### Dana Jones

Dana Jones is a quilt instructor, maker, designer and author, who loves all things FPP and improv and is hooked on Cherrywood handdyed fabric. Dana was editor of Quilters Newsletter magazine and the SAQA Journal and is the author of Pagtinabangay: The Quilts and Quiltmakers of Caohagan Island, which shares the story of quiltmaking on a 13-acre island in the central Philippines.

Dana's had articles, patterns, and block designs published in numerous quilt magazines. She's taught at International Quilt Festival in Houston and for the American Quilter's Society, guilds and shops across the United States and beyond. She also teaches open-enrollment classes via Zoom.

Dana's quilts have been exhibited at Rocky Mountain Quilt Museum and as part of an American Quilt Study Group traveling exhibition. She lives at 9,200 feet in the Rocky Mountains in Gilpin County, Colorado. For information, see <u>www.danajonesquilts.com</u>

#### Class: Thursday, April 10, 2025 - Demystifying Design for Foundation Paper Piecing

Extreme angles, sharp points, precision piecing, easy patch cutting, one-of-a-kind images and

more are all possible with paper piecing. In this design class, you'll learn how to create

foundations for everything from traditional blocks to pictorial quilts. We'll start with foundation

design for traditional blocks to more complex blocks. We'll meet the Paper Police whose rules

make FPP design possible. Then you'll design your own block. Next, you'll learn a few more Paper Police rules before designing a simple pictorial quilt working from a photo or drawing you bring to class. Whether you're new to paper piecing or an experienced paper piecer, this class is for you. Skills taught in the class will include:

- Determining the number of foundations needed.
- Numbering foundations for piecing order.
- Labeling foundations and marking them for joining to other foundations.
- Making templates for cutting patches for on-grain piecing and efficient use of fabric.
- Making curves with straight lines.

This is a technique class, but you will take home log-cabin and kite blocks, foundations for several more blocks, and a design for a quilt that is uniquely yours.

#### Supply List (Also, See the website for a printable list)

Photo to use to design a quilt. Keep it simple. For example, one animal, one building, one flower. If you want the instructor to review your image before class, email it to her at danaellenjones@gmail.com. The instructor will have photos for you to use if you are not able to find one to bring.

Kit from instructor: \$25 paid to instructor in class by cash or check. This kit will be provided to save individuals the expense of buying expensive art supplies in quantities beyond what will be needed in class. It will include:

- Mechanical pencil, HB or B lead
- Eraser
- 1" x 12" clear, flat ruler with 1/8" grid
- Fine-tip Sharpie
- 3 sheets of 8.5" x 11" vellum paper with 8 squares/inch grid. The instructor will have larger size for classroom use.
- 1 sheet template plastic
- 2 sheets 8.5" x 11" vellum for tracing. The instructor will have a larger size for classroom use.
- Multiple pages of full-color handouts for use after class plus handouts of in-class use.

Plus, the use of instructor's supplies such as colored pencils, larger vellum grid paper, and larger and smaller gridded rulers.

# SWAN SHERIDAN Free Motion Quilt Laboratory Workshop

5/15: "Do you find it difficult to know where to start with your free motion work? Do you have a project that is hard to plan for?

Bring a finished quilt top to Free Motion Quilt Lab and get the guidance you need! Learn to make choices about your specific project,



discover tricks to make your projects more approachable, and ultimately create a personal plan for the project you bring to class. Swan will help you test your plan, tailor it to your abilities, and help you to organize an order of operations (where to begin and where to finish)."

## On any given day, you can find this quilt artist half buried in fabric, brandishing her needle and thread, and otherwise surrounded by implements of creativity.

Swan's interest in all things textile related began when she was very young. She tried everything from spinning wool, to cross-stitch and finally landed in the world of quilting during grad school as she awaited the birth of her first nephew. She dabbled in appliqué with that first quilt in the interests of covering a mistake and thus did necessity become the mother of invention. Fast forward to 2009, when Swan refined her appliqué skills and designed her own quilts. Swan began producing patterns for sale in early 2013 and regularly exhibits her work in local and national shows. She teaches in Phoenix and around the country, offering classes in appliqué, color, machine and hand quilting, and decorative stitches. Formerly from Tucson, she currently lives in Phoenix, Arizona with her superhero husband and artist daughter.



## The Bresler Collection 1800-1980: Part 3

**QUILT HISTORY** 

The Civil War (1861 -1865) dramatically impacted the lives of families living in the United States. Blankets were in short supply in the North so women collected thousands of quilts in order that their soldiers might be kept warm. Seaports were blockaded in the South. Thus, textile manufacturers struggled to produce fabric for sheets, blankets, other hospital needs, and tents. Women became even more resourceful in finding ways to clothe not only their families but also their soldiers. They cut up carpets for blankets, learned to weave cloth, and to knit socks.

After the war, the textile mills quickly got back in business and soon the desperately needed cloth was back on the market. Women bought sewing machines and took advantage of low cost printed calico. They did many things with the machines, such as adding borders, piecing blocks, or adding bindings. Some ambitious ladies even tried to applique' or quilt by machine (previously applique' and quilting were primarily by hand).



Rural free delivery also was established by the Postal Service. This put even the most remote farms and other sites in touch with the rest of the United States. People were able to keep up with the latest trends and fashions. Households could receive farm and household magazines such as *Hearth and Home* of Augusta, Maine. This periodical

featured short stories and helpful hints, plus fancy work patterns and others submitted by readers. Thousands of patterns were distributed throughout the nation through mail order catalogs.

When I ended the discussion of Part 2 of the Bresler collection, I noted that I had the book *Old Quilts* authored by Dr. William Rush Dunton. Dr. Dunton was a psychiatrist and as he puts it in his book "a physician to nervous ladies and an exponent of occupational therapy I

have gradually developed an interest in needlework, weaving, and other "home" crafts which may be used for therapeutic purposes."

Dr. Dunton's book, with a copywrite of 1946, is filled with pictures of quilts and detailed descriptions of them. He covers album, pieced, chintz, coverlets, framed medallions, applique' and plain quilts. In Part 2 of this series, I referred to Catherine Bell Hopper. Sadly, I made a typo as Catherine's last name was really Hooper, Dr.



Dunton has a picture of an album quilt made by Catherine Hooper in 1852. If any of my readers have Dr. Dunton's book, look at page 104. Dr. Dunton gives a detailed description of the quilt. He also concludes that Catherine Hooper was a godly person as she wrote C. Hooper in a yellow chainstitch on the Bible, located in the center of the quilt.



The Bresler Collection also includes the *Album* quilt of Catherine Bell Hooper. In the book, *American Quilt Classics*, *1800 - 1980, The Bresler Collection* has a picture of Catherine's *Album* quilt on page 55. This time it is in color.





# TQG BLOCK of the MONTH


Block 10 - Kansas City Star Quilt Pattern Collection; Published March 1929

Honey Bee – the "Honey Bee" is a charming example if a quilt design combining the favorite methods of piecing and applique. A little nine patch block is used as the center block of anther nine patch, the other sections of which have applique as shown in the small sketch. The other patterns of The Star's series the patterns given do not allow seams but should be cut about a quarter inch larger all around so the finished parts will be the sizes here printed. it is a bit less trouble to piece the entire block first then applique the bees wings and bodies afterward This is done by creasing a seam width back all around each piece, basting then carefully placed and whipping or blind stitching to the white background.

Honey Bee blocks are much more attractive when set together with large plain squares the size of this block.
