Arlene has been quilting for more than 50 years and remembers using cereal boxes to make templates; she appreciates all the special materials and tools now available to quilters! Since the beginning, Arlene has been drawn to appliqué designs, choosing to create them with hand appliqué techniques. This year marks the 30<sup>th</sup> year of her pattern company, Arlene Walsh Designs, for which she has designed more than 100 patterns, many featuring images of the Southwest.

When Arlene returned to quilting after a break due to illness, she found that quilters were more interested in machine work instead of hand. She became friends with her sewing machine and embraced using it for her oneof-a-kind appliqué designs. Arlene's current passion is collage.

### Janet Carruth


Janet is an Arizona native and, as the daughter of a home economics teacher, learned her way around cloth, thread, and the sewing machine at an early age. In 1978, she and Laurene Sinema opened The Quilted Apple in Phoenix. That same year, Janet co-founded the Arizona Quilt Guild. Always interested in the historical aspects of quilting, Janet was an organizer of the Arizona Quilt Project and served as chairman of the book committee. The project documented more than 3,000 quilts and culminated in two exhibits and the book *Grand Endeavors*. She has also authored numerous books, magazine articles, and scholarly papers. Janet was honored to be inducted into the Arizona Quilters Hall of Fame in 2009.


#### Program



# GUILD NEWS

### **By-Laws Update – Voting at the April Meetings**

The Guild by-laws were last amended in April of 2022. The Board has recently approved a couple of major changes that the membership will be voting on at the May General Meetings.

1) We have eliminated term limits. Originally, it was felt that the skills required for Treasurer would limit our ability to replace that position every two years. But, realistically, in recent years we have had problems filling many of our Board and Standing Committee positions, so we decided to eliminate the 2-year requirement altogether. If a member is willing, and is in good standing with the Board, they may run again for another term.

2) The Program Co-Chair terms will now be staggered just like the Quilt Show Co-Chair positions. The first year of their term will be as co-chair and then in the second year they will take over as the full Programs Chair.

3) Currently, the Vice-President and President are two-year terms each with the expectation that the Vice-President will become the next President, effectively making this a 4-year commitment. The change will be much like the 2 Co-Chair positions whereby the Vice-President will serve 1 year and then become President in their 2nd year.

4) All of these changes necessitated a change in the election cycle. EVERY year we will now need to elect a Vice-President, Program Co-Chair, and Quilt Show Co-Chair. In even numbered years

we will also elect a Membership Director, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, and Member-at-Large.

## **Baltimore Album Applique' - Part 1**

*Every Experience deeply felt in life needs to be passed along, whether it be through words and music, chiseled in stone, painted with a brush, or sewn with a needle. It's a way of reaching for immortality. Thomas Jefferson.* I've used that quote often, sometimes to begin a lecture, often to ink on a quilt, and also to print on paper and then hang in my sewing room. I discovered the quote on a quilt block made by Marylou McDonald, a noted *Baltimore Album* authority and teacher. I've loved it ever since.

Please consider two phrases, "sewn with a needle" and "a way of reaching for immortality." Isn't that what we're all about? These quilts usually were made by middle- or upper-class women. The quilts represented their best work and perhaps, their masterpieces. Sometimes, the quiltmakers are noted by a label on their quilts, but sadly, often they were not. Regardless, these beauties are a testament to the skill and lasting endurance of the makers' talents.

To set the stage for this period, let's look at two broad categories: Culture and technology and how they intermingled. 1830: Block printing of fabric was rarely used; instead, engraved copper cylinders were used for each color. 1830-40: New England

textile mills produced millions of yards of fabric annually. Also, rapid railway expansion meant fabric was available to distant places. 1840s: Baltimore was a prosperous port town, on the brink of full industrialization. 1844: John Mercer introduced "mercerizing" aimed at increasing the strength of the cotton and Elias Howe invented the sewing machine. Jumping ahead a bit, in 1851, the Singer sewing machine company was founded; their time payments made the machines affordable to anyone with a steady income. 1849: Walter Hunt invented the safety pin. In 1850, Margaret Knight (12 years old) invented a device that stopped the motion of machinery in textile mills, thus preventing injuries. Another of her inventions, a machine to make flat bottomed bags, is still in use today. Finally, in 1856, the discovery of aniline (indigo plant) per Kiracofe, increased the range of colors available for the weaving and printing of textiles.

Productivity also increased on the farm. In 1831, Cyrus McCormick invented the reaping machine. This enabled the farmer to cut 10-12 acres rather than one acre by hand. This was soon followed in 1837 by the invention of the steel plow by John Deer. In the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, comfort also increased in the home. Steam radiators, ice machines, new stoves and lamps became available. There was more delineation between the city and the country, with the negative outcome that quilt designs took longer to get to the quilters farther from town.

#### Applique' Quilts and Their Story

Late 18<sup>th</sup> century and early 19<sup>th</sup> century: Medallion quilts were popular and made with chintz applique. A dominant central design was framed by smaller appliqued' pieces. Persian embroidery or Broderie Perse, was done with chintz fabric that had been imported from England. This practice continued until about 1840.

Submission deadline for the next newsletter is the 20<sup>th</sup> of the month.


