

## President's Message

Dear Tucson Quilt Guild Members,

As we embrace the arrival of April, wildflowers in Tucson, and the blossoms in the desert, I hope this letter finds you well, happy, and on an inspired, creative journey.

Foremost on our agenda this month, I am reaching out to you with a heartfelt plea and an exciting opportunity to shape the future of our beloved quilt guild. I want to extend my gratitude to all of you who have contributed your time, passion, and creativity to our guild over the years. It is because of your unwavering support that we have been able to thrive as a guild.

Organizations evolve over time to meet their members' needs and remain current and relevant. In this effort, we are implementing new terms for board positions, reducing the commitment to just one year and doing away with term limits for those who want to remain in office. This change aims to make it easier for members to participate in leadership roles, fostering a more dynamic and inclusive environment within our guild. Please consider stepping forward and offering your skills, ideas, and energy to serve on the board or committees. Together, we can ensure that our guild continues to evolve and adapt to the changing needs of our community.

I must also address a pressing concern that requires urgent attention. We are currently in dire need of a new co-director for our Quilt Fiesta! 2025 show. Without a co-director for 2025, there is a real possibility that we may not be able to host the show in 2026 as there will be no co-chair in training to take over in 2026. This event is not only a highlight of our quilting community, but it also is the largest source of revenue for us to pay our speakers and the rent at St Frances Cabrini. I'm sure you can see the domino effect this will have on the future of our guild if this income disappears.

I understand that taking on such a responsibility may seem daunting, but I want to assure you that the Quilt Fiesta! group is a successful, well-oiled machine with many experienced committees to get the work done – the co-directors are coordinators with well-defined job descriptions. You'd have lots of help and would be shadowing Kathie Gilbert in 2025 to take on her job in 2026 and training the co-chair for 2027. Please see any board member to talk about what role you are considering. Or write to me at info@tucsonquiltersguild.com. If you are thinking, "not me", turn it around to say, "why not me, I can do this."

In other news, many of you signed up for Grouper, a Medicare supplement and advantage plan that will reimburse you for your TQG dues. ### Janet Carruth


Janet is an Arizona native and, as the daughter of a home economics teacher, learned her way around cloth, thread, and the sewing machine at an early age. In 1978, she and Laurene Sinema opened The Quilted Apple in Phoenix. That same year, Janet co-founded the Arizona Quilt Guild. Always interested in the historical aspects of quilting, Janet was an organizer of the Arizona Quilt Project and served as chairman of the book committee. The project documented more than 3,000 quilts and culminated in two exhibits and the book *Grand Endeavors*. She has also authored numerous books, magazine articles, and scholarly papers. Janet was honored to be inducted into the Arizona Quilters Hall of Fame in 2009.


### Program

## GUILD NEWS

### **By-Laws Update – Voting at the May Meetings**

The Guild by-laws were last amended in April of 2022. The Board has recently approved a couple of major changes that the membership will be voting on at the May General Meetings.

1) We have eliminated term limits. Originally, it was felt that the skills required for Treasurer would limit our ability to replace that position every two years. But, realistically, in recent years we have had problems filling many of our Board and Standing Committee positions, so we decided to eliminate the 2-year requirement altogether. If a member is willing, and is in good standing with the Board, they may run again for another term.

2) The Program Co-Chair terms will now be staggered just like the Quilt Show Co-Chair positions. The first year of their term will be as co-chair and then in the second year they will take over as the full Programs Chair.

3) Currently, the Vice-President and President are two-year terms each with the expectation that the Vice-President will become the next President, effectively making this a 4-year commitment. The change will be much like the 2 Co-Chair positions whereby the Vice-President will serve 1 year and then become President in their 2nd year.

4) All of these changes necessitated a change in the election cycle. EVERY year we will now need to elect a Vice-President, Program Co-Chair, and Quilt Show Co-Chair. In even numbered years we will also elect a Membership Director, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, and Member-at-Large.

5) Simplification of the job descriptions in the by-laws. Complete descriptions and explanation of duties can be found on the website under the Guild Business heading.

There were other smaller changes to the by-laws that I encourage you to review. Also found under Guild Business, I have added the full document with all changes highlighted.

# SMALL QUILT SALE

Small Quilt Charity Sale

Thank you Quilters, you have done it again! Our Small Quilt Charity Sale (SQCS) at the 2024 Quilt Fiesta was a success! We sold 173 small quilts and collected over \$4500 which will be split between our two beneficiary agencies, AVIVA and Old Pueblo Community Services (OPCS). We will invite representatives from these agencies to attend a guild meeting to accept checks (probably in May). A BIG Thank You to everyone who donated small quilts for the sale and also a Thank You to everyone who bought small quilts. Please give yourselves a round of applause!

For new members- we raise funds at the annual Quilt Fiesta Small Quilt Charity Sale to donate to local nonprofit agencies. Orphan blocks (Lamentables) and small quilts in various stages of completion are available at monthly guild meetings for members to take and finish into small quilts or "Lovlies" (typically with 100-inch perimeters or less). Members may also make or donate small quilts from projects/challenges of their own- wall hangings, table runners, baby quilts etc.). We then collect these finished pieces to sell at the Fiesta. An entry form (so we know who to thank!) is typically available in this newsletter or at guild meetings.

