Emperor of Japan. More in June!

#### TQG Membership Benefits and Value

Membership in the Tucson Quilters Guild helps us stay connected with other quilters, encourages us to quilt for ourselves and for others, and provides us with resources so that we can learn and grow as quilters. While it may be hard to place a value on all of the membership benefits, at least two have quantifiable financial value: the lectures and workshops by nationally known quilt artists and teachers.

**Lectures** — TQG provides free lectures at our monthly meetings up to eight times each year. Attending these lectures at national quilt shows and conferences like Road to California or AQS QuiltWeek Paducah would cost \$20 for each one hour lecture.

**Workshops** — Similarly, TQG provides one and two day workshops up to eight times each year. TQG offers inperson workshops for \$50 for a one-day workshop. These same workshops would cost more than \$100 on average at national quilt shows and conferences.

TQG's membership fee is currently \$30. A member attending just two meetings with interesting lectures or taking just one of the offered workshops would have a wonderful experience that's valued at more than the cost of a TQS membership.

#### Pattern of the Month

#### 50/50 Block: Rectangle in a Square Karen G. Fisher

Last summer I became involved in a project that asked for blocks which were made of two colors, blue and red, in equal amounts. Lots of them together, several thousand in fact, read as being Violet, for the Violet Protest, now on exhibit at the Phoenix Art Museum.


I had great fun figuring out how to get that 50/50 division of colors, and I very quickly made use of the only math that makes sense to me: geometry. All the blocks were 8" x 8", or 64 square inches. If I used one color as the background, I could applique the other color to cover 32 square inches, 50% of the background.

The simplest way to make that 50% was a rectangle, a 4" x 8" rectangle. But how boring is that—a rectangle in a square? BUT, if I cut that rectangle apart into smaller shapes, and used every single bit of those cut up pieces, I could move the pieces around any way I liked, and have the right amount of both colors.

I've developed an applique method that I prefer, which uses fusible interfacing, but the fabric layers are not fused to each other. The interfacing is fused to the applique fabric in the required rectangle size. When the rectangle is cut apart into the desired shapes, they can be machine appliqued with either a zigzag or blanket stitch with matching or contrasting thread.

If you prefer hand applique, cut up the interfacing first, then fuse it to your top fabric with spaces left for cutting the pieces apart. Turn edges under, and hand stitch.







#### Cutting sizes for 50/50 Rectangle in a Square Block

12" finished block: background—12 ½" x 12 ½"; rectangle and interfacing 6" x 12 ½"

9" finished block: background—9 ½" x 9 ½"; rectangle and interfacing 4 ½" x 9 ½"

8" finished block: background—8 ½" 8 ½"; rectangle and interfacing 4" x 8 ½"

As you can probably see, any size block is possible. Just cut your finished size background to include seam allowances, and include seam allowances on the long dimension of the applique fabric and interfacing.

Below are some possible "cutting up" diagrams for the rectangle. Move them around on your background until you like the arrangement, then pin in place. Stitch, using preferred method.

I also used some directionally patterned fabric on one of my samples, and cut it apart along its own design pattern. I then chose to soften the edges with a bit of trimming. Yes, this removed a bit of fabric from my perfect 50/50 balance. But keep in mind, we are making quilts, not building skyscrapers. A small alteration here or there will not cause catastrophe.
