September Speaker and Workshop

Joyce Hughes

(This is a live event but since we won't be meeting until September you must register on-line for the workshop).



Joyce is a self-taught quilter and fiber artist. Her first quilt was a tee shirt quilt which she enjoyed making but felt limited in the ability to express herself artistically. Within several months she began designing pictorial landscape quilts using raw edge applique. Never knowing the rules, she broke a lot of them, but with exciting results.

Amazingly, her first art quilt was entered into a national show and won a blue ribbon. This had led to numerous awards and opportunities in the quilting world. She loves free motion quilting and thread painting. Currently she has fixed on working with fabric panels to create dimension and texture with threads and embellishments, creating a style all her own. Frequently, she says, these panels are looked at and passed over, often with comments such as "What do you do with this?". "It is so big." "The colors are dull". But, with a little embellishing and thread painting, Joyce says that any panel can become a work of art!

TQG PROGRAM INFORMATION

Lecture "My Journey into Quilting"

This is an open and inspiring talk about how Joyce started quilting, leading into art quilts with thread painting, and finally her work with panels. Showing many "before and after" art quilts she also explores how panels can be used as personal projects. You will learn how she prepares the panel and how she layers threads to achieve different effects on the quilts. Then, with ribbons, markers, paint, crystals, and whatever else she can think of, she will show you how to make any panel a unique piece of art.

Workshop Dimensional Thread Painting

Yes, you are creative, and yes, you can do this on your domestic sewing machine! In this class, students will start with a beautiful hummingbird panel and will learn the proper steps of dimensional thread painting while exploring thread selection, machine set-up, bobbin work, embellishment and overlays.



Can't attend the class or still want to know more? Our Guild library has both of Joyce's books, "Thread Painting a Garden Quilt" and "Creating Art Quilts with Panels". Check one out and get painting (thread that is)!

Arizona Documentation Report

"Colorfast Turkey red thread was a popular choice to use on household linens that required frequent laundering such as towels, tray cloths, splashers, and doilies. It was also a natural choice for bed covers and pillow shams."Deborah Harding

The quote above is from Deborah Harding's *Red & White: American Redwork Quilts*. It is a twovolume set with one having pages of narrative along with lovely redwork quilts. The second onsists of redwork patterns. It is a "must" for any redwork lover.

This month, I thought it might be fun to discuss redwork. Something I sometimes have referred to as my "no brainer" love. I collect vintage redwork; I have both blocks and quilts. My Arizona Centennial Quilt is Redwork. I've done redwork since my childhood and still enjoy it.

Redwork, on a white ground, has been around for centuries. During the early years, it likely was a European garment. However, redwork as we know it, had its nudge to popularity at the *Philadelphia Centennial Exposition*. The English Pavilion displayed outline embroidery while the Japanese Pavilion featured artistic subjects in a natural habitat.

By 1885, redwork began to chronicle history, was seen in folk

art, and in story book quilts. Redwork quilts, the generic name for *Penny Square* quilts, continued to be popular throughout the 19th century. Frequently, these weren't quilted, but instead, made into coverlets.

Now for the "red" of redwork. You may have heard of madder red as well as Turkey red. However, there are significant differences in the processes involved between the those of the dying methods of the traditional European madder (dark scarlet or brick red) and Turkey red (closer to carmine).

The complicated multistage process to obtain colorfast Turkey red originated in Turkey. European efforts to replicate it were underway by the 1740s but not successful until 1829. The beauty of Turkey red is that it's colorfast, bright, and a technique used with cotton, not wool.

Several years later, Turkey red threads and dyes were easily obtained in America. It quickly became a favorite with needle workers as it didn't bleed. The cost was higher, but to the needle woman, it was worth every penny! Barbara Brackman noted that in the 1875 -76 Montgomery Ward catalog, Turkey red fabric cost three times more than other red fabrics.

Interest in redwork snowballed. Red on white was popular for anything that could be covered, such as pillow or bed shams, back splashes, tables, tea towels, laundry bags, anything imaginable, including beds! Before the 1900s, patterns were rarely made for quilt blocks. They probably were adapted from a dresser scarf or something else about 9" by 9" in each direction. When designs are uniformly sized, the quilt likely was made after 1910. From the 1860s through the depression, a small piece of muslin could by purchased for a penny. It could then be marked with a pattern from the shopkeeper's pattern book. *Penny Squares* were used to teach young girls basic embroidery skills. Turkey red dye contributed to the popularity due to its colorfastness; the same thing happened with the discovery of colorfast indigo and blue work.

