

### President's Message: You Just Keep Giving

Embroiled in the preparations for Ouilt Fiesta, with its deadlines, committee meetings, quilt hanging and volunteering, it is easy to lose sight of the big picture. I was reminded of that when I read the Quilt Fiesta article which appeared in the Arizona Daily Star titled "Tucson quilt show this weekend to help charities". Sure, we quilt for enjoyment and to stretch our creative muscles, but we also donate our time, fabric, supplies, and our craft through giving. This year the Small Quilt Auction received and sold more than 200 quilts. This event first appeared at Quilt Fiesta in 2013 with a live auction, morphed into a silent auction, and now the quilts are priced to sell. Almost every quilt was sold this year, bringing in revenues of \$3800 for Literacy Connects and Casa Alitas Ouilt for a Cause has been associated with our Guild since its inception in 2003. The brainchild of Guild member Jeannie Coleman and with the help of Guild member Carol Zupancic, it began with 208 quilts donated by you and other quilters around Arizona and the west. Their first live auction was a resounding success and with your continued generosity, they have now donated more than \$1M within Southern Arizona in the fight against breast and gynecological cancers. QFaC became an independent 501(c)3 in 2004 but its long association with the Guild makes for a wonderful partnership. Sadly, Jeannie lost her own battle with breast cancer in 2017 but what a legacy these 2 quilters have left behind!

And, lest we not forget Quilting for Others, also had a presence at Quilt Fiesta in the form of Books and Bits and Fabric Sales. Not only do Kate Verbeke and Kathie Miller sort fabrics, make kits, collect finished quilts, stockings, and fabric scraps for pet beds which are ultimately distributed to the community, but they also pick up donations from a variety of sources. This



vear there were an enormous number of donations from both current and past guild members, resulting in Quilt Fiesta revenues of over \$6000.

Quilting Arts Magazine recently asked their readers to put themselves into camps - Camp 1 was for those quilters who created holiday quilts with a lot of planning and lead time. Camp 2 were the quilters who worked on and immediately gifted their quilts. But I like the reader who responded that there should be Camp 3 – the generous quilters making quilts for charities. That is us in spades, don't you think?

Class: Thursday, April 10, 2025 - Demystifying Design for Foundation Paper Piecing

Extreme angles, sharp points, precision piecing, easy patch cutting, one-of-a-kind images and

more are all possible with paper piecing. In this design class, you'll learn how to create

foundations for everything from traditional blocks to pictorial quilts. We'll start with foundation

design for traditional blocks to more complex blocks. We'll meet the Paper Police whose rules

make FPP design possible. Then you'll design your own block. Next, you'll learn a few more Paper Police rules before designing

a simple pictorial quilt working from a photo or drawing you bring to class. Whether you're new to paper piecing or an experienced paper piecer, this class is for you. Continued on page 5.

Skills taught in the class will include:

- Determining the number of foundations needed.
- Numbering foundations for piecing order.
- Labeling foundations and marking them for joining to other foundations.
- Making templates for cutting patches for on-grain piecing and efficient use of fabric.
- Making curves with straight lines.

This is a technique class, but you will take home log-cabin and kite blocks, foundations for several more blocks, and a design for a quilt that is uniquely yours.

### Supply List (Also, See the website for a printable list)

Photo to use to design a quilt. Keep it simple. For example, one animal, one building, one flower. If you want the instructor to review your image before class, email it to her at danaellenjones@gmail.com. The instructor will have photos for you to use if you are not able to find one to bring.

Kit from instructor: \$25 paid to instructor in class by cash or check. This kit will be provided to save individuals the expense of buying expensive art supplies in quantities beyond what will be needed in class. It will include:

- Mechanical pencil, HB or B lead
- Eraser
- 1" x 12" clear, flat ruler with 1/8" grid
- Fine-tip Sharpie
- 3 sheets of 8.5" x 11" vellum paper with 8 squares/inch grid. The instructor will have larger size for classroom use.
- 1 sheet template plastic
- 2 sheets 8.5" x 11" vellum for tracing. The instructor will have a larger size for classroom use.
- Multiple pages of full-color handouts for use after class plus handouts of in-class use.

Plus, the use of instructor's supplies such as colored pencils, larger vellum grid paper, and larger and smaller gridded rulers.

# swan sheridan

Free Motion Quilt Laboratory Workshop

5/15: "Do you find it difficult to know where to start with your free motion work? Do you have a project that is hard to plan for?

Bring a finished quilt top to Free Motion Quilt Lab and get the guidance you need! Learn to make choices about your specific project,

discover tricks to make your projects more approachable, and ultimately create a personal plan for the project you bring to class. Swan will help you test your plan, tailor it to your abilities, and help you to organize an order of operations (where to begin and where to finish)."

On any given day, you can find this quilt artist half buried in fabric, brandishing her needle and thread, and otherwise surrounded by implements of creativity.

Swan's interest in all things textile related began when she was very young. She tried everything from spinning wool, to cross-stitch and finally landed in the world of quilting during grad school as she awaited the birth of her first nephew. She dabbled in appliqué with that first quilt in the interests of covering a mistake and thus did necessity become the mother of invention. Fast forward to 2009, when Swan refined her appliqué skills and designed her own quilts. Swan began producing patterns for sale in early 2013 and regularly exhibits her work in local and national shows. She teaches in Phoenix and around the country, offering classes in appliqué, color, machine and hand quilting, and decorative stitches. Formerly from Tuccon, she currently lives in Phoenix, Arizona with her superhero husband and artist daughter.





