Robin Ruth

Robin learned to sew in the 70's at a young age from her mother, an accomplished garment seamstress. It was her grandmother who took her to her first quilt class in 1985. Quilting became one of her favorite creative hobbies. She successfully ran and owned a gift store for 16 years in partnership with her mother. After closing the store, Robin refocused her attention on an original ruler she had designed in 1992 for the Mariner's Compass block.

Robin has become an internationally known teacher. She is also a sought-after quilt designer for fabric companies such as FreeSpirit, Windham, and Clothworks. Her quilts have been shown in many shows including International Quilt Festival, QuiltCon, and Road to California. She loves to travel, and her creative inspiration comes from the art, architecture, and nature that she experiences along the way. She and her husband live in Ritzville, Washington.

Join Ruth for a detailed overview of her modern techniques and projects using the Robin Ruth Designs system of rulers, books, and patterns for strip-pieced Mariner's Compass blocks. Workshop

The Modern Mariner's Compass

Learn the basics of this great new method by making a 16-point compass block. Students will choose which kind of compass – Skinny Robin or Fat Robin blocks. The required kit includes either ruler/book combo for making the compass block in 16 different sizes. In class, the students will make an 18" block and also learn great methods for finishing the center and background circles.


Carolyn O'Bagy Davis


Carolyn has written fifteen books on archeology, Western history, and quilting. Her book, *Hopi Summer*, was honored as OneBook Arizona 2011, a project seeking unity through literature. As a life-long quilter with a degree in anthropology, she has lectured extensively to various groups and has curated many traveling museum exhibits.

Carolyn was featured in Quilt Folk magazine, issue 6. She was the founding president of the Tucson Quilters Guild in 1976. In 2010, she was inducted into the Arizona Quilters Hall of Fame.

• Our drape folding party was a great success. A big thank you goes to the nine volunteers that attended and folded 14 bins of black drapes, which are used for Quilt Fiesta. The job was completed in two hours and all the bins were given new labels to clearly identify the contents. The next day the bins were taken to the storage facility where the Quilt Display committee's hardware is stored, and placed in their new home, a small, air-cooled unit for our drapes and tablecloths.

- The reason we refolded all 14 bins of drapes was we found that many drapes were not folded properly to minimize wrinkles. Most of the bins hold 20 drapes, which makes the bin quite heavy. After 360 days of storage in the bins, the slightest wrinkle is almost permanently pressed into the drape. Taking time to properly fold the drapes and smoothing out the wrinkles as they are folded makes a big difference. This gives you an idea of what needs to be done if you want to volunteer to help fold drapes at takedown after the show closes.
- Opportunity Quilt tickets are still available for purchase. See Linda Begega or her helper at a Guild meeting to get your tickets. Don't forget they are great little gifts to give to friends and family. Every ticket purchased helps fund the Quilt Fiesta show.
- It is not too late to volunteer to help with Quilt Fiesta. Volunteers are needed on Wednesday, February 21, 2024, for set up day; Thursday, February 22, 2024, for quilt hanging day; Sunday, February 25, 2024, for take down; and white glove hosts are always needed for all three days of the show. Sign up at Guild meetings or online.
- The Small Quilt Charity Sale will accept donation quilts until February.
- This year quilt drop off will be a little different. It will be held on Tuesday evening, February 13, 2024, from 5:30pm to 7:00pm, and Wednesday morning, February 14, 2024, from 8:30am to 10:30am as usual. However, the difference is it will be held in the Parish Hall where we have our regular Guild meetings, and there will be a guest speaker. There will not be a business meeting, only a speaker. On Tuesday evening the speaker will begin at 7:15pm, and on Wednesday morning the speaker will begin at 10:45am. No quilts will be accepted after 7:00pm on Tuesday or after 10:30am on Wednesday. We hope this new schedule will work for our members and we encourage you to come early, spend the time before the speaker to meet someone new or have a visit with a friend. The Guild library will be open during the drop off times, both days.

QUILT HISTORY

Panels and What Fun They Can Be!

Some of you may have used panels for your quilting. I have a friend that has made beautiful quilts beginning with a panel. However, you may not realize using a panel goes back a great many years. In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, panels were created to make some favorite play things for eager children whose mothers were happy to oblige, likely on a Singer sewing machine. The motifs might be tin soldiers, baby dolls, animals, or puppets; in fact, anything that represented the styles or motifs of the time. Racist caricatures ultimately were included.

The first fabric printed doll was patented in 1886 and printed by Oriental Print Works. Other sites involved with the manufacturing and marketing of cloth dolls and toys were Arnold Print Works, Art Fabric Mills, Selchow and Righter Company and Cocheco Manufacturing. Saalfield Publishing turned its attention to the publication of cloth books. The people behind each of these companies weren't shy about their aggressive marketing policies.

An 1892 *Crazy* quilt, owned by Kathleen Metelica Cray, depicts Arnold Print Works panel dolls and animals appliqued' to the quilt. The commercially made cut and sew dolls were introduced during the 1880s and 1890s and immediately became a resounding success! The fronts and backs of these characters typically were printed on plain-woven cotton or linen in several colors. Lines for cutting and sewing were printed on the fabric, as well as directions for constructing and stuffing. In case the maker wondered about stuffing the toy, suggestions on that were also given. These included cotton, bran, sawdust, dried peas and beans, and rags.

Technology advances made it possible for attractive cloth dolls to become popular. American textile mills, in the mid-19th century, established a printing process called lithography. According to Florence Pettit, "A metal plate was fastened around the drum of a roller-printing press which printed with extreme accuracy. The process involved oil-based inks combined with a wet surface on the principle that oil and water do not mix. Lithographic printing on cloth was limited to a few specialties such as book binding cloth, towels, handkerchiefs, and maps of cloth."



These "Cut and Sew" dolls offered something parents could afford for their daughters and sometimes their sons. A definite contrast to the costly dolls reflecting Victorian life and made in either France or Germany. I collect dolls and I have one from each end of the spectrum, as well as many in between. As I noted earlier, panels weren't limited to dolls. Arnold Print Works, in 1892, launched a "Tabby Cat and Kittens" panel. Probably very popular with the families who had a cat and or kittens living with them. In case you have wondered about price, the Tabby Cat panel sold for 10 cents for a half yard of cloth while eight kittens on one yard of cloth sold for 20 cents. Does all this inspire you to go shopping for a panel? If you do, I hope you enjoy it!