President's Block

President Blocks for Karen Fisher

Karen Fisher has served as our President and we need to show our appreciation. In previous newsletters you were ask to make blocks for her. As of July 1, 2021, 1 have only 8 blocks. There are about 300 members of the guild so let's get more blocks for her. Here's the information you need.

Your block will contain the letter 'K' and will have a maximum distance around the block of 36". Examples:

- 6" x 6" finished block = 24" around
- 9" x 9" finished block = 36" around
- 6" x 10" finished block = 32" around

You may embellish the block with embroidery, rick-rack, lace, etc. Remember that she loves buttons but don't sew them on because they may interfere with the quilting. If you want to include buttons, put your block in a zip lock bag and include the buttons in the bag.

Karen loves bright colors so use a bright color for the background and a second bright that contrasts with your background piece for your 'K'. Get creative!!

& Opportunity Quilt



The quilting was done by Brenda Smitley of Proverbs 31 Quilts. We showed the quilt at the last show and had it appraised for \$2250. It's 88" x 93" (Queen/King size).

We ask that wall hangings include a 2- inch hanging sleeve.

Instances of domestic abuse have increased during the pandemic so the donation of our auction proceeds is greatly needed and appreciated! 
2. You may use any colors.



August 2021 Block of the Month

Square in a Square in a Square in a Square Karen G. Fisher

As Quilters, how many of us have a favorite technique, or two or three, that we use much of the time? We might even avoid some skills because they are too confusing, or timeconsuming. Or if we just change a pattern a teeny, little bit, we can do it another way with a technique we think is easier.

I have to admit I do that too, but I've also been willing to learn whatever new technique will expand my skill set to create the next quilt design that comes into my head.

This month's design is truly easiest to make with Paper Piecing. You know, the upside down and backwards sew-it-to-paper method that works quite perfectly for a design with geometric straight lines and non-standard size pieces. You get to rough-cut all the pieces larger than necessary, then trim to perfection to achieve precision points and corners.

I chose to work with a colorful print fabric, and three tone-on-tones that coordinate with it. The always useful focus fabric method. The fabrics are arranged in four different progressions in four blocks, so they come together nicely at the corners to form another secondary square. These secondary patterns are one of the coolest things about many traditional patterns. You can also make just two fabric arrangements to keep the whole over-all pattern simpler, or even go scrappy with four values from light to mediumlight, to medium-dark, to dark.

The pattern on the following pages is full-size for a 6" block, once you add an outer seam allowance. Included are rough-cut sizes for each "square," and the numbered order for sewing it all together.



Full-size pattern for 6" finished block

Add quarter inch seam allowance to this drawing, before starting to sew fabric pieces in place.

If you want to make a bigger block to start with, enlarge basic pattern to the desired size, THEN add a quarter inch seam all around.

12" block: enlarge 200% 9" block: enlarge 150% 8" block: enlarge 134%

Rough-cut sizes for pieces for each 6" block:

- 1. Center square: $1 2\frac{3}{4}$ " to 3" square
- 2. Next square: 2 3 ¹/₂" squares, cut into 4 half-square triangles
- 3. Third square out: $\operatorname{cut} 2 4$ " squares, cut into 4 half-square triangles
- 4. Fourth square out: cut $2 4\frac{1}{2}$ " squares, cut into 4 half-square triangles

Start with the center square, and sew all four #2 pieces to it. I like to sew two at a time, across from each other. As you sew each one, you can hold it or pin it to the blank side of the paper, so you can see the stitching lines to follow on the other side. This takes a bit of practice, but I expect there are good demo videos on line. As you add each piece, finger press it into place, AWAY from the center.

Using the same methods, attach ALL the #3 Pieces on all four sides, and finger press them away from the center. At any point, you can trim away excess fabric. Be careful to NOT CUT any pieces across the center. Finally add the #4 pieces, trim any seam excess, and press flat.

Trim your block to the correct finished size, $6\frac{1}{2}$ " or larger. Finally, carefully tear away the backing paper along the stitching lines, which are now working as perforations to make the tearing easier.
