VOLUNTEERS – IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR QUILT FIESTA TAKE DOWN

When the show closes, the entire hall will be cleared of all people except vendors and Quilt Fiesta committee members responsible for their exhibits. All others, including volunteers and people waiting to pick up quilts after takedown will meet or wait in one of the designated classrooms.

All decorations will only be handled by members of the Decoration committee.

All signs will only be handled by members of the Sign committee.

Volunteers will be given a specific task by the Takedown Point of Contact (POC). When the task is complete, they will go to the POC for the next task where their help is needed.

It is important to remember that this process is followed to ensure the safety of all involved and the proper handling of Quilt Fiesta equipment for takedown and storage.

All equipment is prepared for storage at takedown. It is then moved to our storage unit where it remains until next year's show, so it is very important to handle, sort, inventory, and pack all equipment carefully and as instructed. Your special handling prepares the quilt show equipment for a quick and orderly setup at the next show.





2/13: Blended Hexagons came about because of a very unique way of cutting squares that Judy discovered while playing in her sewing room. So everything you see in the quilt, even if your eyes don't believe it, is made using a square to start. No wedge ruler, no measuring angles, just squares that eventually become the titular hexagons. She will share her techniques during this class.





"My favorite quilts are scrappy and spontaneous. I love the look of bright colors combined in interesting and unexpected ways."



DEMYSTIFYING DESIGN for FOUNDATION PAPER PIECING

4/10: This is my favorite class to teach in part because I don't know anyone else who teaches quite what I offer. You'll learn to create foundations for everything from traditional blocks to pictorial quilts. We'll start with designing foundations for simple blocks then move to more complex blocks. In the process, you'll discover when foundation piecing is the best piecing process for you. You'll



design a block, and you'll design a small pictorial quilt working from a photograph.

While there won't be quilt police in the classroom, you will meet the Paper Police© who will become your new BFFs on your journey to design for FPP. Their goal is your success. You'll create patterns for a block that is uniquely yours and a pattern for a pictorial quilt. You'll be creating quilts with extreme angles, sharp points, precision piecing, easy cutting, one-of-a-kind images and more before you know it.

Dana went on to be the editor of Quilters Newsletter and SAQA Journal (Studio Art Quilt Associates) before she went on to write her book about the quilters of Caohagan Island, a 13 mile island in the Philippines where the men and women quilt to support themselves..

She's taught FPP, foundation paper piecing, her passion, all over the US and Canada. In 2022, she taught and spoke at International Quilt Festival in Houston and at Amerian Quilter's Society shows in Daytona Beach and Grand Rapids. She continues her classes in person and via Zoom from her home in Colorado.

Quilting for Others

I trust we all had a very happy and blessed holiday season. As we ring in the new year of 2025, let us celebrate and continue our giving spirit to the Tucson community.

In December, with your gracious and loving help, your Quilting for Others team was able to warm and lift the spirits of many of our local community.

Besides comforting our wonderful furry friends at the Humane Society with at least 30 pet beds, we were able to provide 220 holiday stockings to Candlelighters, 168 to Ronald McDonald House as well as a pillowcase and 4 quilts. We also supported our local Meals on Wheels with 29 quilts and 80 stockings, along with 4 pillowcases. The Marshall Home for Men received 10 quilts.

A reminder, there is no meeting in January, however our February meeting will be at Cathey's Down the Block location. Those details will be in a separate article in this newsletter. We will not be providing any giveaways, 3 yard bundles or quilts to be quilted, however, we are prepared to receive anything you might have for us.

We also are excited to announce that our subgroup, "What Will You Make?" has their very own storage unit, two doors down from the "Quilting for Others" unit! It certainly helped to relieve the strain on our space.... More importantly, this will enable the two groups to provide even more for our community. You might not realize it, but Quilting for Others receives the various donations, performs a triage of sorts and then distributes items that we cannot use to the Assistance League in Tucson. The other fabrics, notions and machines are then curated into bundles for you to fashion into quilt tops, other fabric goes to "What Will you Make?" so they can assemble rolls, squares, and leftovers for sale at the Quilt Fiesta! Any machines we receive are checked out by a technician (usually Cathey's) and then given to a good "home." We work quite hard all year, but most of all we have a lot of fun, and we are proud to represent you, the members of the Tucson Quilters Guild. Let's have another fantastic year of serving the community of Tucson.....hugs and kisses....

QUILT HISTORY

According to Patricia Cox, "American Quilt Classics", a hexagon, with its six sides, is one of the most used as well as most familiar of all geometric designs. Some British examples date before 1800. The design also was popular in the United States, but there, the design was known as honeycomb or mosaic.

"Grandmother's Flower Garden" is probably one of the most popular designs. I have a quilt by that name that was originally made by my husband, Greg's grandmother. The hexagon flowers usually have a path between them, thus, focusing on the beauty of each one.

By 1835, the pattern was so popular, that it was published in "Godey's Ladies Book", a popular and very influential women's magazine. It featured not only needlework, but also fashion and home decor. On each side of the Atlantic, one quilt border was frequently based on the hexagon design.



The quilts in the Patricia Cox collection were mainly from the 1930s. Cream or white fabric was used for the background pieces with yellow centers clearly evident. The rosette forming the basis of the traditional Honeycomb patterns worked in this period frequently were made from feedsacks as they were widely available during this depression era.

Without question, the most common pattern during this period was "Grandmother's Flower Garden." Some other

names for this quilt included "French Bouquet" or "Flowers in the Fields" which is an old Welsh name.



Many early tops were comprised entirely of small hexagons, and they could be arranged to form a pattern that looked somewhat like a "Bee hive" or "Honeycomb". The "Honeycomb" Mosaics mentioned earlier likely were influenced by mosaic floors and table tops popular at that time. They were created from small pebbles, pieces of glass, and tile.

To make hexagons, the technique used is called English paper piecing. The fabric is stitched by hand to a paper hexagon template. Kathleen Tracy has a good description of this in her book, "The Civil War Sewing Circle."

I own both books that I mentioned, and I think they each are excellent. If you decide to make something with Hexagons, enjoy! I have a number of them that I made some years ago. I think it's time that I used them; perhaps, to make a doll quilt.