We have concluded a successful 2024 Fiesta and can begin preparations for the 2025 Fiesta SQCS. During the month of April, we ask guild members to submit names of local agencies to be considered as beneficiaries of the 2025 Small Quilt Charity Sale. Agency names can be submitted via email to <u>quiltfiesta@tucsonquiltersguild.com</u>. Please include the Small Quilt Sale and/or Wendy in your email so your suggestions can be directed to the appropriate committee. You may also bring a written suggestion to the guild meeting to turn in at the table where we collect small quilt donations and provide blocks to be finished.

### **QUILT HISTORY** by Susan Franklin, PhD

## **Baltimore Album Applique' - Part 2**

Robert Shaw refers to the period 1840 - 1860 as the Golden Age of Applique'. Elizabeth Warren, curator of the American Folk Art Museum in New York, offers four reasons for its heightened popularity. 1) It was fashionable to make album quilts with a variety of techniques, such as cut out chintz applique', piecing (rare), or embroidery, 2) increased availability of cheaper fabrics by mid-century. It was better for applique than the more expensive chintz. Chintz had a limited number of repeats that could be used, thus, making it less useful for appliqued' quilts. Quilters also began to prefer blocks over medallions for their quilts, 3) Pennsylvania Germans began to adopt the quilt making traditions of their English American neighbors. Previously, they had slept under heavy home woven ticks filled with straws and feathers. Circa 1830, quilters began to incorporate German motifs such as rosettes, birds, flowers in pots, lilies, and tulips into their quilts, and 4) Pennsylvania German folk art incorporated much red and green. This led to enjoying the use of red and green as a traditional applique' color choice.



Other fabrics used were ombre' prints, those that gave a "rainbow" effect, and all over prints (vermiculates), Turkey red prints or solids (pinks, chrome yellow and cheddar) and the many unusual prints available, per Trestain. Also, occasionally wool and velvet were incorporated. Both European and U.S. block and roller printing were used.

Per Kiracofe, quilters employed wide selections of fabrics in order to create variety and dimension to their work.

In Rita Verroca's book, *Baltimore Album of Roses*, she talks about the women who stitch album blocks. Rita was a *Guild* speaker and workshop leader in 2016. Rita was excellent and kept the attention of the group the entire time. She noted that many *Baltimore Album* (BA) quilts carry almost identical or at least similar designs. Rita concluded that there was a group called "The Ladies of Baltimore" and that they created these wonderful quilts under the tutelage of Achsah Goodwin. Achsah was the daughter of William Goodwin, of Lyde. He was a wealthy merchant and senior partner in the mercantile house of Goodwin, Russell, and McBride. As William Rush Dunton, who first identified *Baltimore Album* quilts, relates in his book, *Old Quilts*, Achsah suffered from a cutaneous disease that left her unable to sew.

In spite of her affliction, she was able to lay out lovely Broderie Perse quilts, demonstrating great taste and a talent for design. During this time, Maryland was experiencing a huge influx of immigrants from both Germany and Ireland who were able to supply cheap labor. With the help of slaves and immigrants, Achsah was able to complete splendid



quilts. Her father was so impressed that he displayed them in his shop window!



A *Baltimore Album* quilt is defined as one that is made by someone living in Baltimore during the period 1846 – 1854. The height of popularity was 1850.

The blocks usually were large, about 18" square with the smallest being 12" square. Some blocks were separated by sashing; others were not. The same is true of borders;



some had them, and others did not. Sampler quilts included non-repeating blocks. Robert Shaw noted that the best of these quilts has long been considered to "represent a pinnacle of American quilt making technique and design sophistication." BA quilts contained images of images of Baltimore life; ships, churches, people, monuments, and military heroes. They also were given as gifts to departing pasters leaving for their next assignment. I'm currently working on the Rev. Hezikiah Best block (1847).

## Tucson Quilt Guild Block of the Month


### Block 1 - Kansas City Star Quilt Pattern Collection

The Kansas City Star published the Album block on September 26, 1928. The album quilt is a real old-timer. Its original purpose was a gift for a bride-to-be. A group of friends would get together and each would piece a block and embroider her own name upon it. Then of course, they would all come to the quilting bee, and the result, while not exactly a bride's shower, would be something in store for a rainy day.

The Kansas City Star newspaper began printing quilt block patterns in 1928, and they continued this publication for 34 years. These quilt patterns were featured regularly in the newspaper, and they hold a special place in quilting history. The goal of the newspaper was to increase readership among women, and quilting was popular with women at that time.

Due to publication of newspaper space restraints, a brief description of the block history and sparse instructions for block construction was given in addition to the templates. In general, the reader was instructed to cut cardboard templates of the exact same size in the newspaper, trace the shape onto fabric with a pencil, add the seam allowance of their choice before cutting, and assemble the blocks.

There will be nine blocks from the Kansas City Star newspaper which have been selected for the 2024 BOM. Blocks selected will use a variety of sewing techniques. Wherever possible, we have attempted to 'modernize' the published pattern to avoid the use of templates. The diagrams will not be to scale unless there is a template for the block. Throughout the year, we will accept any blocks for donation to construct charity quilts for Quilts for Others. A date will be selected in January for volunteers to put quilts together.



### **Cutting Instructions**


Background/White		Color	
А	two-5 <sup>1</sup> / <sub>2</sub> " square cut on diagonal 2 times	Е	eight-3" square
В	two-3" square cut on diagonal 1 time		
С	two-3" square		
D	one-3" x 8"		

### FINISH

Add to center 3" x 8" rectangle a signature, word(s) of wisdom or a saying. You can embroider, either by and or machine, or use permanent pen. If using permanent pen please press to set ink.

Trim block to 11" unfinished, 10 1/2 finished make sure to leave 1/4" at each point