8/9: In this workshop quilters will take that panel they fell in love with and turn it into something truly unique. We'll discuss how to square up your panel segments, add interesting block treatments and borders and we'll cover the basics of graphing, adding coping strips and more, all guaranteed to make your panel project a success. There will be an overview of other techniques to create a beautiful project and time to begin designing your quilt





It is my dream to inspire you to have fun and discover what you can create. My teaching style is very relaxed and I provide plenty of group instruction, along with helping individual students with their projects. I want students to have fun while becoming inspired and learning new techniques.

Cyndi is a quilt artist, author, long-arm quilter, teacher and lecturer who revels in finding simple solutions to complex questions about quilt making and quilt design.

Her newest book covers the HOW-TOs for creating amazing panel quilts - math, drawing your own patterns to piece or paper-piece, words for Montage style quilts and so much more!



They asked, we said yes of course! The Candlelighters requested pillowcases for their Prom in April. Your Quilting for Others group is asking that you look through your stash and see if you can spare some time to make a few pillowcases for the February and March meetings. If you cannot make any, but still would like to help, you can put together kits for others in our guild to make.

Here is what you need:

3/4 yard WOF for body

2" WOF strip for the flange

9" WOF strip for the cuff

That's all! Put it all in a storage baggie and bring it to the meeting.

If you would like to make the pillowcase, here is a step-by-step tutorial to help you.

You now have enclosed French seams and the Pillowcase has no loose threads on the inside.

Voila! Finished size 30" x 19".

### **QUILT HISTORY**

Most of us consider quilts to be used to provide physical warmth. While that is true, there are other reasons, as well. Fleur Bresler and her family lived with many beloved and beautiful quilts for years. They hung on walls, covered their beds, and were carefully and lovingly draped over beautiful antique racks. Grandchildren, family members, and other visitors loved, admired, and were comforted by them.

What is surprising about Fleur, though, is that she originally grew up without any quilts! However, she did make doll clothes as a child. At one time, a friend invited her to a *Quilting Bee*, and she enjoyed it. She was not at all intimidated by the group or the challenge of quilting. She even had the idea of making a quilt for each of her six children.

Fleur liked the idea of collecting quilts; she did not get too excited about making her own. Ultimately, in 2000, Fleur decided that it would be wise to donate the bulk of her collection, the quilts spanning nearly 200 years, to the *Mint Museum of Craft and Design*, located in Charlotte, North Carolina in order that many individuals could also view the quilt collection.

Quilt making has remained essentially the same since the 17<sup>th</sup> century. A quilt is two layers of fabric with batting in between. The three basic steps include: assembling the quilt top and backing with the maker's choice of batting in the center and then preparing to quilt it. In the early days, patterns or templates may have been made from paper, sandpaper, fabric, tin, or even plastic. The quilter marked and cut the fabric, put the three layers together and began to sew. Piecing usually consisted of making geometric blocks, such as stars. In contrast, an applique' block consisted of sewing shapes onto fabric, that generally was either white or cream. That produced a curvilinear, floral,



pictorial design. Many times, quilters combined both

techniques in one quilt. No doubt, doing so made the quilt much more attractive, don't you think?

Log Cabin and Crazy Quilts are made differently from



other types of quilts. A Crazy quilt block is comprised of random sized pieces arranged and basted down to cover the entire foundation cloth. For each quilt, the foundation is usually about 12 inches square. However, for the Log Cabin, blocks are formed by

sewing strips sequentially around the small square that has been sewn at the center of the foundation cloth. After each strip has been attached, it is finger pressed in place. The process is repeated until the foundation piece is covered. Depending on the maker, the blocks may be quite small or very large. The pattern blocks for both the *Crazy* and the *Log Cabin* quilts ultimately are joined together to create some of the classic quilts from the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

During the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries, the American colonies provided a perfect marketplace for English textile manufacturers and trading companies. It was protected and that was truly important. Chintz fabrics imported from India plus some made in England were very popular for quilts, coverlets, plus some household furnishings. After the Revolutionary War, textile mills were established in the United States. Women in the United States, appreciated fabric produced in the US, but remained faithful to English decorating styles, patterns, and imported fabric still was prized. An example of a whole cloth quilt Pillar Print chintz, named for the fabric used to make it, was probably made for a four-poster bed. They were very fashionable in England for the upper-class households. They frequently had matching bed curtains and cloth-covered head boards.



### CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS - BG = background

Unit A		Unit B	
Color 1 (gold)	4, 4 1/2 Square	Color 2(green)	4, 2 <sup>1</sup> / <sub>2</sub> squares
BG (white)	8, 2 ½ square	BG(white)	4, 2 <sup>1</sup> / <sub>2</sub> squares
Cener block		HST for unit B	
Color 2 (green)	1, 4 ½ square	Color 2 (green)	4, 3 squares
		BG	4, 3 squares

### FINISH

Unit A

- 1- Draw diagonal line on BG squares
- 2- Use flippy corner technique to create Unit A according to diagram above

### Unit B

- 1- Make 4 color 2 and BG HST
- 2- Trim to 2 1/2 squares
- 3- Using HSTs and other squares for unit B assemble following diagram above

### Finishing

- 1- Using Units A & B and center square assemble following diagram above
- 2- block is 12 1/2" unfinished, 12" finished
