After all of the work that goes into celebrating the holidays, it is a pleasure to simply sit and enjoy the quilts of one of our local quilt artists. And this December, we are proud to host "Nubin" Minerd. If you have been a member of the Guild for a while you will undoubtedly recognize her name as she has been a prolific ribbon winner at our own Quilt Fiesta.

Nubin made her first quilt in 1979 while living in England, but didn't really start quilting until the late 1990's. After moving to Arizona in 2001, she began taking classes, dying fabric, and eventually designing quilts and teaching classes. That designing went a step further with the purchase of her long arm in 2004, with custom quilting for clientele not only in Arizona but throughout the United States. Her custom quilting has appeared in various quilting magazines including American Quilter. "Thoroughly Modern Millie", a pattern designed by Nubin, was juried into an AQS show and was featured in one of their videos.

Her quilts have been entered into various categories since 2005, and each year her quilts have earned numerous awards. Many of her custom quilting clients have also won awards and ribbons. Nubin will be presenting a trunk show of her quilts. What a fun way to enjoy the holiday season!

Quilt History

December, 2021
Tucson Quilters Guild

"Happiness is not a destination. It's a way of life." This quote is from the cover of *Quilt Mania* #130, March/April 2019. Doesn't that seem right for the holidays almost upon us as well as the story of *Quilts, Red and Green* you soon will read?

Red, one of my favorite colors, apparently was popular for many others in the 19th century. Last month, Redwork was focused; this time, green will be added. Most antique red and green quilts we see today are floral applique. This movement originated in the eastern United States during the 1830s and eventually spread west. The style remained a favorite for approximately 40 years and then began a gradual decline for the rest of the century.

Three factors appeared to occur simultaneously when this quilt style began. First, improvements were made in textile production so that more fabric was available. Second, transportation improvements allowed greater ease in getting the goods to the population. Third, printing and publishing technology made vast improvements so that newspapers, books, and periodicals came to more households. Magazines such as Godey's Lady's Book and Peterson's Magazine plus others, had both household and decorative articles.

The vibrant red and green color scheme was usually on a white ground and most quilts had either a red or green binding. They were primarily done in block form and usually without sashing. Applique probably was the most common medium and usually mirrored the flowers in nature, although some pieced designs can be found.

Both red and green were durable colors and could be relied on not to fade or run if the dye process was done properly. However, with green, there is no single vegetable dye that produces a color-fast green. Instead, in this early time period, the greens were usually Indigo and Prussian Blue over dyed with chrome yellow. Synthetic

Instead, in this early time period, the greens were usually Indigo and Prussian Blue over dyed with chrome yellow. Synthetic green appeared about 1875, but often was fugitive, fading to tan or brown. I own a Rose Tree Variation where that happened. A sharp eye may detect the green thread originally used in stitching. Turkey Reds were colorfast and dependable, made with a complex process of 13 - 20 steps. In the United States, all Turkey Red was imported. Synthetic reds used after 1875 could fade to pink. The same thread check mentioned with green may be used to check for red.

Most often, elaborate appliqued red and green quilts were made by wealthy women. They had the luxury of time and also had the means to buy the unique fabrics needed to make a fabulous quilt. Frontier women had neither the time nor the resources to do the same. It's also important to remember that little girls were taught to use a needle and thread at a very young age, likely by the age of three. By the age of 10 or 11, she would be quite proficient and probably helped with sewing for the family.

Perhaps by the time she was making quilts for her prospective wedding, she might have more than six quilts in her trousseau, including an appliqued red and green bride's quilt. It would be finely appliqued and a real treasure.

As the sewing machine came into greater use, and the west-ward movement gained momentum, appliqued quilts became less popular. These classic floral beauties, though, are a symbol of a special time and the ladies who lovingly made them.

One thing that's rare to find on any old quilt is a name and date. In Lori Lee Triplett and Kay Triplett's *Hidden Treasures, Quilts from 1600 to 1860*, there is a great example. On two corners of a *Crossed Tulip Quilt*, are the dates 1847 and its maker, Margaret Kramer. This lovely quilt has fringe on three sides.

Red and green weren't only popular colors for quilts. In the early part of the 19th century, they also were used in homes. Drapes, table covers, carpets, and floors were added possibilities.

The colors of red and green, also associated with holiday times, provided many wonderful choices. Today's quilters are blessed with a huge array of stable and colorfast fabrics whether they be in red and green or a combination with something else. Whatever it is you enjoy, just do it! I'll stick with applique and continue my love for quilts of red and green! And, in the meantime, Happy Holidays to each of you!



You have donated nearly 130 small quilts/table runners for the 2022 auction.

The December guild meetings are the final dates for donating small quilts. Small quilts may be any shape- wall hangings or table runners- so long as the piece perimeter measures no more than 100 inches. Wall hangings should include a 2 inch hanging sleeve. Applications are available on the website or at guild meetings.

Our next step is to connect each donated piece with a happy buyer at the 2022 Fiesta! This time we will have two days to accomplish this mission. We will assign a reasonable price and a starting bid amount to each small quilt and participants can either place a bid or buy a piece at the "Buy It Now" price (and take it home right then). I am looking forward to the fun!

Proceeds from the 2022 Small Quilt Auction will go to EMERGE! to support the services they provide for victims of domestic abuse. Instances of domestic abuse have increased during the pandemic, so the donation of our auction proceeds is greatly needed and appreciated! EMERGE provides an emergency hotline, emergency shelter as well as lay legal services, education and counseling for for victims and their families. Coffee and Doughnuts!


Here's a bit of info about typefaces in general. There are hundreds of typefaces that have been developed over hundreds of years, since Mr. Guttenberg started standardizing printed books. One big group of typefaces has "serifs," little extra decorative strokes on the ends of the letters. A second whole big group is "sans (without) serifs"—no extra little decorative strokes. You are looking at Times New Roman, with serifs. Calibri is a popular sans serif style. Serif styles are considered more traditional; sans serif more modern. Next time you want to print something from your computer, look at all the typefaces that are available, and find one you like. A type face might even influence if other people will actually read it!











Once you have all the letters you need for your initials, or any other purpose, try interlocking the letters to fit less space, or to look more decorative than a formally spaced group.
