### Library: Log Cabin Quilts

Pioneers built log cabins for survival; it was the material they had, and they needed something for shelter.

The first log cabin quilt I made – red center for the hearth and brown strips for all the logs. It was simple but fun and easy. Several quilts entered in the Quilt Fiesta use some kind of Log Cabin design.

The TQG library has a variety of Log Cabin books, those already cataloged and some waiting to be processed. There are traditional Log Cabin designs: 101 log cabin blocks or 202 little log cabin blocks. Simple books on traditional patterns and projects. Half log cabin block designs. Log Cabins designs "in the round", creating with curves. We have books that promote log cabins using new techniques for these traditional quilts. There are Log Cabin workbooks, basically coloring pages where you try out different colors and prints. Books that illustrate creating a row of houses use log cabin designs. Some books look beyond the traditional pattern: log cabin quilts with attitude or Beyond log cabins. Another book "Log Cabin Restructured" has patterns for making triangles, diamonds, hexagons and curves, geometric shapes that the pioneers never lived in. "Log Cabin with a Twist" still has you cutting strips, but the patterns created are very different.

So, you have all this fabric, simple to cut strips, a log cabin could be just the inspiration you're looking for.

### Show & Tell Update

A favorite part of every guild meeting is Show & Tell, when we get to ooh and ahh over the creative endeavors of our members. In order to make it more organized and to avoid potential disasters, here are some new procedures.

• We need four volunteers each month to help. Two will be on the stage and two on the floor.

- The helper on the right will hand the quilts to the helpers on stage. Several quilts can be lined up ahead of time.
- The two helpers on the stage will open the quilt then slowly walk to the other end of the stage. This way everyone gets a good look at the quilts.
- The helper on the left will receive the quilts and hand them to their owner. (One of the tables by Programs can be used by the owner to fold the quilts.)
- The microphone stand will be moved to the front of the podium to protect all the cords behind the tables connected to the computer.
- No more passing the microphone back and forth or placing it on the table. It's a delicate and expensive piece of equipment.
- The person showing the quilt will proceed to the microphone, introduce themselves, and talk about their project.

We're hoping that these changes will make Show & Tell more enjoyable for everyone!

## **Quilts of Red and Green**

A winning combination for beautiful quilts, whether they be applique' or pieced is red and green. This pairing is especially popular around the Christmas holidays. I wonder how many of you readers have made a special quilt of red and green for either a family member or a dear friend. Probably quite a few. Since I like both colors, especially red, I've made many quilts using those colors, both large and small.

Considering applique' quilts primarily, in a 1998 issue of the *Vintage Quilt and Textile Society*, Carolyn Miller notes that most antique red and green quilts seen today are floral applique'. This became popular in the Eastern United States during the 1830s and worked Westword. It remained popular for about 40 years, gradually declining during the latter part of the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

The red and green color scheme was almost always done on a white ground and bound with either red or green. The green generally was a dark green and the red likely a Turkey red. Block sizes for both appliqued and pieced quilts varied. Popular during the mid-1800s were *Friendship* quilts. These quilts may have contained both pieced and appliqued blocks, sometimes with sashing and other times without. If sashing was used, it likely would be very narrow so it wouldn't detract from appliqued designs. Occasionally, plain blocks were used alternately with appliqued blocks so that "stuffed" work or intricate quilting could be featured between the blocks.

Carrie Hall tells of one young woman's clever use of the plain block. If this was a wedding quilt, the prospective bridegroom was asked to draw a design for the bride-to-be to quilt on those blocks. Hopefully, the results would be admired by all, but never copied. Everyone understood that the pattern was sacred to this particular quilt. That idea spread and husbands-to-be designed stars, linked wedding rings, leaves, anything that caught their imagination. Wouldn't it be fun to have that done on a special quilt that you have made?

Back to green, around 1850, a new aniline dye was developed that produced a more colorfast product. Green was produced by initially dying the fabric yellow and then overdying it with blue, or by reversing the process. Rarely did the two colors have the same degree of color fastness, but that was part of the charm. Combining the Turkey red mentioned earlier with green created many beautiful applique' and pieced quilts for both family members and friends. The Turkey in Turkey red does not refer to Turkey, but to the Mediterranean area of the world. Another interesting fact about Turkey red fabric is its colorfastness. Because of that, it sold for three times the amount of ordinary calico.

Red and green applique' "best" quilts were usually stitched without sashing between the blocks. If the maker desired sashing, it would be very narrow so it would not detract from the bold and beautiful applique' designs.



### **Tucson Quilt Guild Block of the Month Block 7**

Kansas City Star Quilt Pattern Collection; Published June 1929 Bird's Nest – Someone with a modern flare called this quilt pattern a Bird's Nest. The ten triangles being the nest and the square turquoise pieces the eggs. Be that it may, we cast no vote, the simple design makes an attractive quilt or a single pillow about 14 inches square. An effective border may be pieced of white and turquoise squares like the center of the block.

Lt teal	4 – 2 ½ sq	Dk brown	2-4 7/8 sq cut diag (4 total)
Dk Teal	5 - 2 ½ sq	Peach	2-2 7/8 sq cut on diag (4 total)
BG	36 – 1 ½ sq	BG	6-2 7/8 sq cut diag (12 total) 8 for HSTs 4 for triangles in the corner unit.

### **CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS – BG = background**

### FINISH

Square in Square Units

- 1. Draw line corner to corner on BG  $1 \frac{1}{2}$  sq
- 2. Add step 1 using stitch and flip method
- 3. Total 9 units
- 4. Add dk teal with lt teal to make 4 units Birds in the air unit (corner)
- 1. Use 4 peach and 4 BG triangles to make 4 HST
- 2. Trim  $2\frac{1}{2}$  sq unfinished
- 3. Add 8 BG triangle using original diagram above
- 4. Add 4 dk brown triangles to unit created in steps 1 and 2
- 5. Trim to  $4\frac{1}{2}$  sq unfinished

### Finishing

- 1. Lay out corner units and square in square units using original diagram above
- 2. Block is 10 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" unfinished, 10" finished
